## BRITISH AND AMERICANS TIE!

The Americans led the first offensive in Message to Garcia. Their strategy proved more effective as they won this first event despite a powerful British attempt in the second offensive.

Friday morning saw Menominee in a flurry of activity in Message to Garcia, but the afternoon was no less active as the captain's duels took place. In this competition division captains engaged in "water balloon duels." The Americans, wet but unruffled, emerged victorious from this. Immediately following the duels, there was the all-camp water fight on the golf course. High spirits caused several penalties on both sides, but when the results were found, the British had won.

Saturday centered around field events including sack relays, wheel barrow relay, basket ball relay, the notorious Dizzy Izzy and steal the bacon. Also there were waterfront events. These included canoe sculling, towel relay, basketball relay and rowboat relay. Field events were won by the British, bringing them to a tied position with Americans. When the result of the entire competition rested on the water front games, they came to a perfect tie.

British-American Competition ended in a tie, the first in Menominee history. For some this was a disappointment after the excitement that surrounded the days of competition, but most campers were not so unhappy when double free canteens were given to everyone. "To the victor belongs the spoils," then everyone won in British-American Competition at Menominee this year.

A second game was held on July 4 between the old counselors and the "young and un." This again was a defeat for the young as they went down 16 to 15.

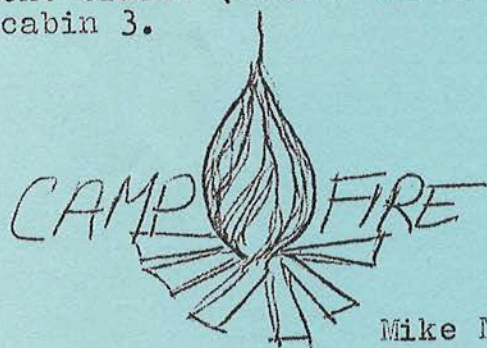
### MEGAPHONE ANNOUNCES CONTEST

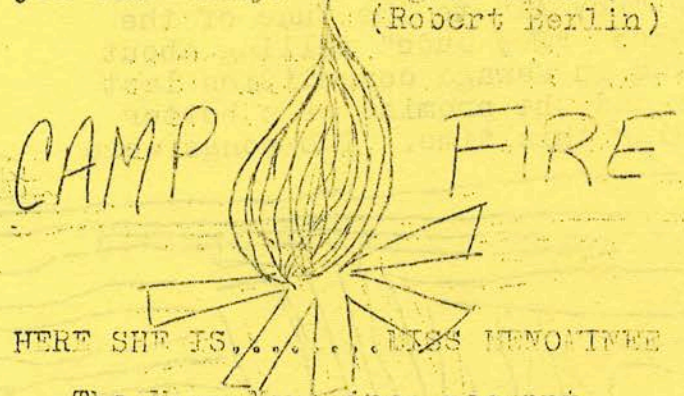

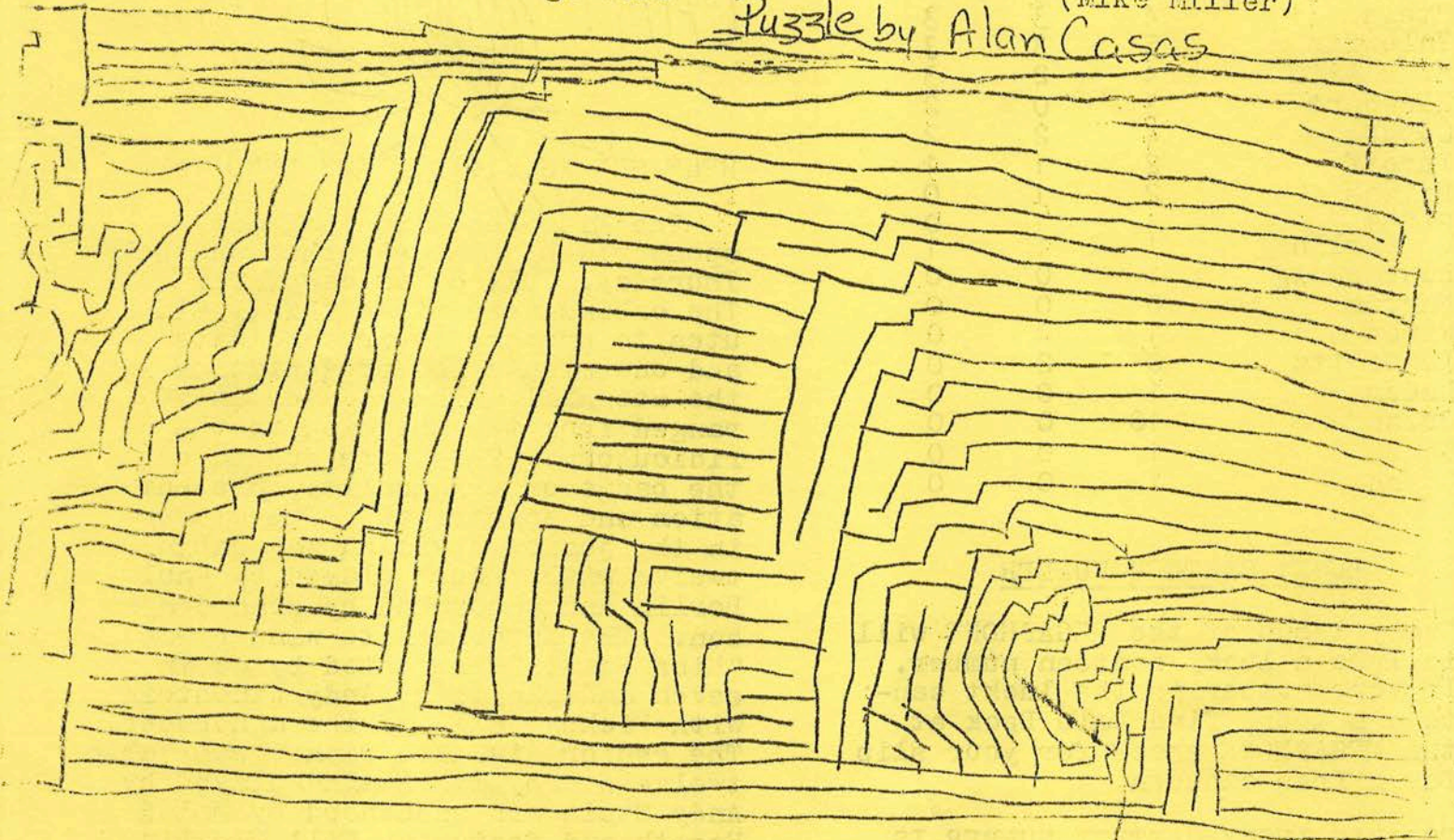
## CABIN SING

## TRIP WEEK A BIG SUCCESS!!

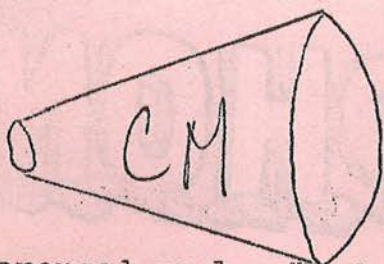
### "WE'RE FLEXIBLE"

## BOND-COPPER FALLS TRIP "A BLAST"

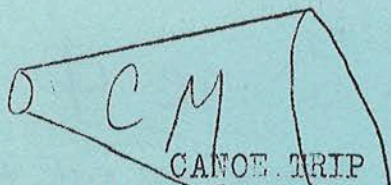

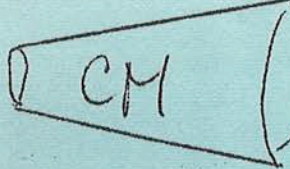

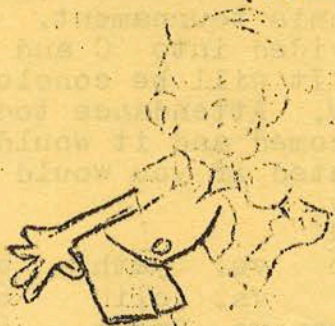
## PARENTS ENJOY VISIT

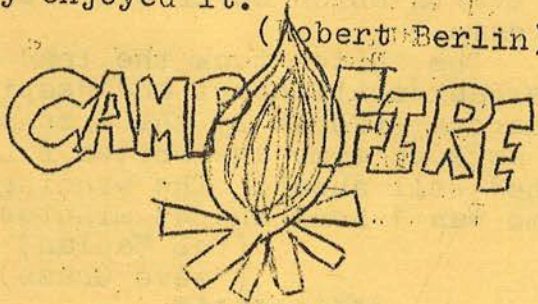
## Talent Show

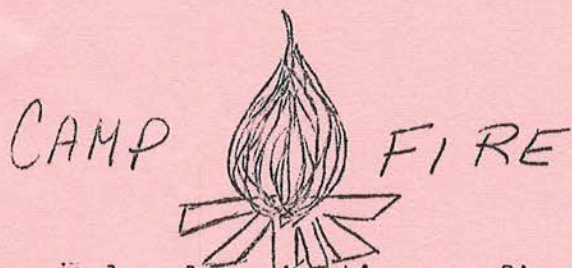
