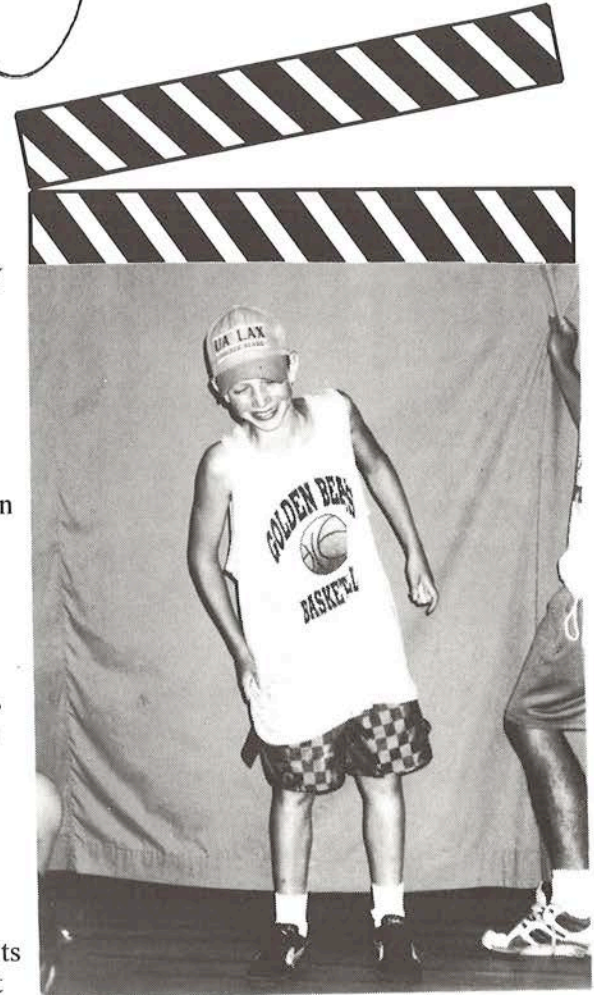

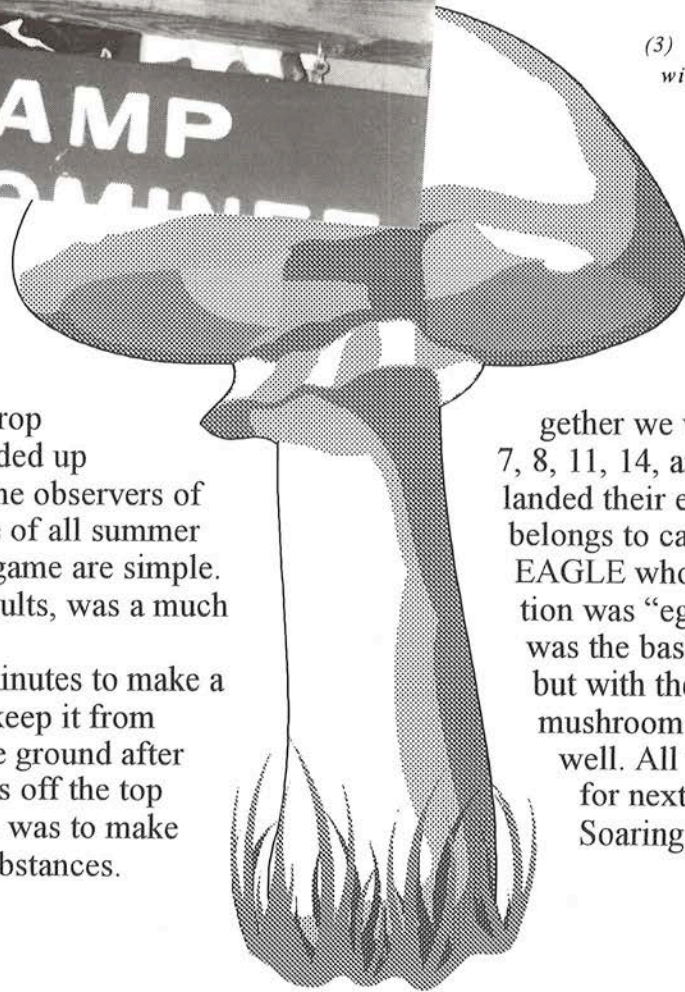

one point to Camp Nicolet. The next Regatta is Chippewa's, which all of us are looking forward to.

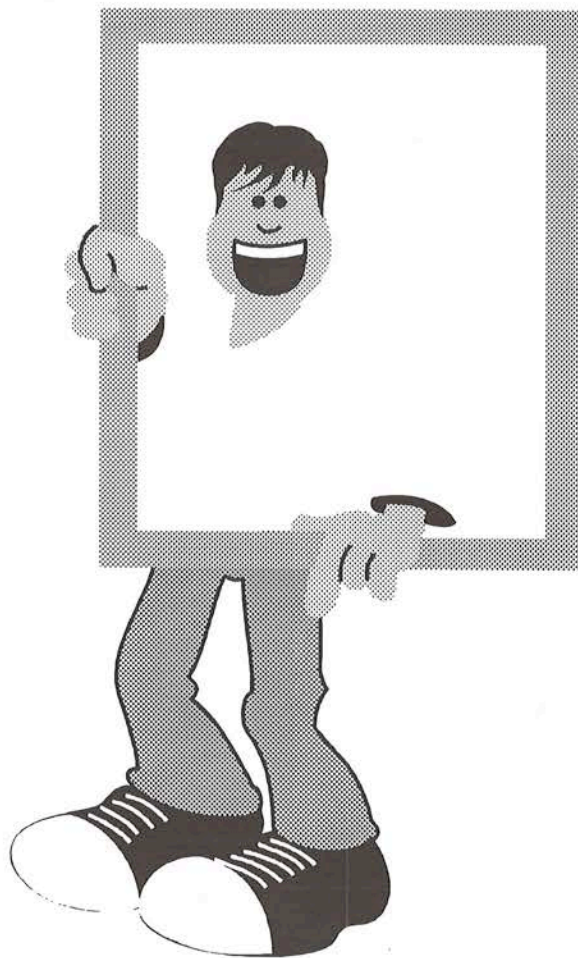


12 And Under Hardball Proves That End Score Doesn't Always Deter- mine A Winner

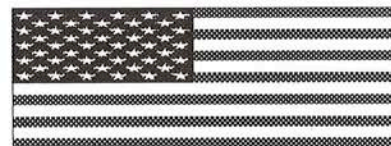

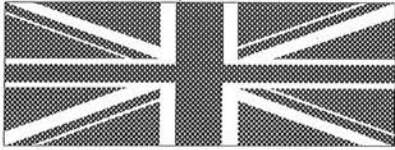

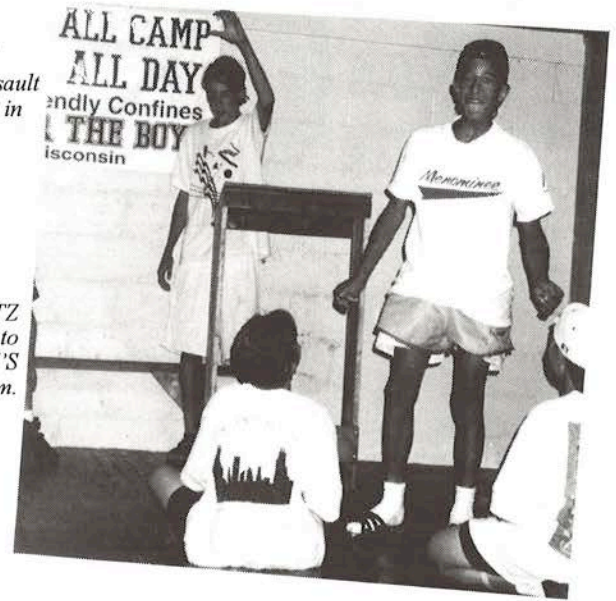

11C Hoops Tripped Up

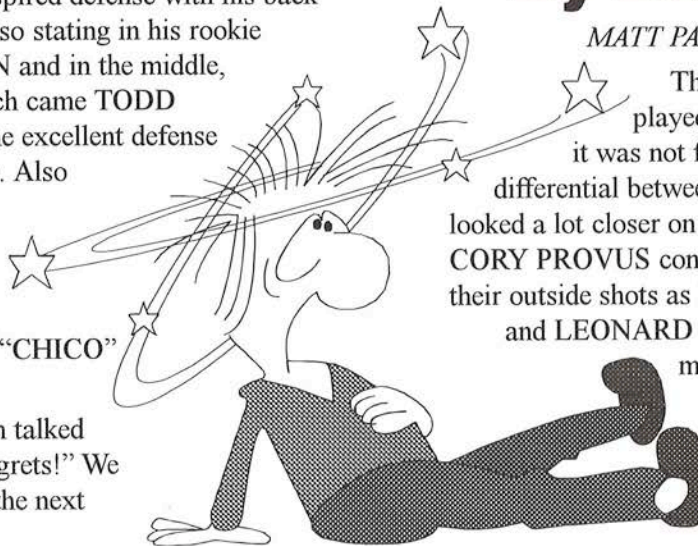

Shorter 16 Hoopers Not Lacking Character

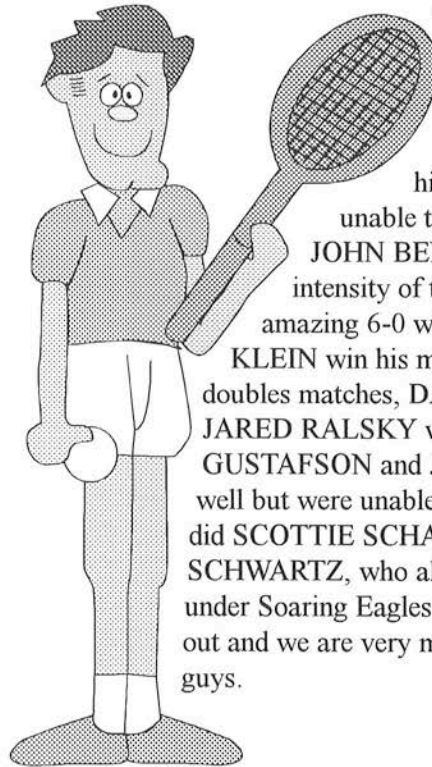

YUSPEH also played his hardest, but still was unable to win his match.

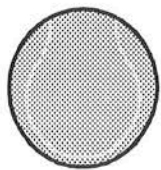

In the end, Ojibwa won. It was a tough loss for Menominee's C softball team as they played a sound defensive game while never giving up hope.

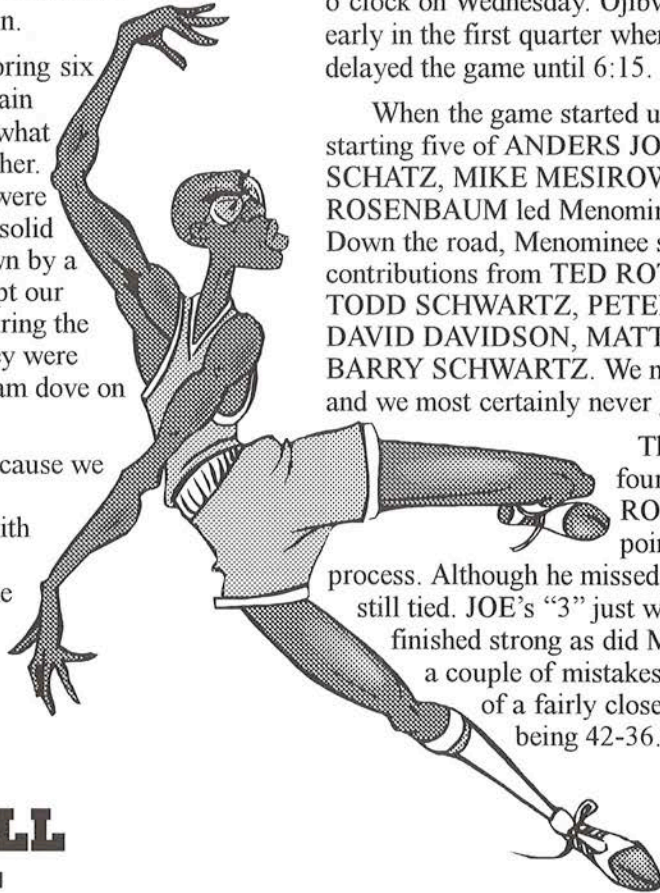
With Spirits High, 13B Hoops Goes Down

eleven teams.

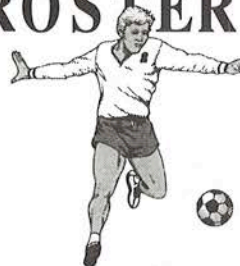
For the first time ever in C.M. history, the Menominee Hockey League (MHL) will take to the new roller rink at the Friendly Confines.

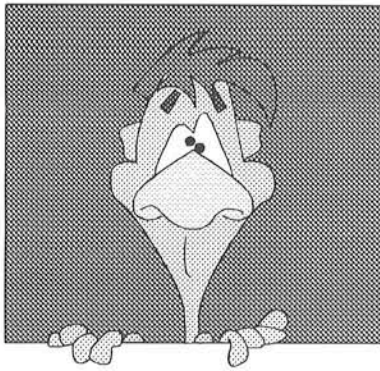

Bullock Bedazzles Boys with Ball On Cup (Stick)

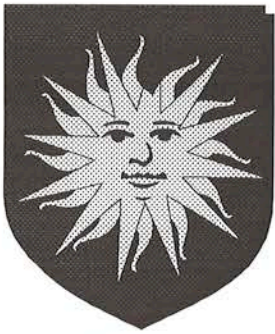

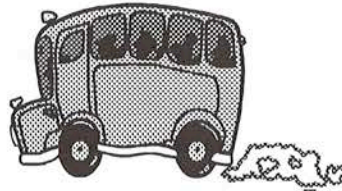

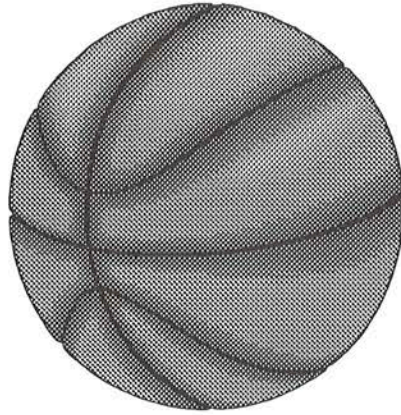

Menominee showed great effort and sportsmanship throughout the whole game.



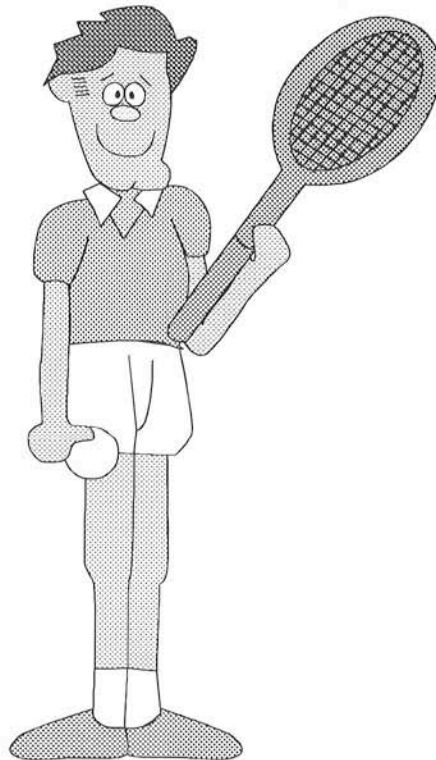

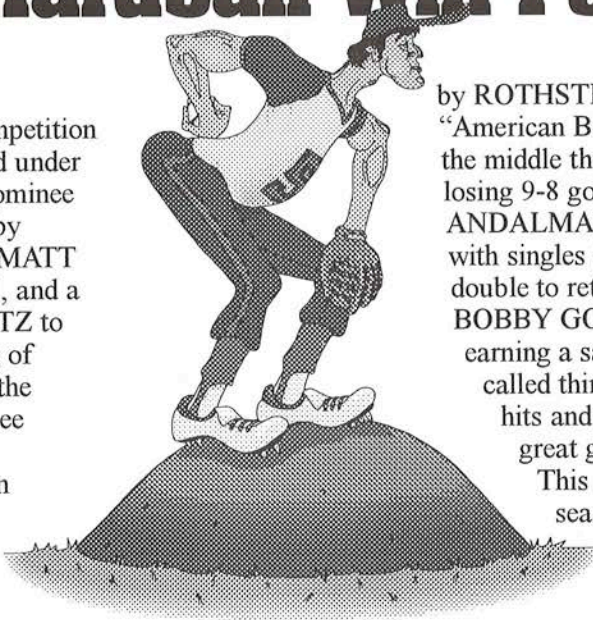

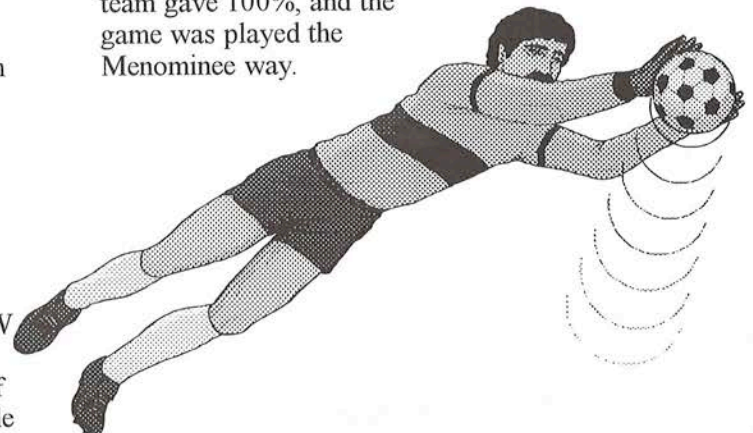

HERTSBERG AND BENDER PROVE SOCCER MVP'S VS. DEERHORN

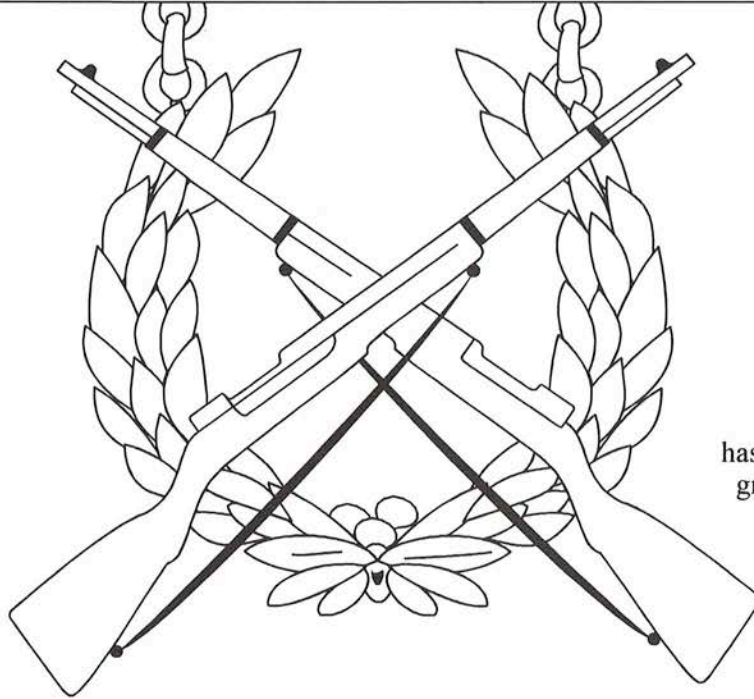

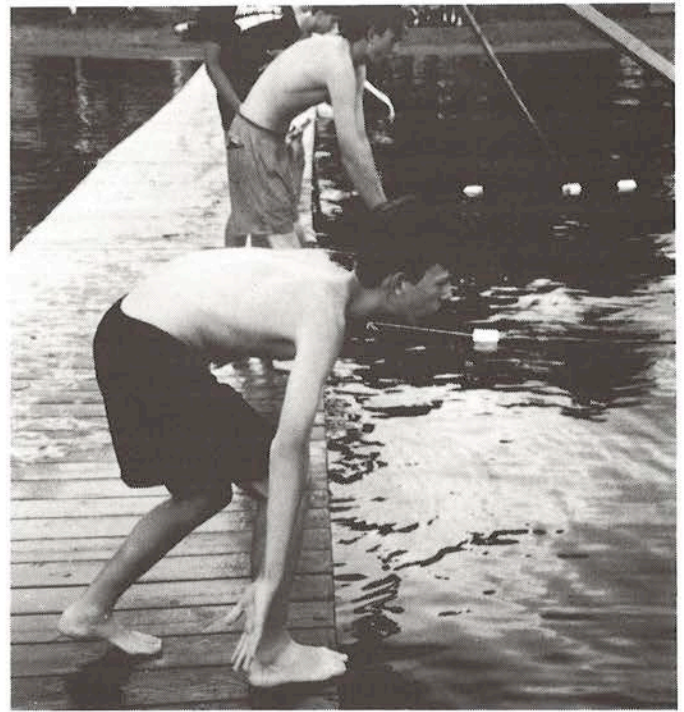

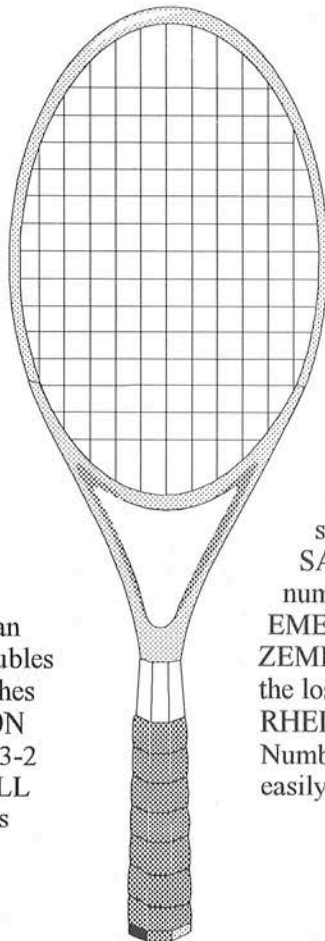

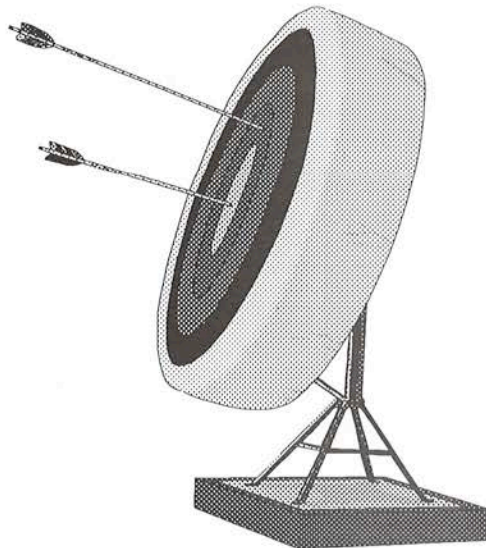

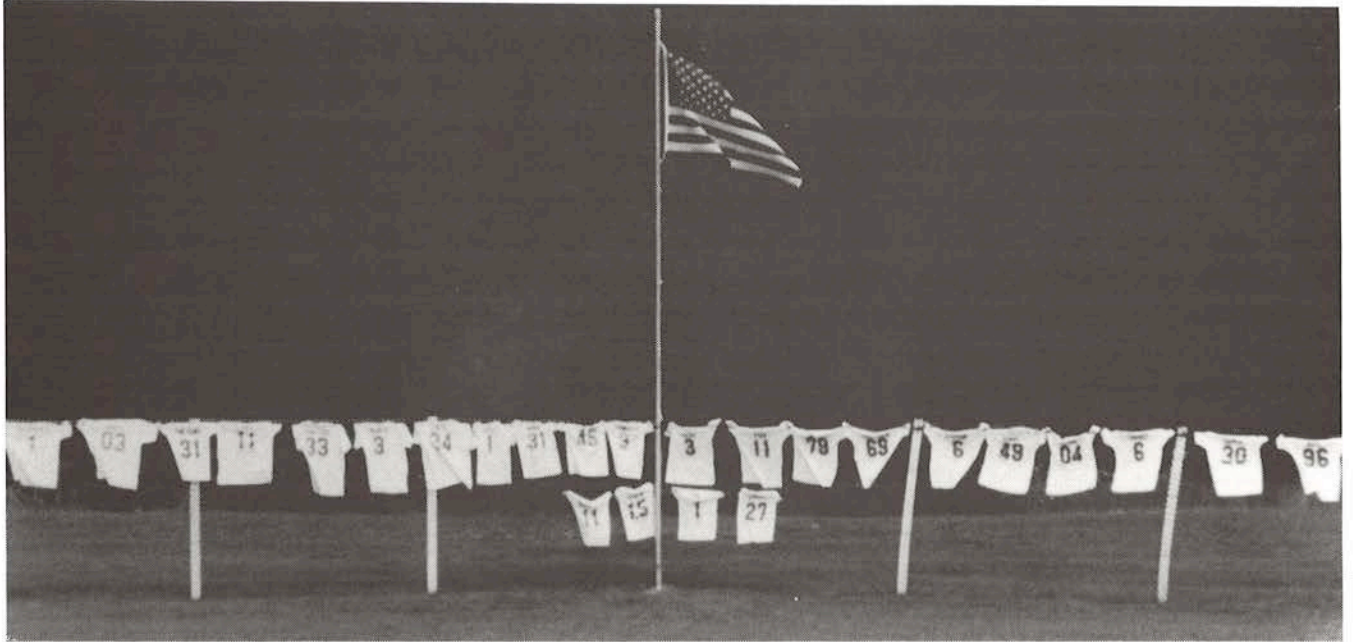

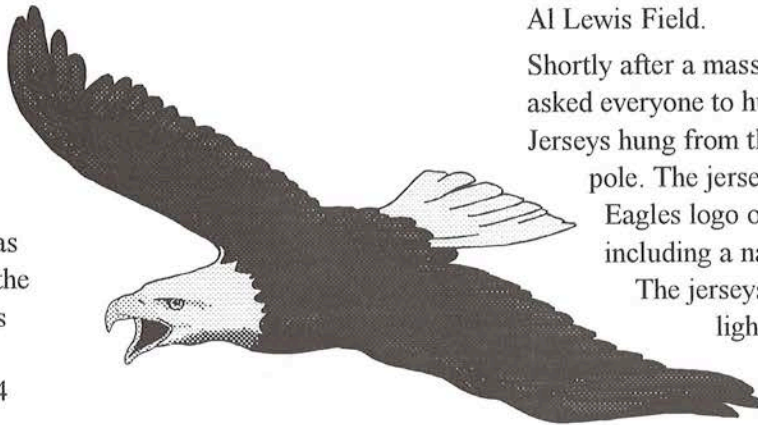

It can be said that the Menominee team performed extremely well and in the face of very strong competition, came out on top.

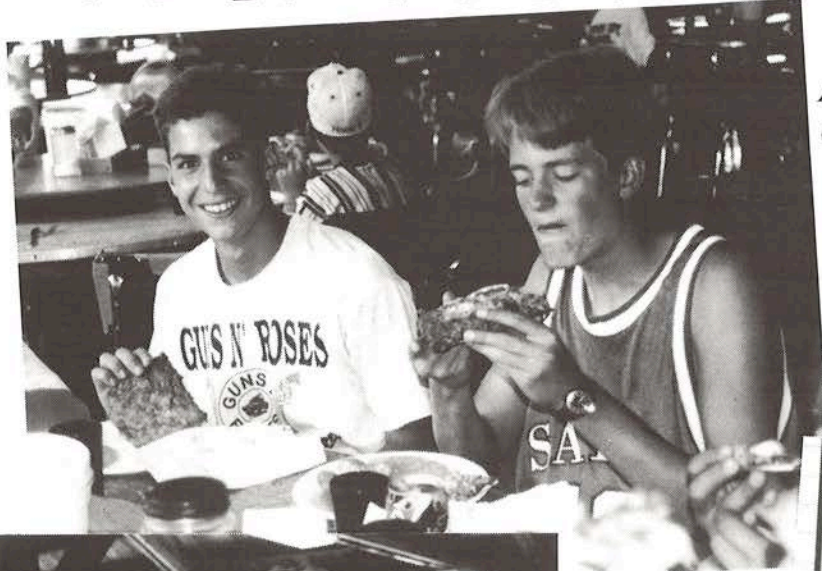

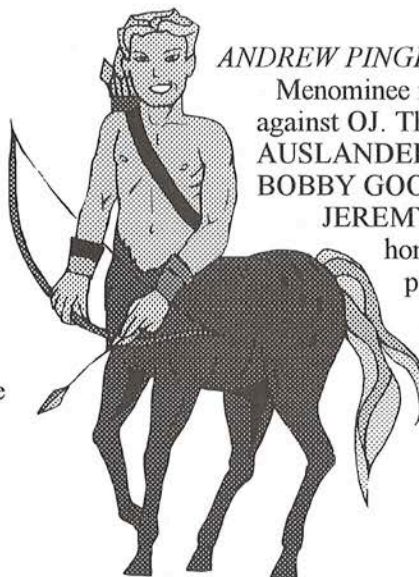
Our total scored of 528 to OJ's score of 472 echoed our dominance of archery across the land.

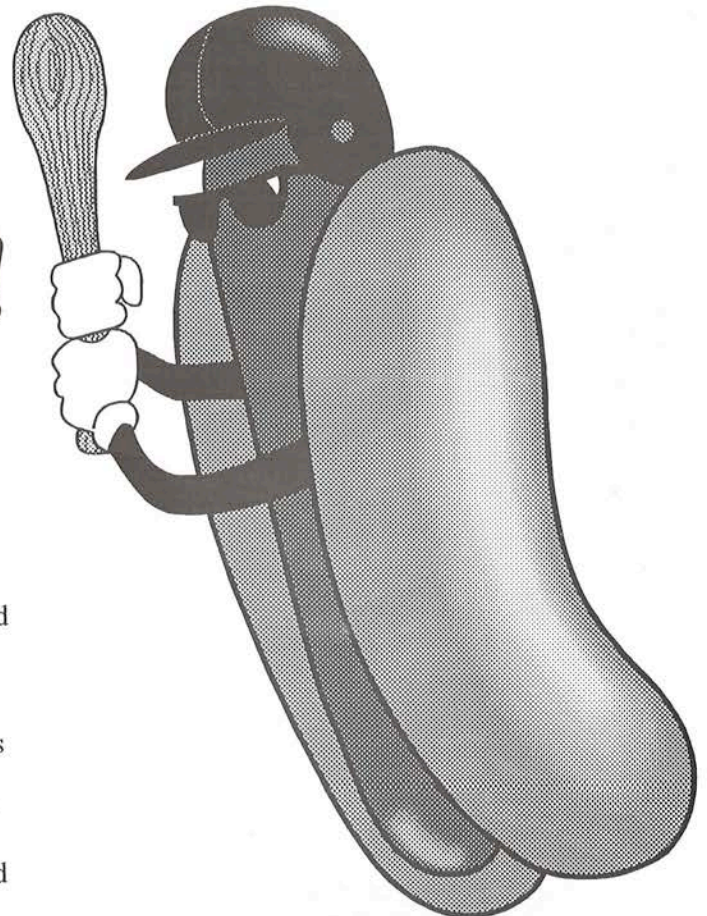

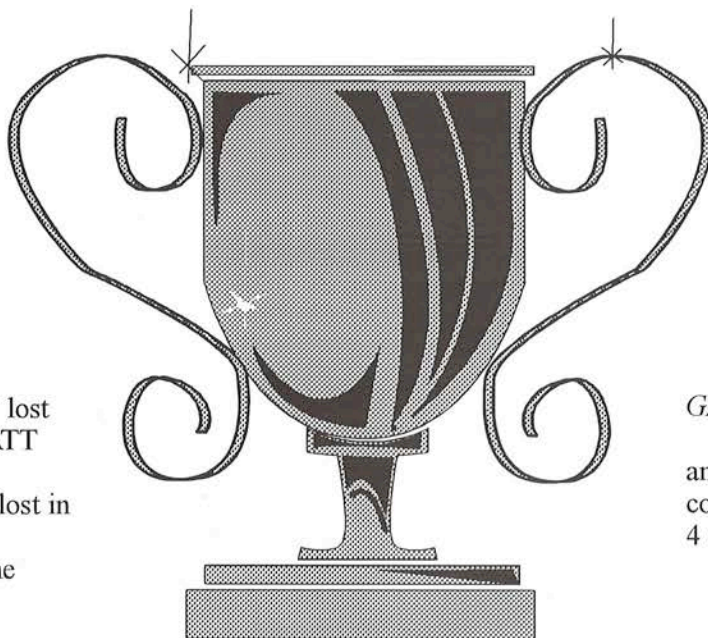

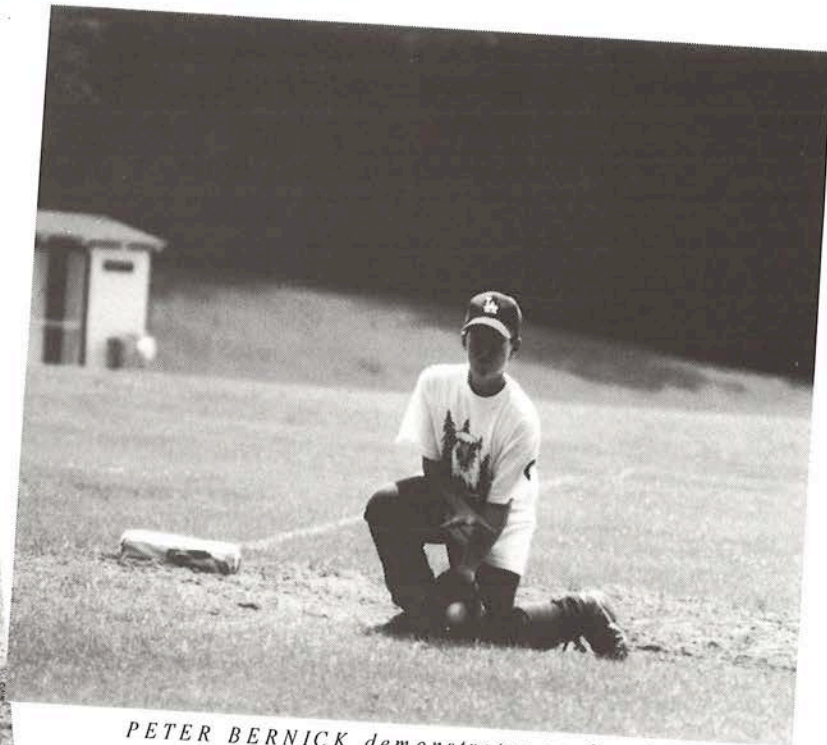

11B With A Valiant Effort

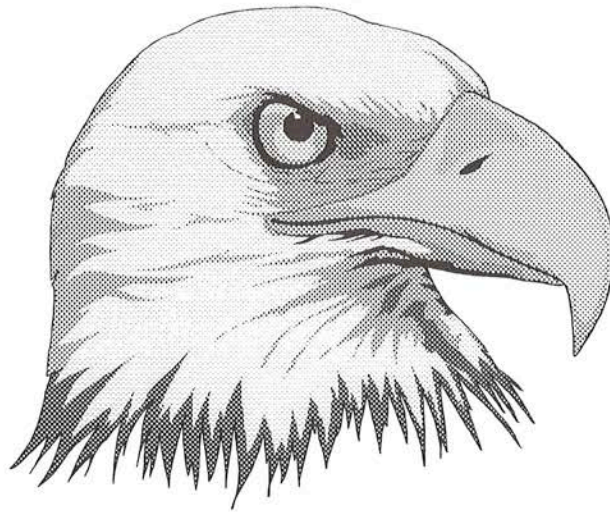

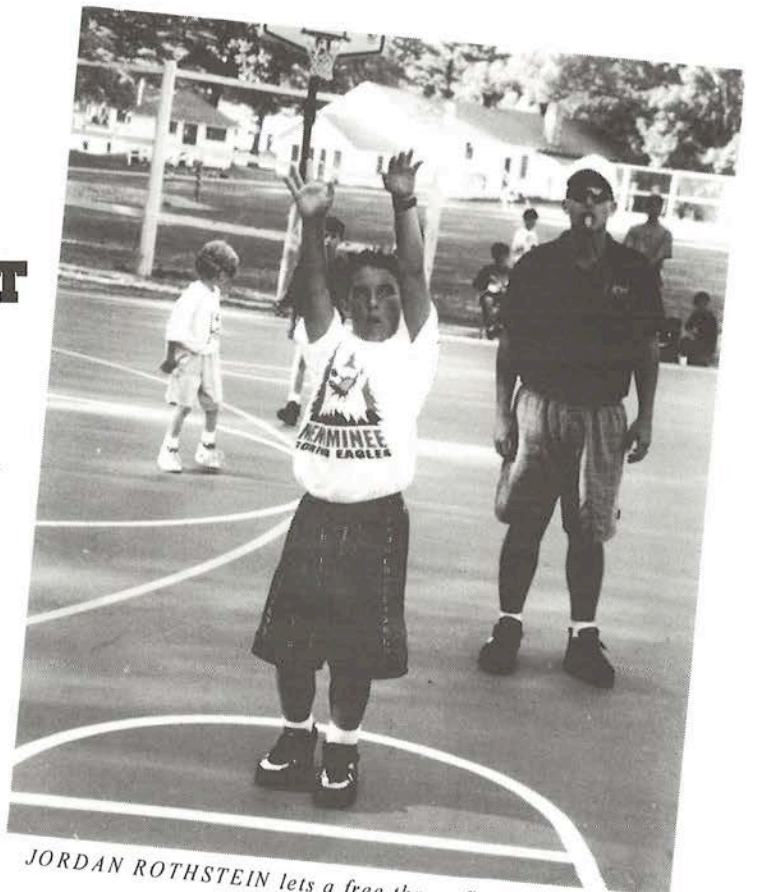


Coach STEW AUSLANDER sketches a play during a time out.

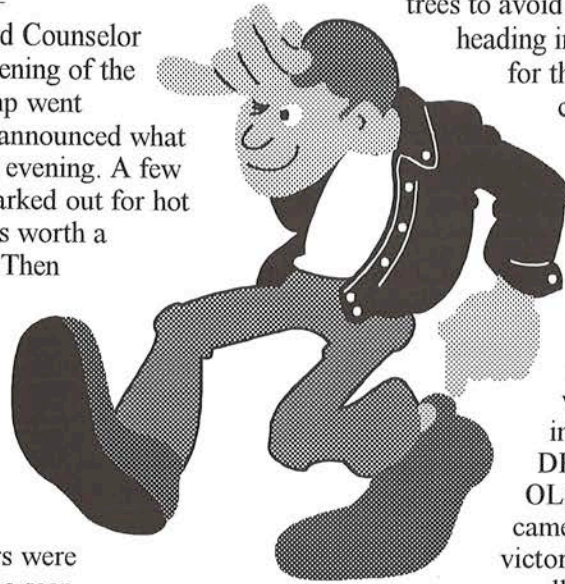
Whites Hunt Down More Counselors

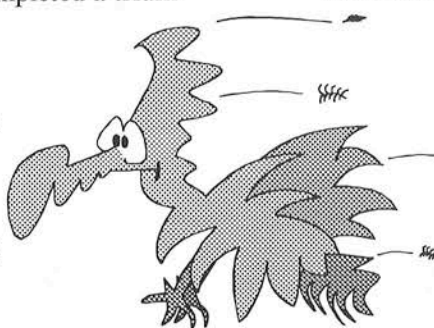


MATT PASSEN takes a big cut to hit the ball hard and on the ground.

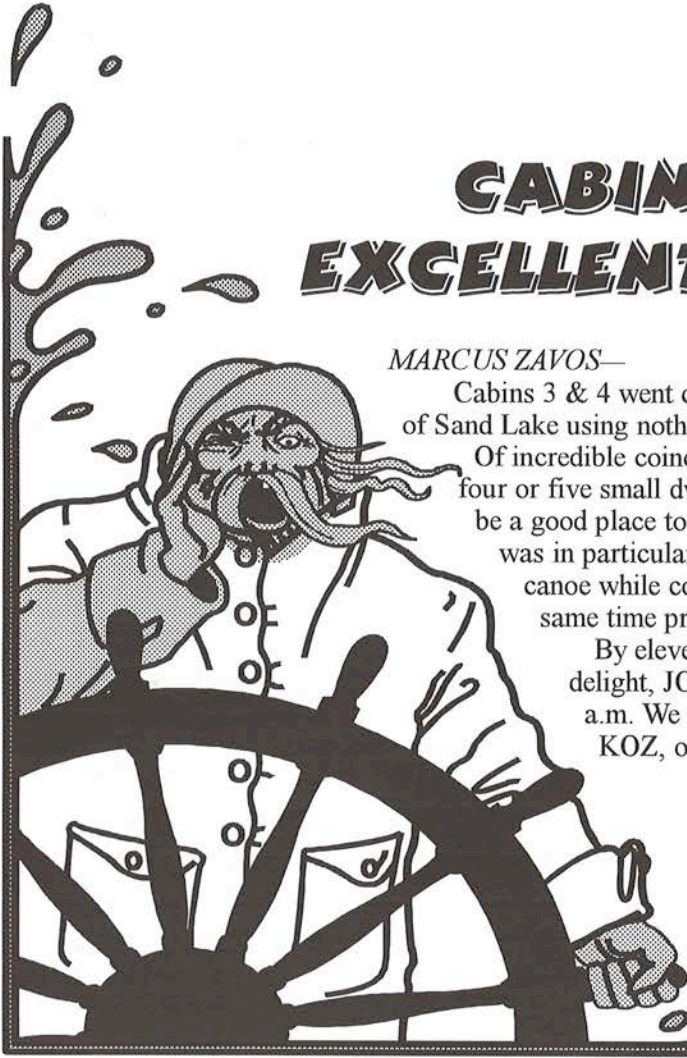
CABINS 3 & 4'S EXCELLENT ADVENTURE

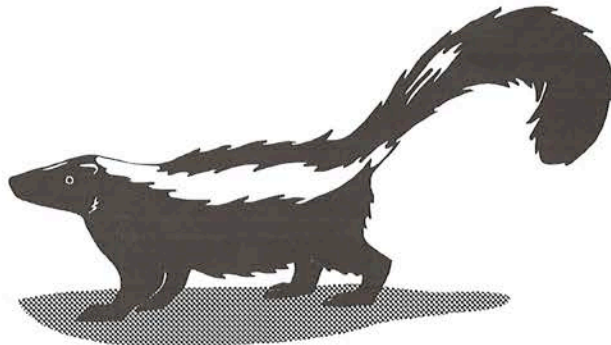

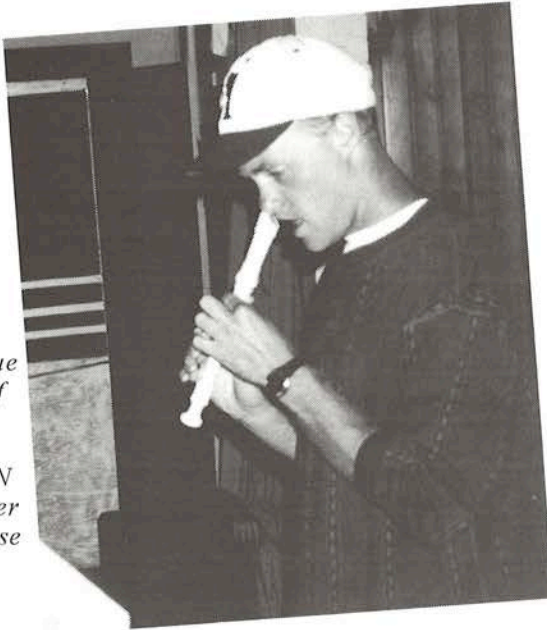
TE RETURNS FOR MEGA SOCIAL

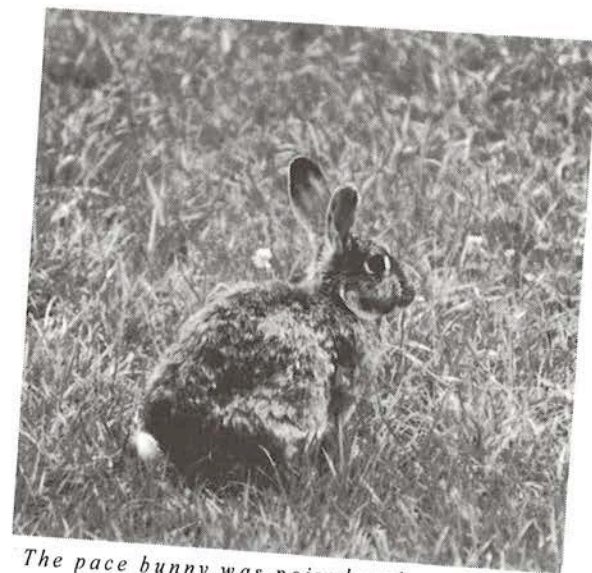
GLENN started the race, police escort included, and it was a mad dash the first hundred yards as the favorites had to battle with the youthful exuberance of younger competitors.

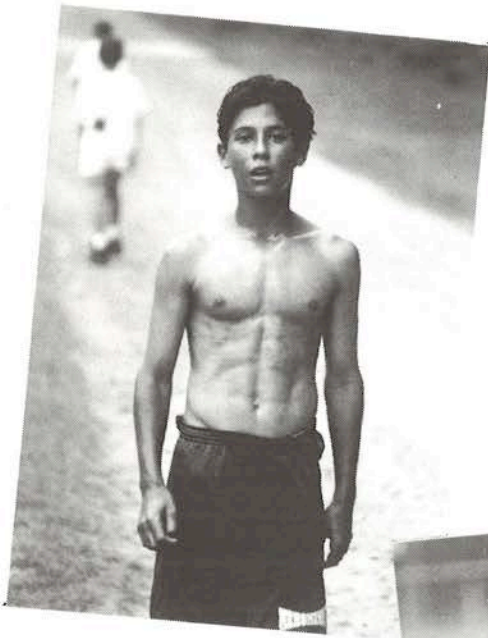

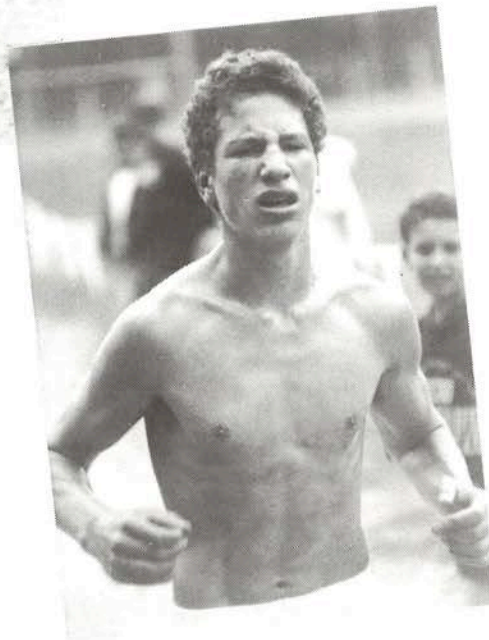

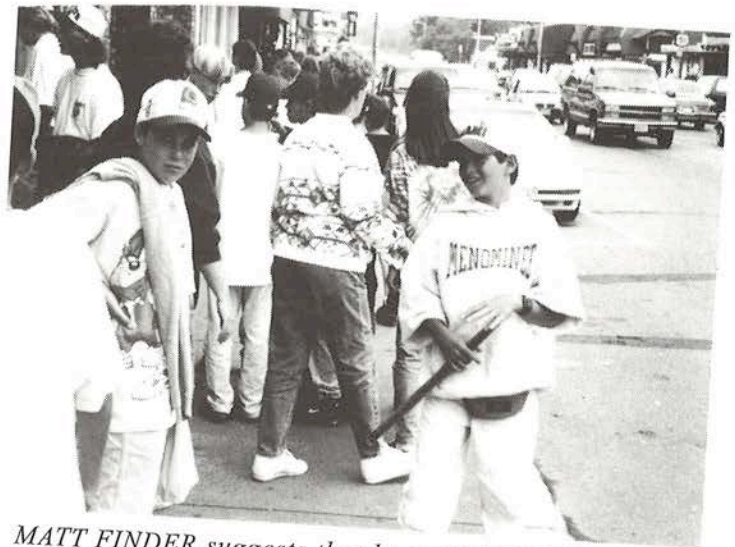
Looking around the shops took a long time. MATT HOLLANDER and BRANDON LEVY seemed very taken by the baseball card shop, as were many others. JASON

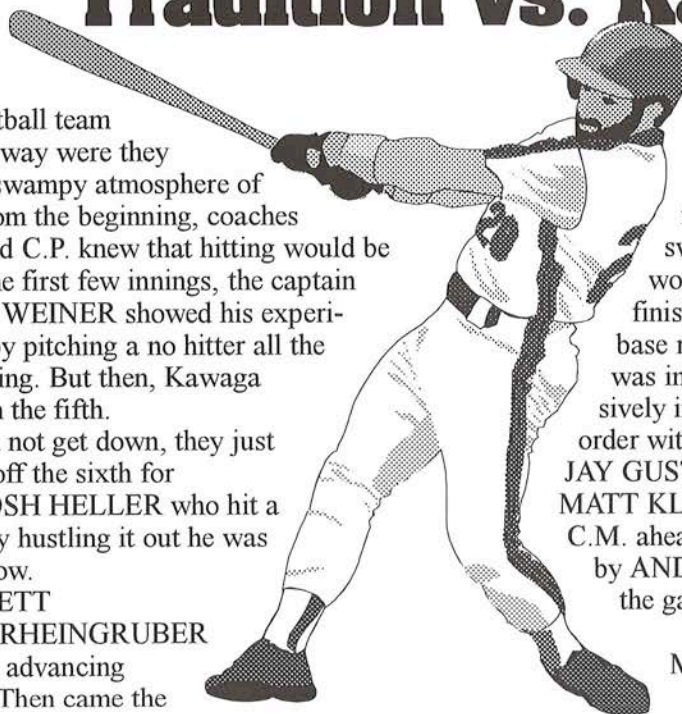
11A Upholds Softball Tradition vs. Kawaga

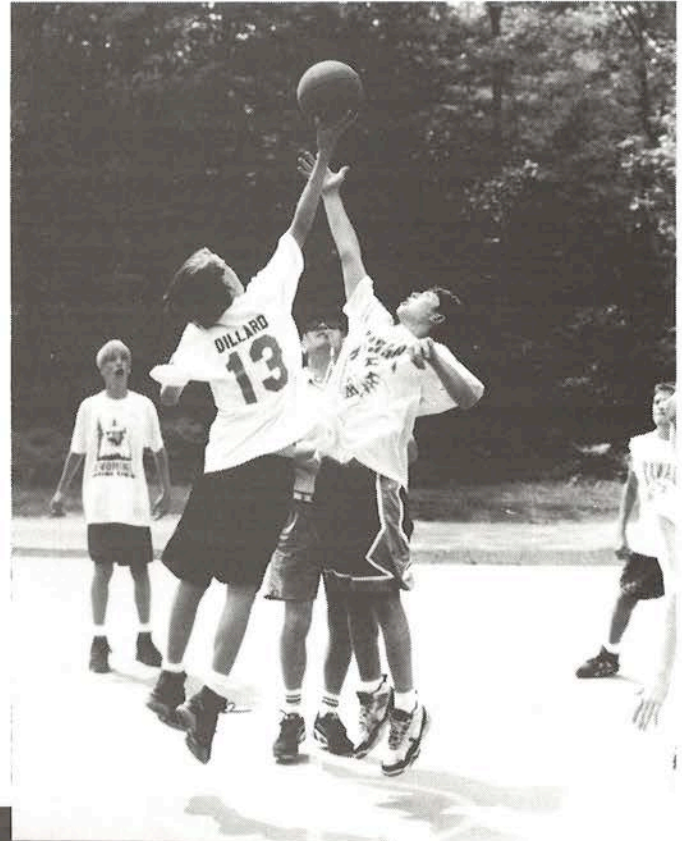

COLIN TAHI was the dominant player in the first half pouring in 18 points and controlling the rebounds.

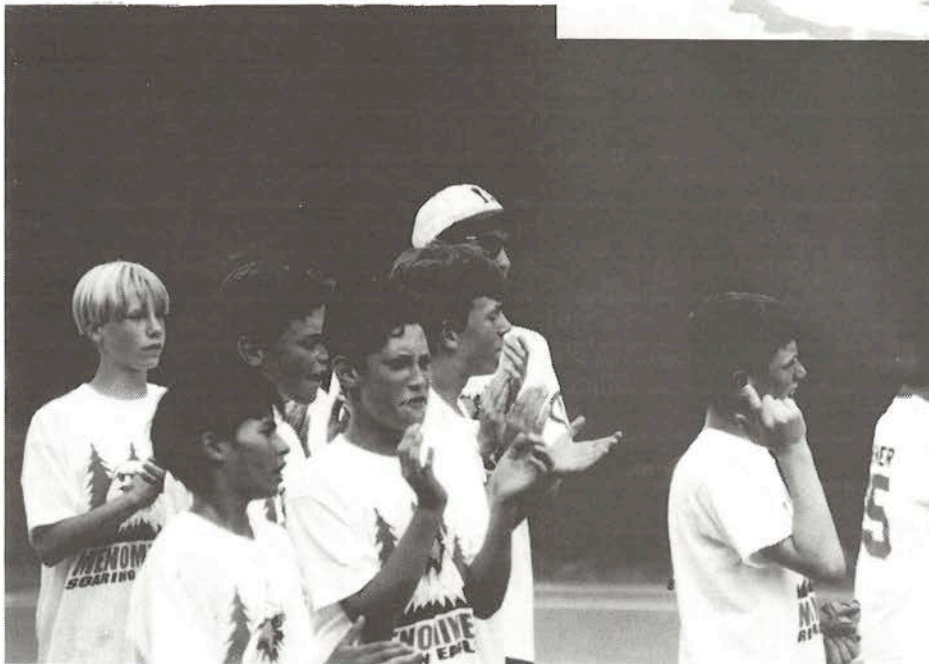

^ COLIN TAHI wins the opening tip

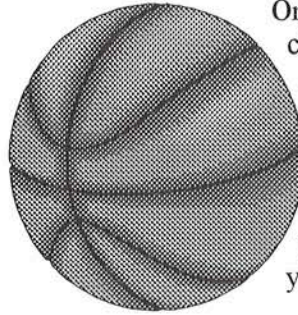

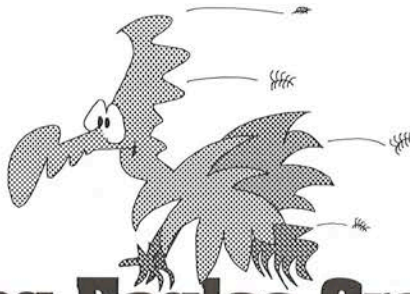
13A Tripped-Up

SCHAFF'S CLUTCH FREETHROWING SOARS EAGLES OVER KAWAGA

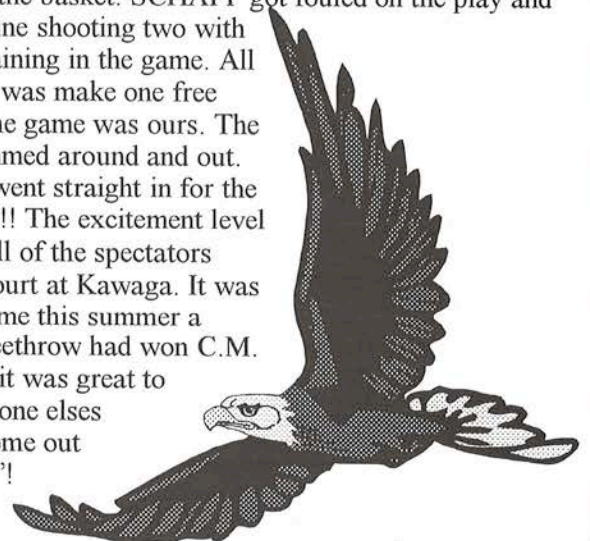
“H”—

MTP Is A "Classic"

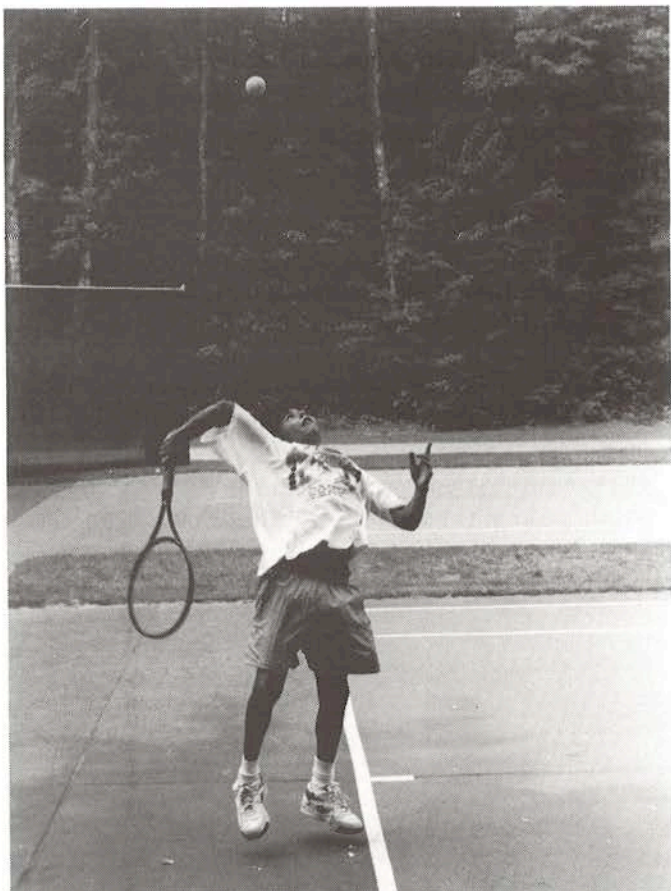
TONE—

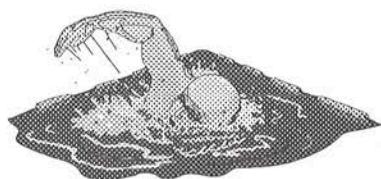
A highlight of the year's MCAA Tennis Tournament was the great turn out.

All of the competitors showed up on the shores of Sand

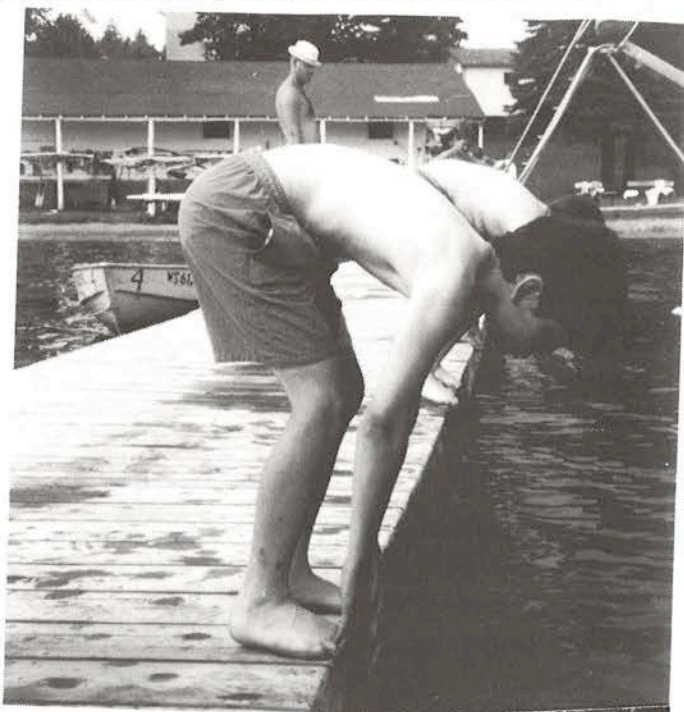

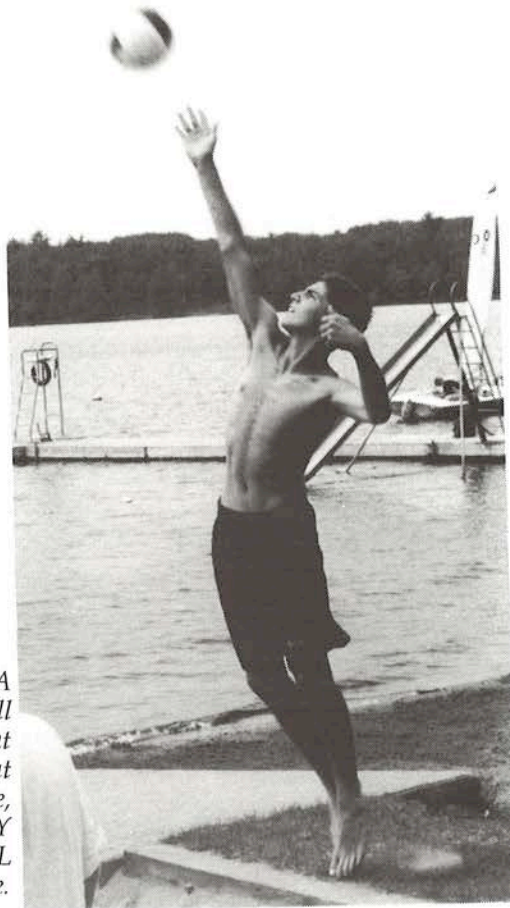

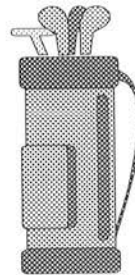

MCAA Golfers Vie For Trip To Eagle River Country Club

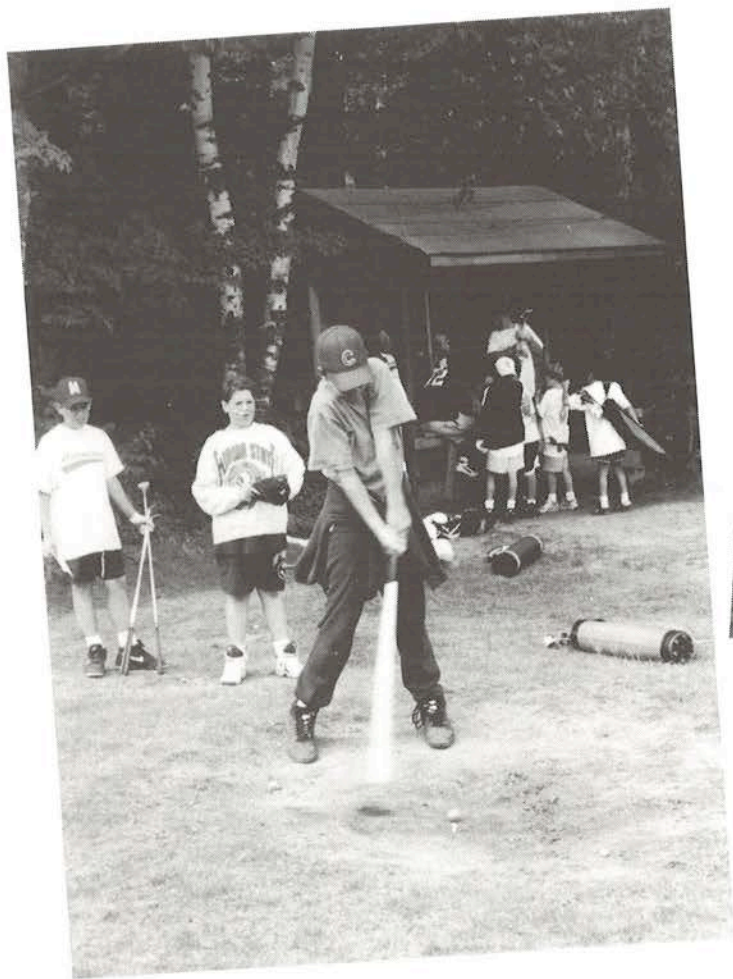

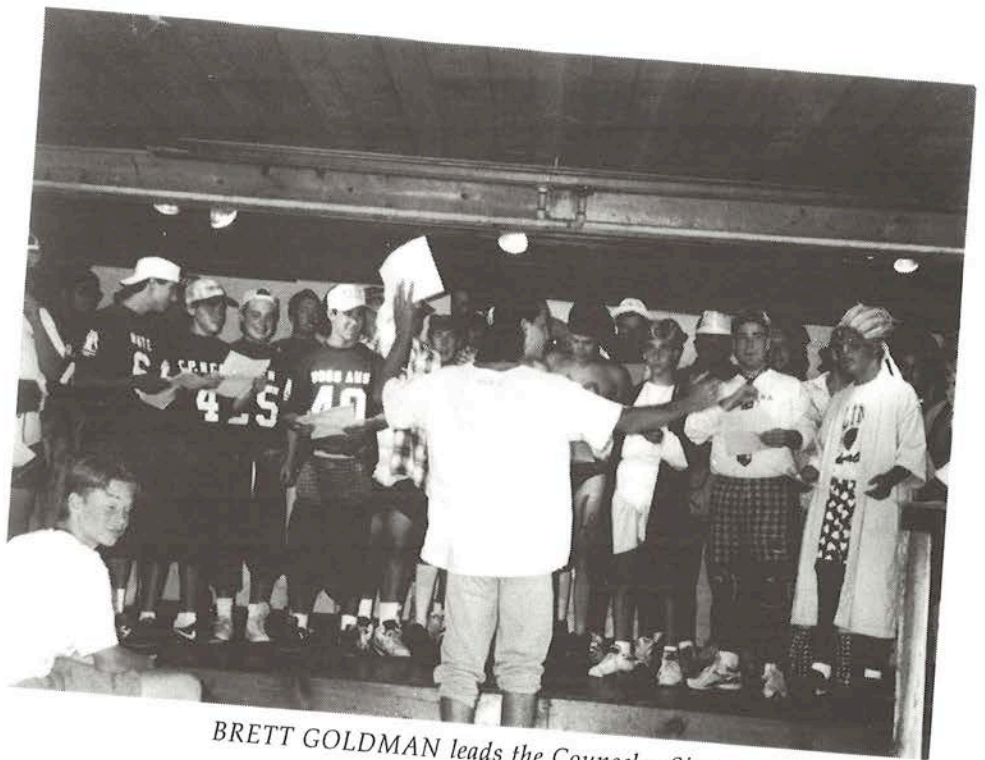


The Greens, with the Eagle as their mascot, sang their way to victory.

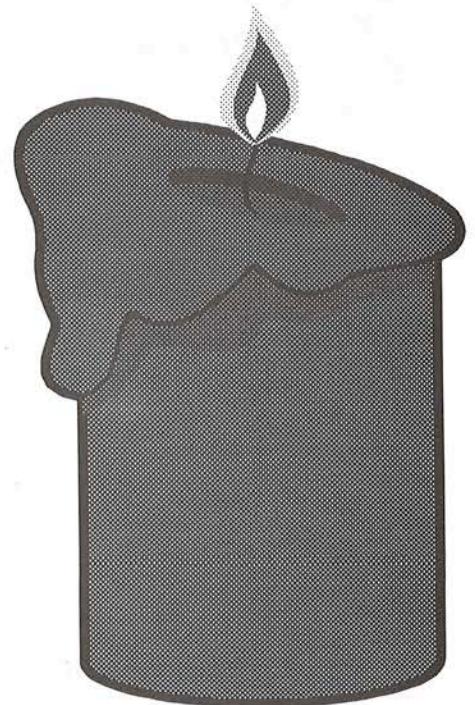
