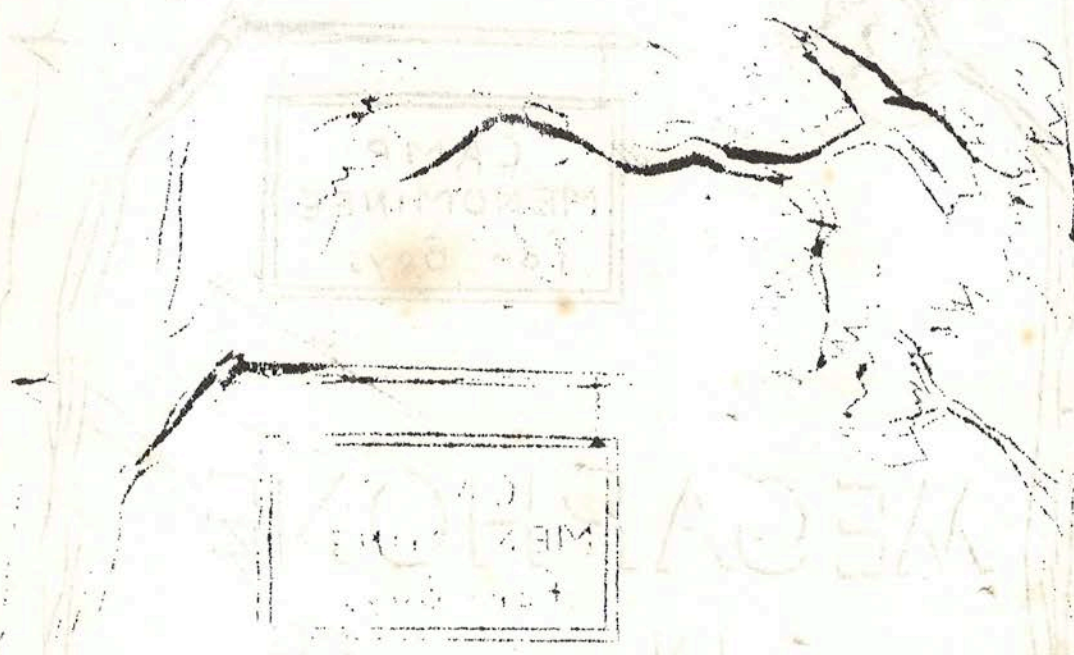



AMERICANS WIN BLOODY BATTLE

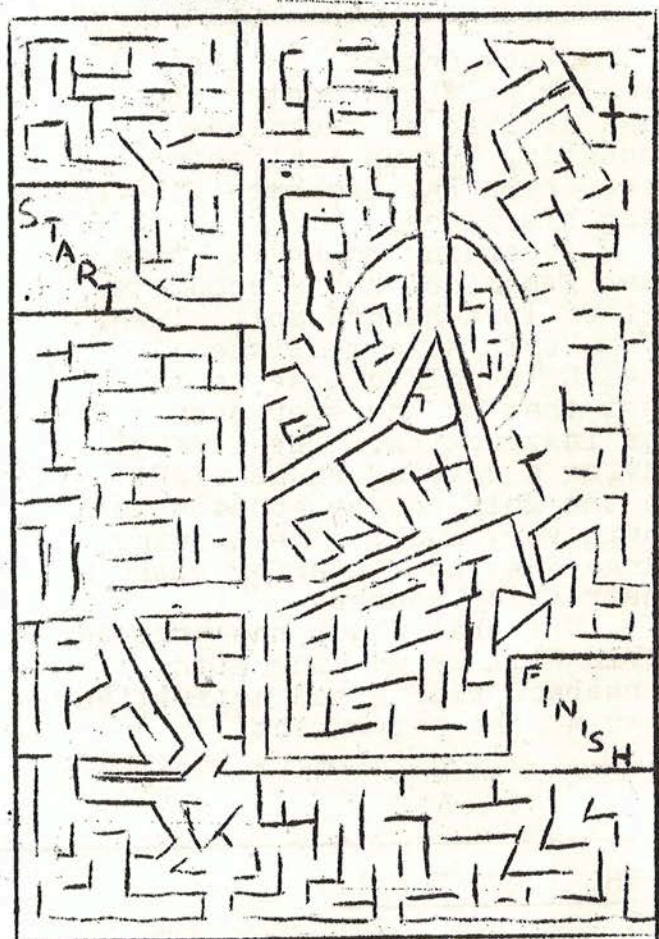

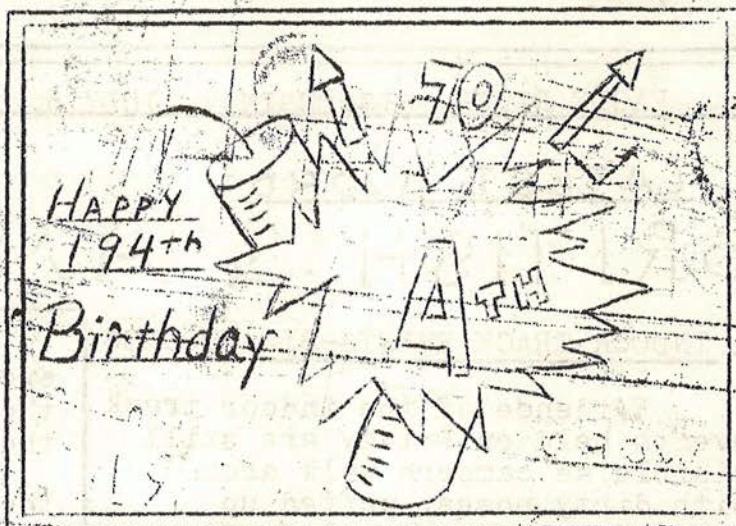
FIREWORKS LIGHT C.M.

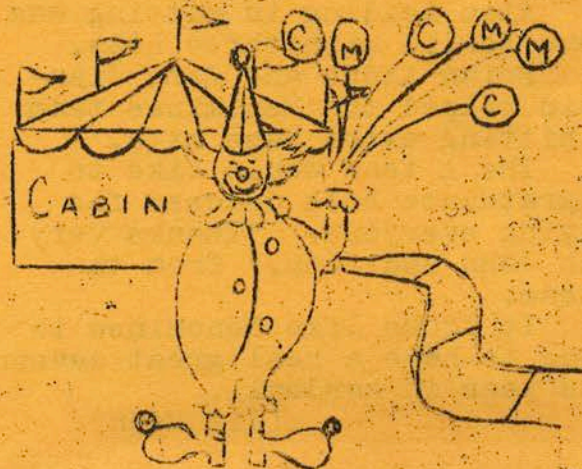

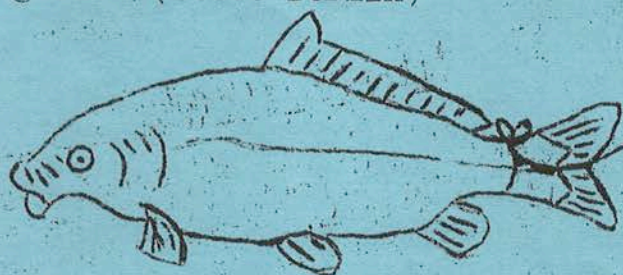
The Hot Dogs played a very good game only giving up four hits. Jeff Ruby pitched a very consistent game.

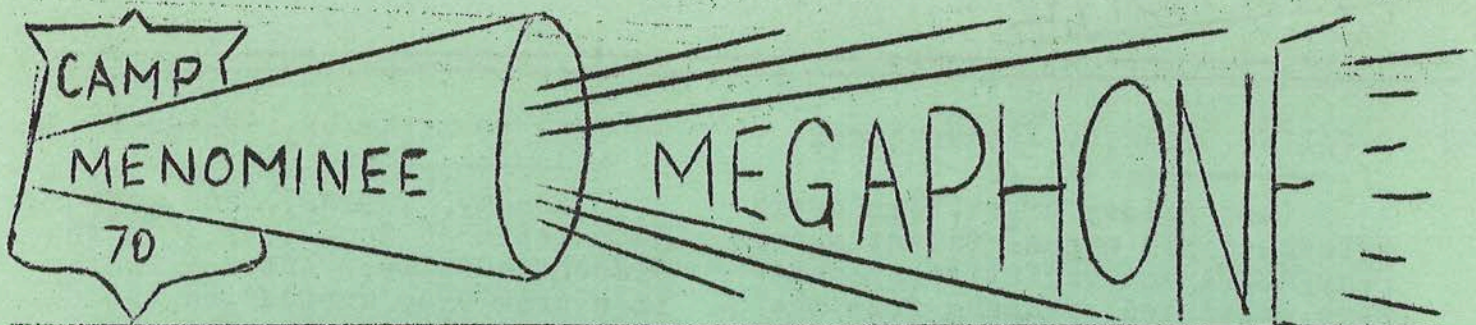
How About Some Pop!

After the boat trip the group went swimming in the motel pool, to dinner, and then to a movie.

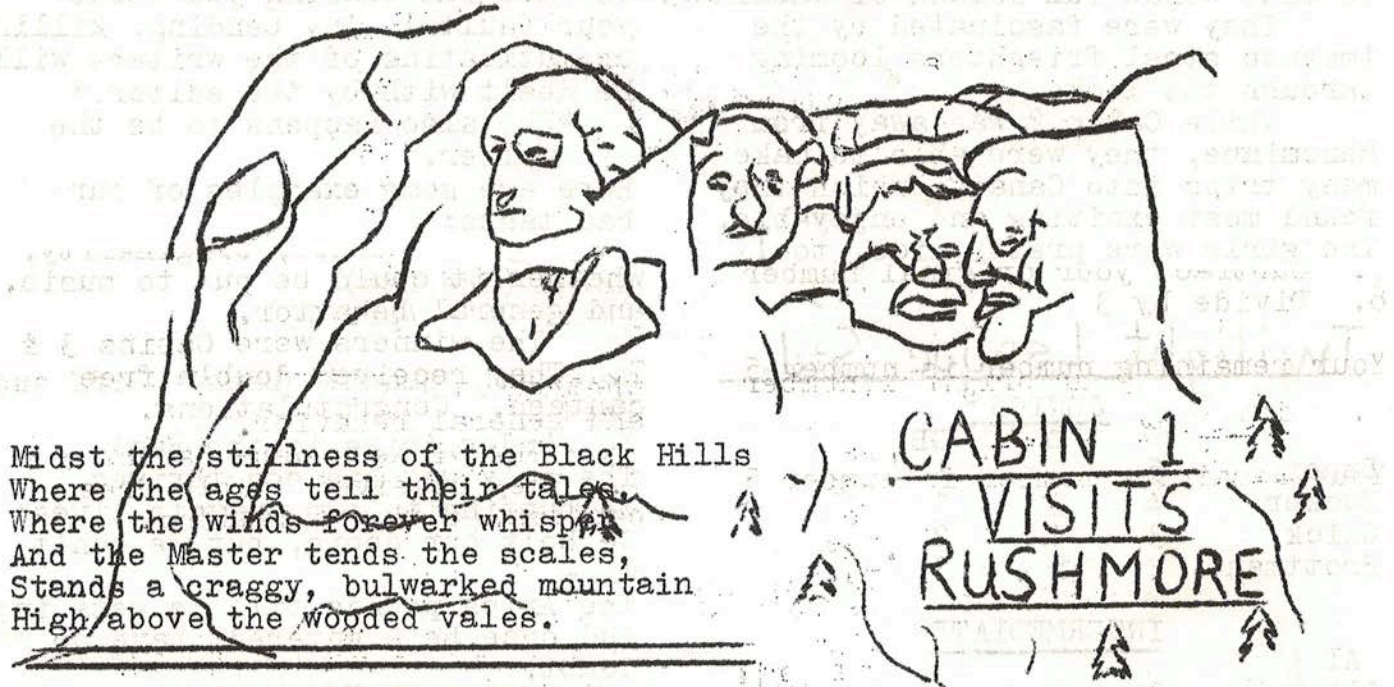
