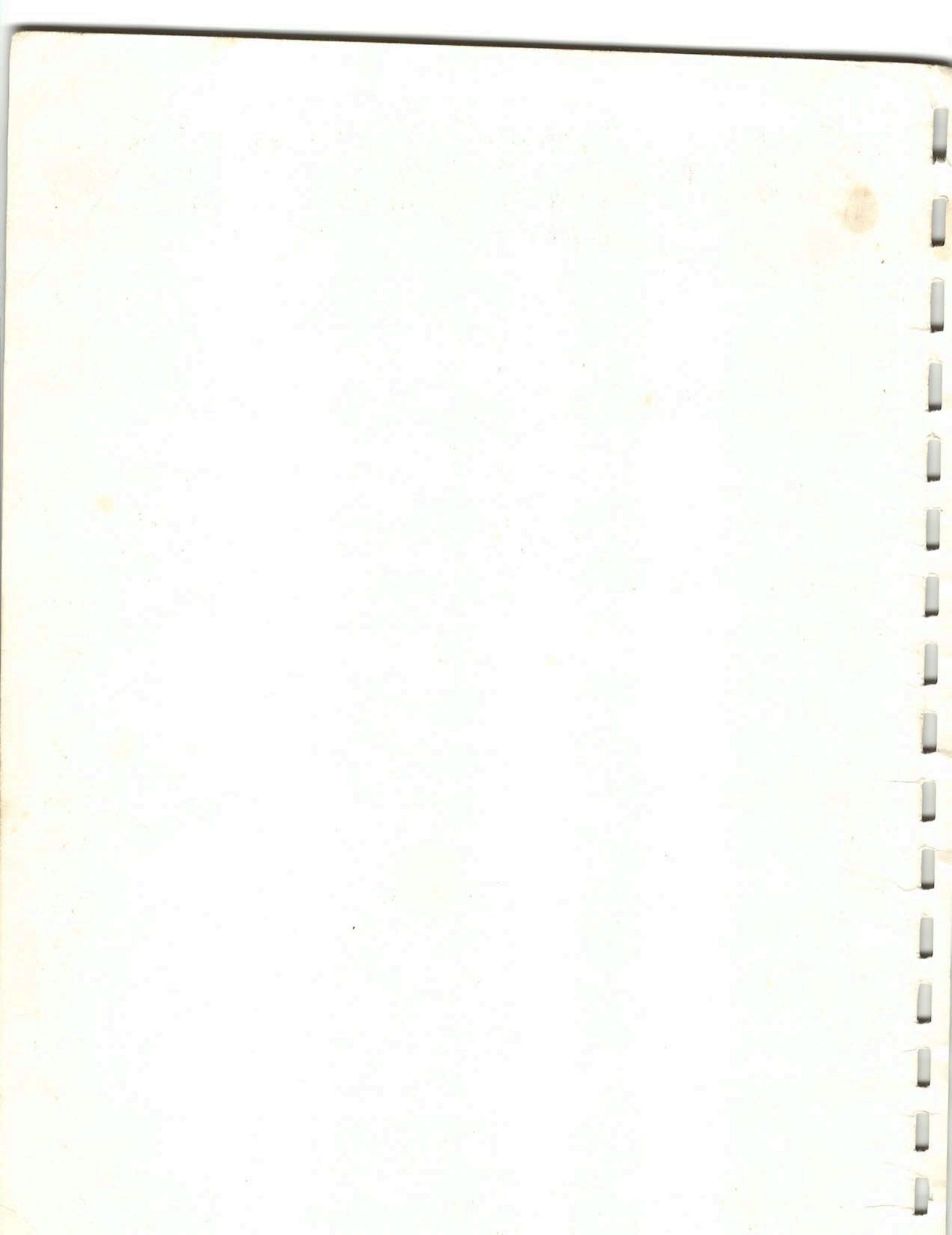

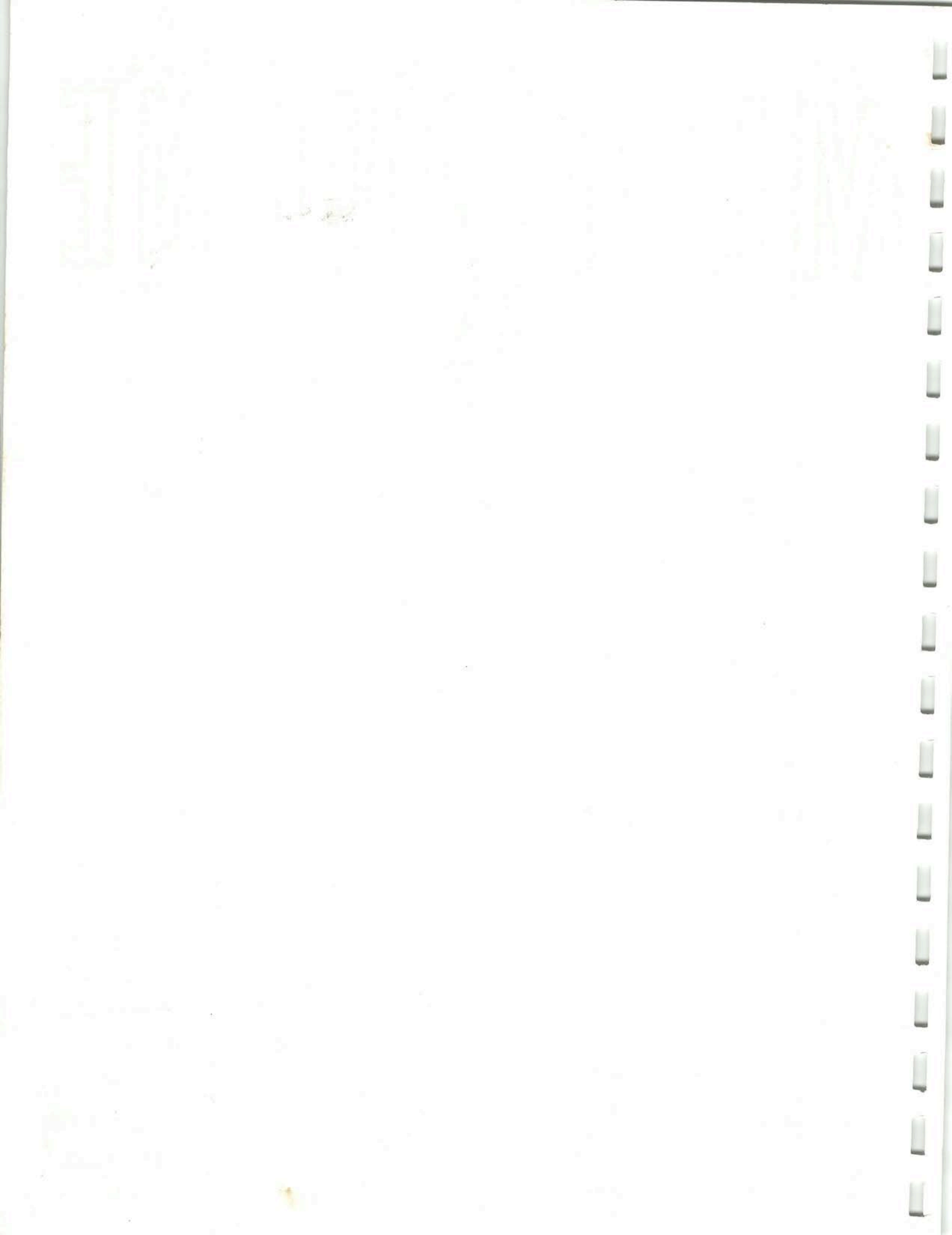

BRITS TAKE ANNUAL BRITISH-AMERICAN SKIRMISH

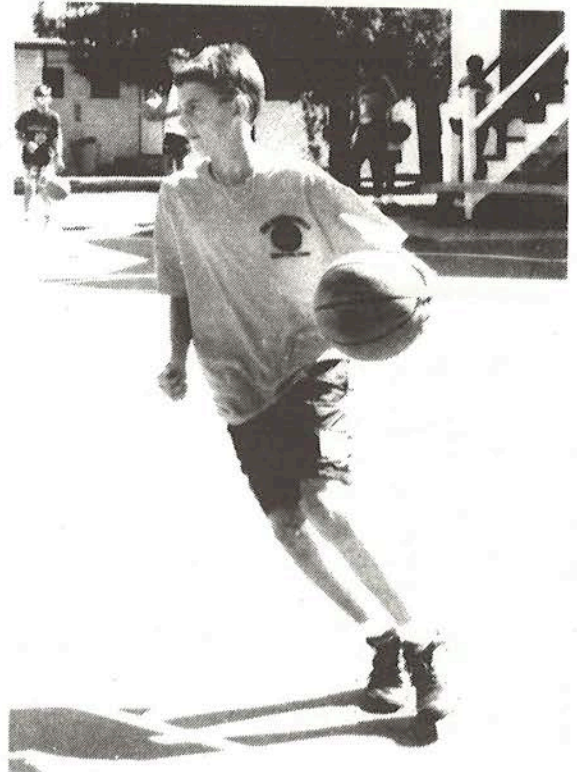

TWI-LIGHT LEAGUE provides intra-camp athletic competition that continues all through the regular season. Its name stems from the fact that most of the events take place after dinner. Sports camp or a sports oriented camp depends on its activities. These activities are influenced by not just the people involved, the merit of instruction provided by counselors, or the time allotted. These factors mean nothing if the weather does not cooperate.

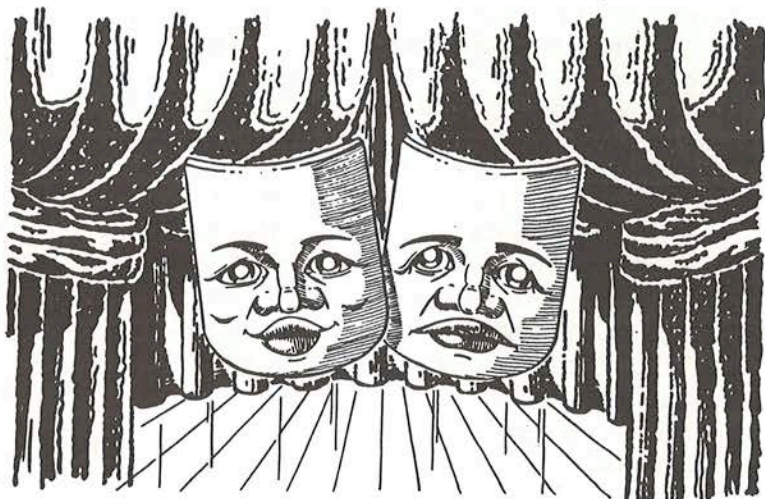

The Campfires will return, however, especially if damp weather "reigns" again. 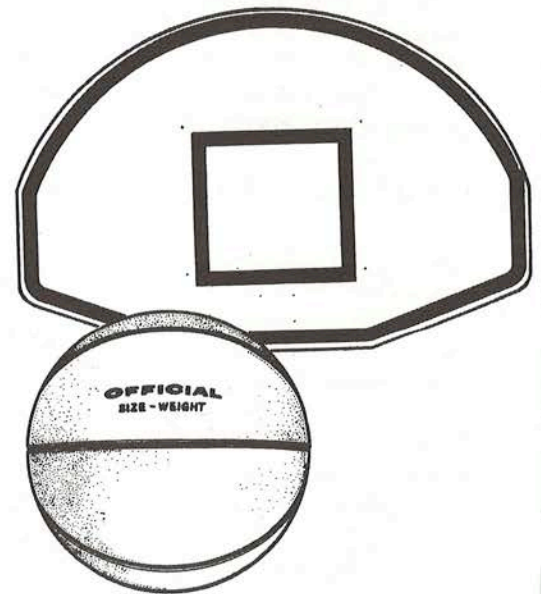

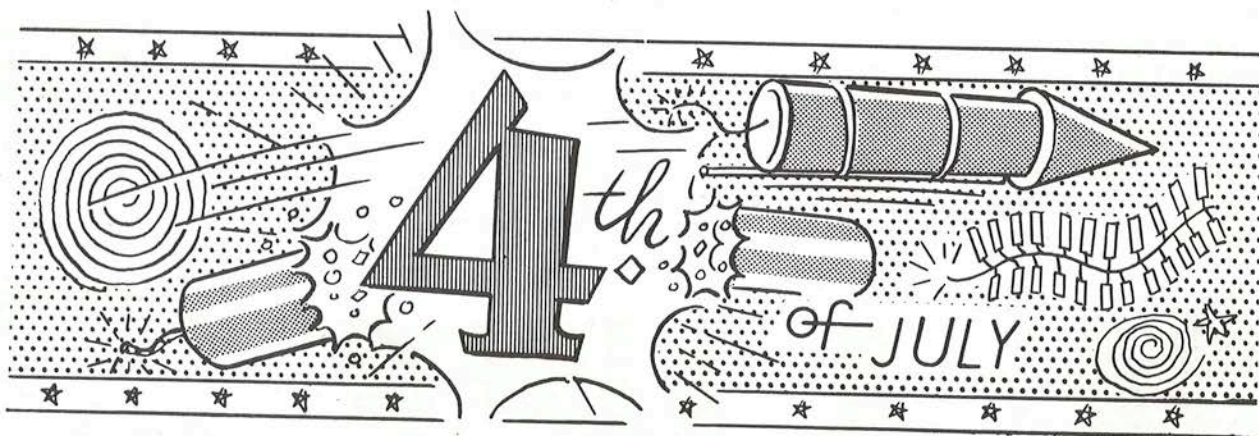

Attention Menominee! Are you ready to catch a ride on the hottest thing to hit the water since DEAN DESHLER?

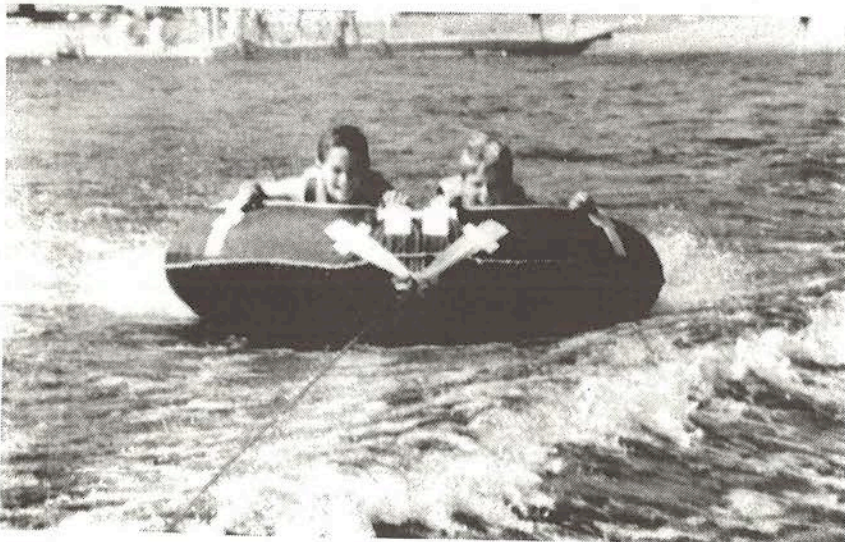

The last event of the day was the tug of war. Everybody had a lot of fun, especially since they were able to socialize with the opposite sex.

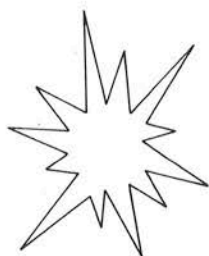

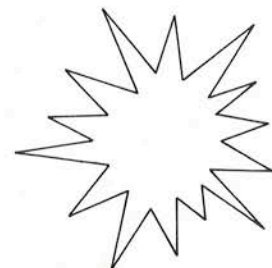

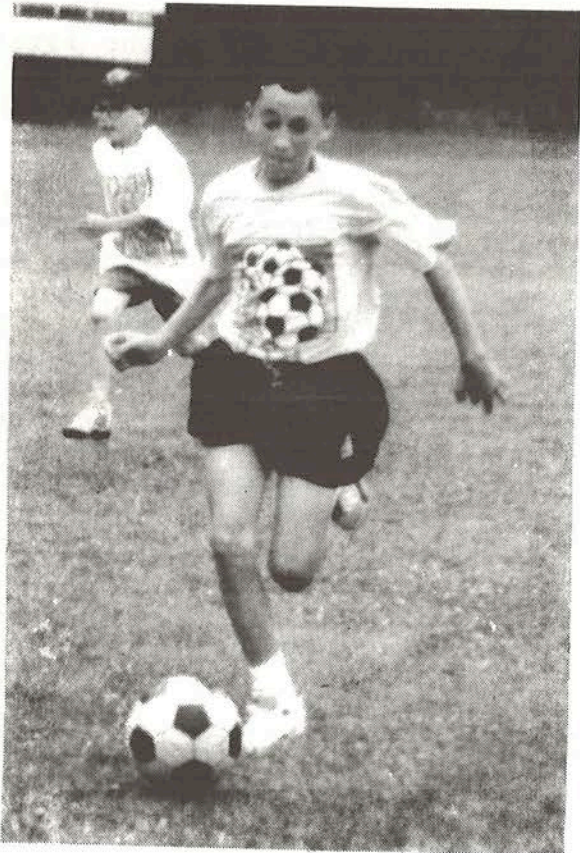

10 A GETS EASY WIN OVER DEERHORN

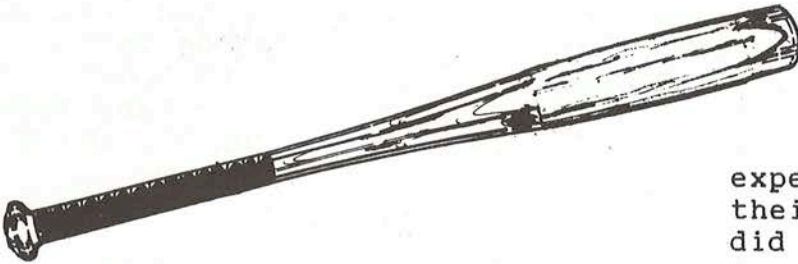
The 10A softball team was supposed to play hardball, but because the 12U mistakenly took all the catcher's equipment with them to Deerhorn, they played softball.

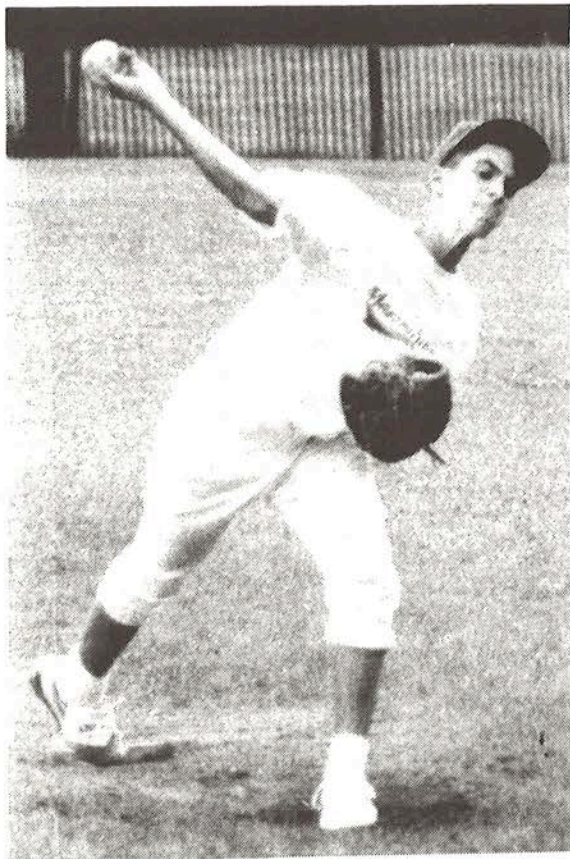

CONSISTENCY BRINGS ARCHERS 6-POINT VICTORY OVER RIVAL DEERHORN

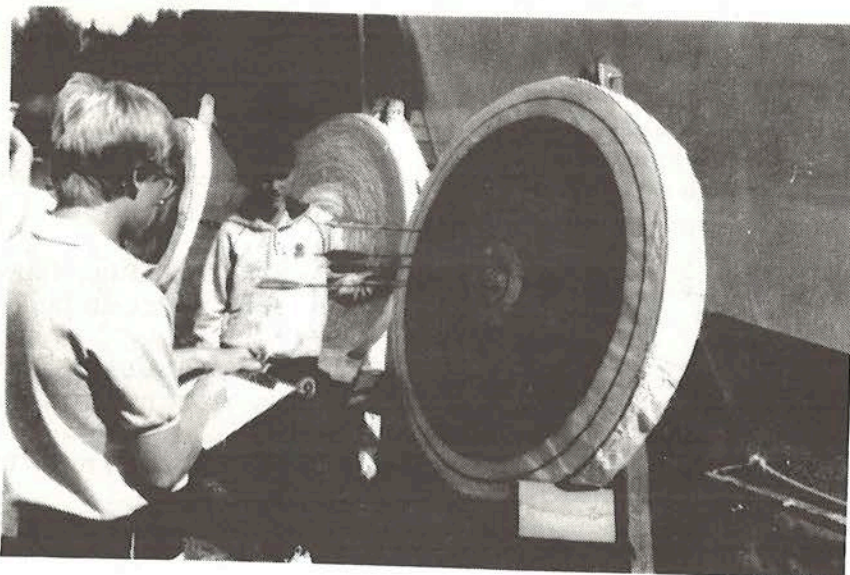
The 16 under team was used to shooting from the distance of twenty yards, so we were expecting good scores for the meet.

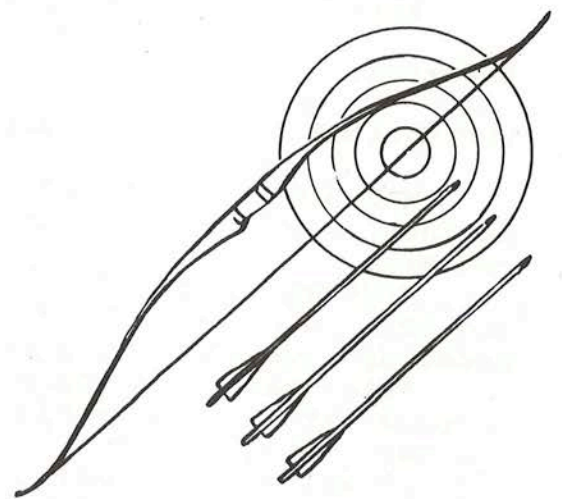

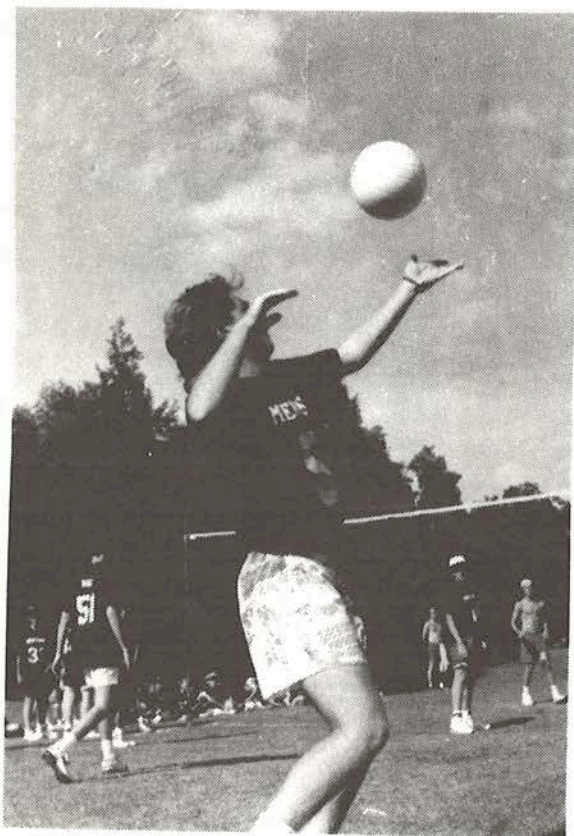

SCHIFF'S HAT TRICK LEADS MENOMINEE TO SOCCER WIN OVER KAWAGA

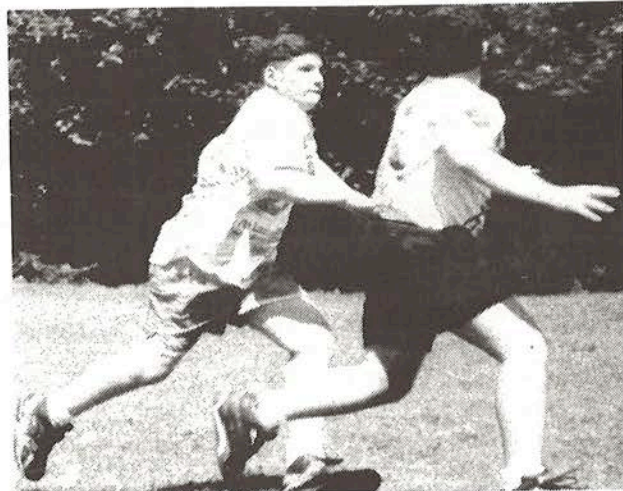

12D LOSES HEARTBREAKER TO KAWAGA

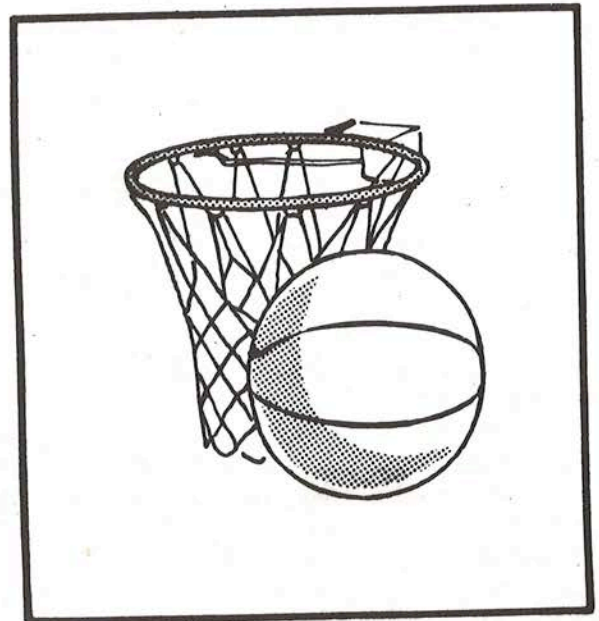
In one of the most exciting games of the Kawaga competition, the 12D basketball team was narrowly defeated by a score of 31-30.

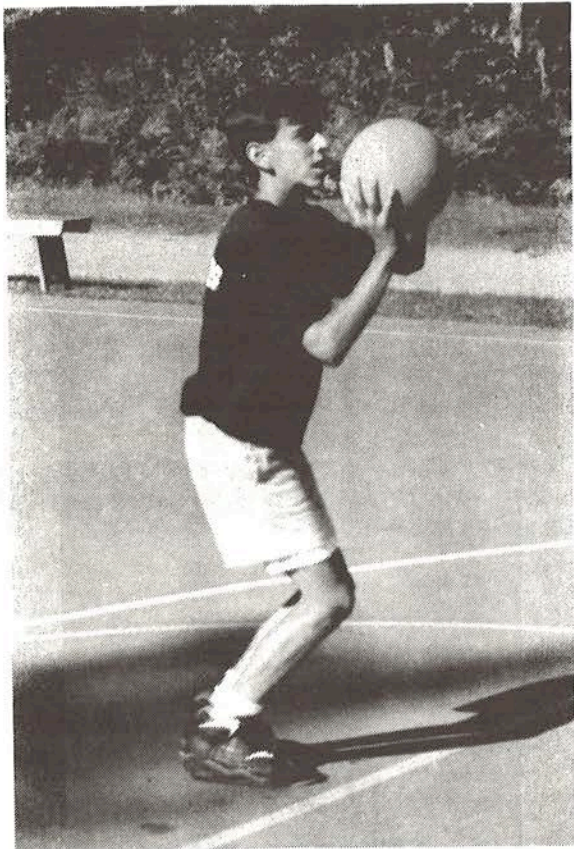

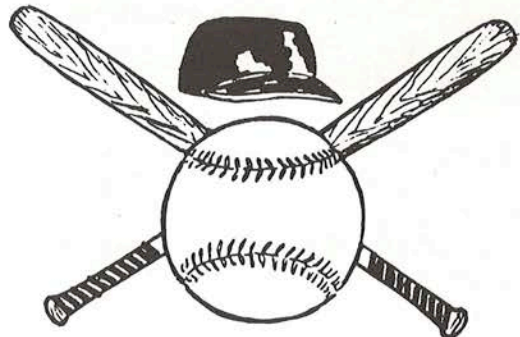

The 3-Peat had already been achieved, but the 16A softball team, led by STEVE KANEFSKY, was determined to beat Kawaga. It was not to be.

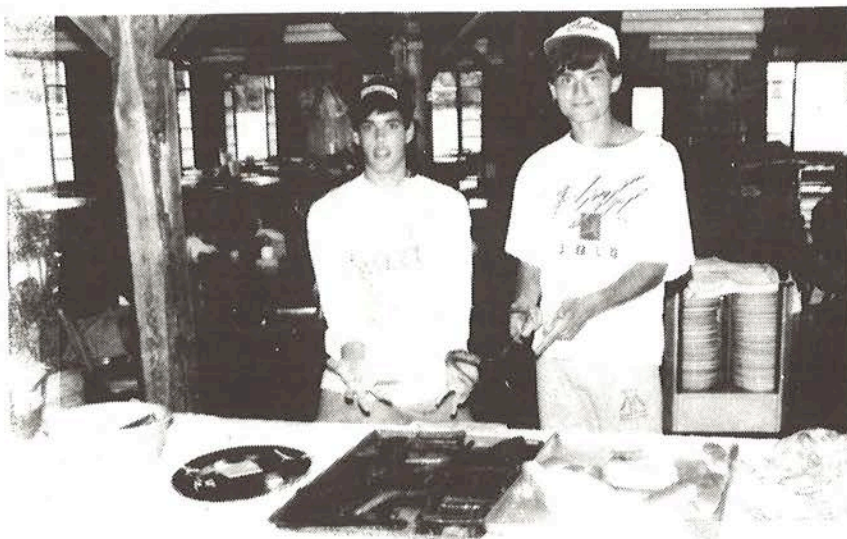

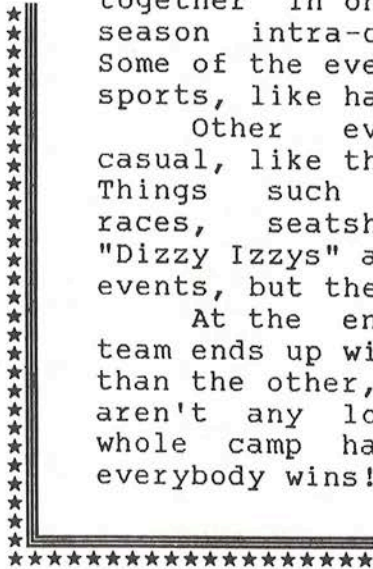


FIELD EVENTS A BIG PART OF G-W FUN

WHITE TEAM SINGS ITS WAY TO VICTORY

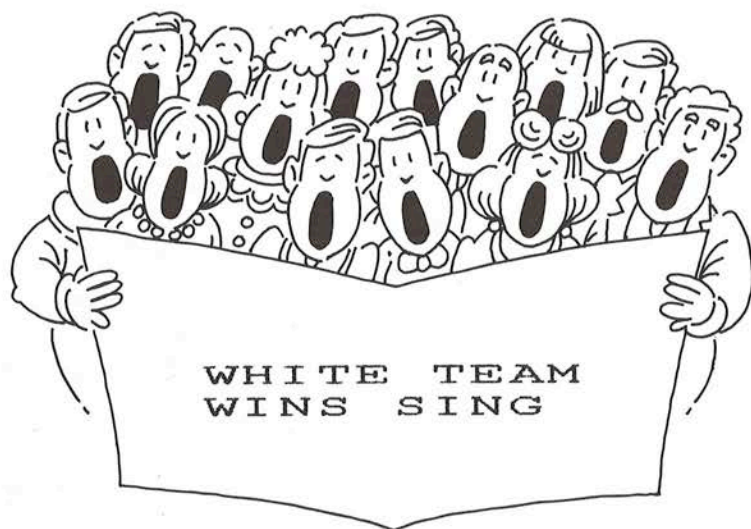

RELAY WIN PUTS GREEN OVER THE TOP

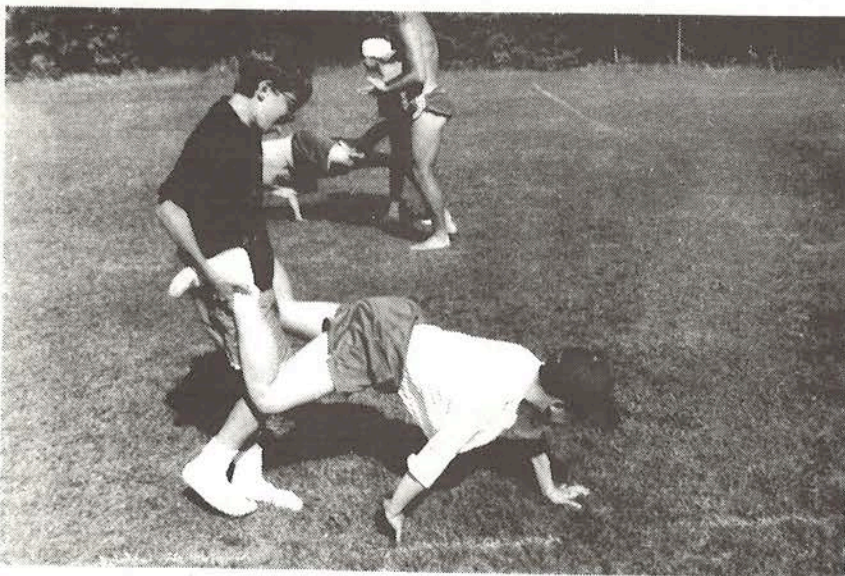

Over the years you may read these pages, and this note in particular, perhaps scores of times. As you do, find comfort in this thought, you are loved.

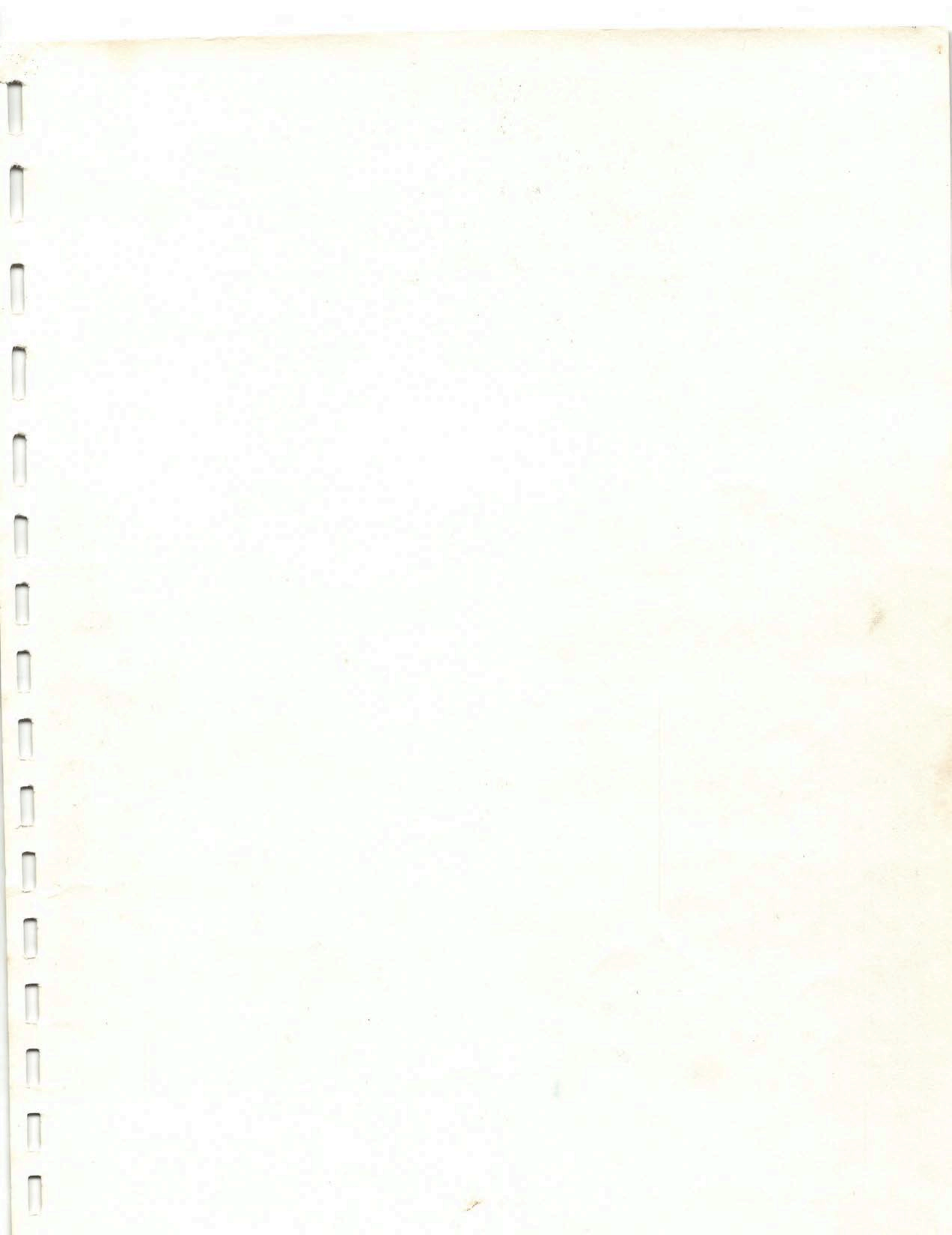
