
Both teams did good job in sending the enemy to prison.



changed to Saturday so that the campers going to the Ski Show on







The Hot Dogs played a very good game only giving up four hits. Jeff Ruby pitched a very


consistent game.



The boat made three stops and at one of them a dog leaped from one cliff to the other selkoe, the space between them being 5 feet, 9 inches.


After the boat trip the group went swimming in the motel pool, to dinner, and then to a movie.




