




Camp Menominee has been invited by Kawaga to take part in a 16 and under Tennis Invitational to take place on July 6.

The tournament will be setup the same way as was ours last year. Each camp will send two singles players and two doubles teams to Kawaga.

Each match will consist of an eight game pro set with a twelve point tie-breaker at 8-8. The finals of the tournament will be a 10 game pro set with the same twelve point tie breaker at 10-10.

The tournament will be single elimination, with one point being awarded each camp for every win there players pick-up, with the exeption being two points awarded to the winners of the finals in both the singles and doubles. 

Events in the competition will include swimming for all age-groups, junior and intermediate softball, senior hardball, Archery, and Riflery for all age groups and tennis for all age groups.


The juniors and seniors will stay here at Menominee, while the intermediates travel to Mohawk.

I also believe that team ractices should be held during he day. Two advantages to lub days are that we have more ime for free play and longer ractices.



BRITISH AND AMERICAN COMPETITION

On Wednesday, the track and field and swimming contests were held. The British won easily in track, winning sixteen events to The Americans' seven. However, The Americans came back to tie at swimming, with three wins apiece. Only the 9,10,11, and 12year-olds competed in ewimning because rain washed out the other

divisions.

The remaining events were held on Thursday afternoon. First came the captains' duels. Each age group captain was given one or two water ballons to use against his conterpart on the other team. The final tally showed The Americans winning two events, The British winning one, with one tie. Therefore, The Americans were declared the winners of British and American for this year.




