The whole MENOMINEE team must be singled out for excellent play. Number one singles, Bob Mikell, took three of his four matches, one point downing the previously undefeated player from Towering Pines. The number one doubles team of Barry Handwerker and Neil Wyant exhibited some blistering net play after finding their opponents watching shots aimed by them.

The number two doubles team of Josh Leavitt and Henry Strub played some excellent tennis serving and volleying their way out a fine team from Kawaga in two of their matches.

The excitement reached its peak with the final match of the day which found number two singles player Mark Elman against an opponent from Ojibwa. If Ojibwa won they would be tournament champs but if MENOMINEE won the tournament would be thrown into a four way tie for first among MENOMINEE, Kawaga, Ojibwa and Towering Pines. The setting was tense as Elman played on center court with 150 spectators cheering him on as Kawaga's hopes for the shared championship rested on a victory for MENOMINEE. It is perhaps the first and last time Kawaga will ever cheer for Menominee.

The match see-sawed back and forth with controversial calls often interrupting play. With games tied 5-5 and Elman leading 40-30 he slammed a forehand into the back hand corner winning the match for MENOMINEE. The entire team rushed onto the court to congratulate their tired teammate. MENOMINEE came away with the satisfaction and pride that the shared first place title could not adequately reflect.

### MACKINAC TRIP

This year, the fourteen year old cabins again went on a four day trip to Mackinac Island and Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Cabin two left early on Sunday, July 6 and returned on Wednesday while cabin one, which this story is about, left just after breakfast on Wednesday, and returned on Saturday afternoon.

Immediately, we set out for Iron Mountain in Iron Mountain, Mich. This was a big supplier of iron ore until it closed down in the mid-1940's, but now this is a tourist attraction. We went through the mountain in a train on our guided tour. Our guide demonstrated the machinery used for mining and showed us the places where there were big strikes of iron ore.

After this, we stopped for lunch and went on to St. Ignace, Mich. After seeing what was in town, we had dinner in a little pizza restaurant, and decided to drive to our hotel in Sault Ste. 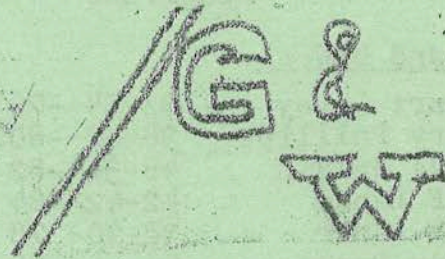

11:20 P.M. The burning of Joe Kawaga begins.

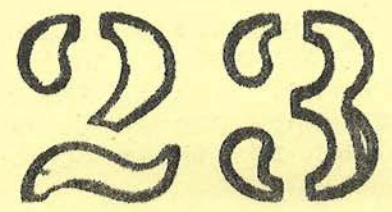
11:22 P.M. Joe Kawaga falls dead into the fire.

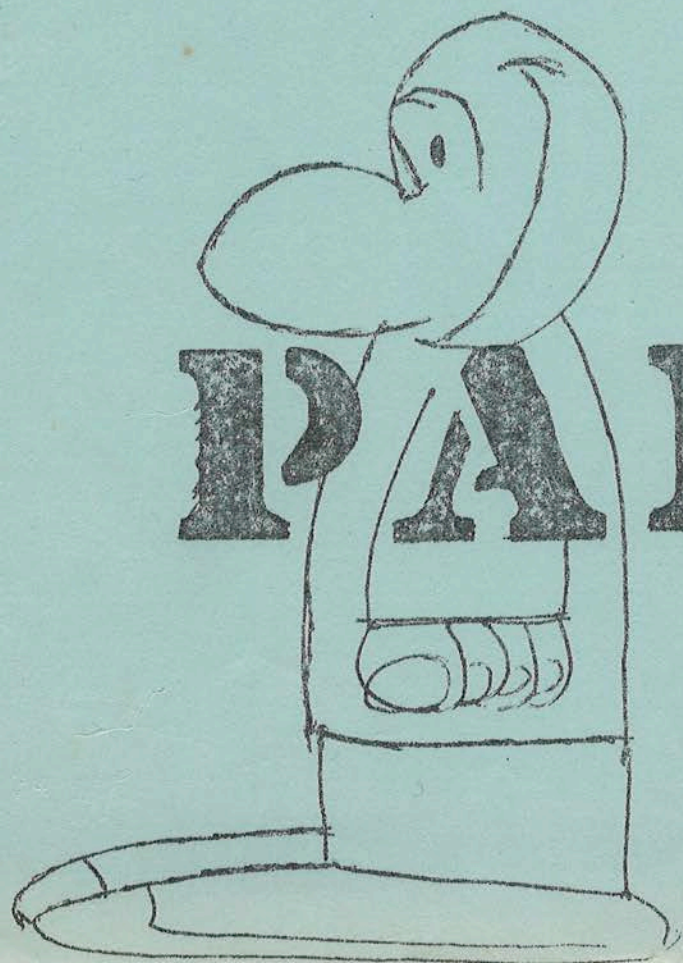

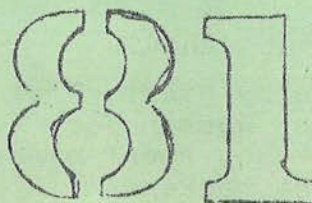

## CAMP MENOMINEE, 'THIS IS YOUR LIFE

\*Editors Note: Anywhere in this article that the quote appears in all caps, it is Nate Wasserman talking.

Camp Menominee began in Rhinelander, where Camp Mohawk is now located. WE STARTED CAMP MENOMINEE IN RHINELANDER APPROXIMATELY ABOUT 1930. WE STARTED ON A PRETTY NICE PIECE OF GROUND AND WE HAD ABOUT 2000 FEET OF SHORELINE AND THE CABINS WERE SET ALONG THE LAKE. WE STARTED WITH A SMALL MESS HALL AND 4 CABINS AT A SITE RIGHT ON BASS LAKE AS THEY CALLED IT, AND IT WAS FOR A BEGINNING VERY NICE. WE HAD APPROXIMATELY 22 BOYS THE FIRST YEAR. CAMP DEVELOPED OVER A PERIOD OF YEARS AND THEN IN THE EARLY THIRTIES WE HAD A DEPRESSION. OUR ENROLLEMENT WAS VERY SMALL AROUND 30-40 BOYS. OUR FIRST BIG YEAR-WE STARTED TO SEE A LITTLE DAYLIGHT IN 38 and 39. GRADUALLY WE BUILT UP THE CAMP DOWN THERE. BETWEEN 44-46 WE HAD ABOUT 110 BOYS.

" IN 1946 WE BOUGHT THIS PLACE FROM THE COMISKY'S AND IN 47 WE BUILT THIS CAMP, WE WORKED THROUGH THE WINTER GETTING IT READY FOR THE YEAR OF 47. THAT SAME YEAR WE OPENED MARIMETA SO WE HAD BOTH A BOYS AND GIRLS CAMP!"

The original buildings on these grounds consisted of Part of the Main lodge, the infirmary, the rec hall, the garage, and a tool shed which was enlarged to become what is now cabins 13 and 14. Cabins 1-8 were built from lumber found on the grounds, and the other cabins were also built before camp opened here in 1947.

Some of the activities that were continued at the new grounds were Twilight League, Camper-Counselor day, and a shortened version of Green and White.

Alan Wasserman returned from the army after the 1952 season, and a year later married Elaine who was a former Marimeta counselor.

## THE MEGAPHONE

Camp Menominee developed slowly into the camp we now have. In 1956 British and American competition began, as an attempt to add excitement to the first few weeks of camp.

The tradition of the Green and white sing began in 1959 as the idea of several counselors who had participated in such an activity for their fraternity.

"A CAMP IS NOT ONLY ATHLETICS. A CAMP SHOULD HAVE MANY INTERESTING ACTIVITIES IN WHICH EVERY CHILD IS ABLE TO PARTICIPATE. WHEN YOU HAVE A SING EVERYBODY IN CAMP PARTICIPATES AND THAT'S THE IMPORTANT THING."

Over the years MENOMINEE has played many other camps in competition. Our major competitors have been Ojibwa, Kawaga, and most of all Interlaken. MENOMINEE has won more competition throughout the years than we have lost. In our annual (since '66) rivalry against Kawaga we have won 5 and lost 5. Other camps we have played include: Towering Pines, Deerhorn, Red Arrow, Glen Eden, Nebagamon, Timberlane, Jackpine, Chippewa, Cherokee, Macabee, and Mohawk.

In little league hard ball competition Menominee has never had a losing season, which is an accomplishment in itself.

And so ends our re-cap of this part of Menominee's history. May she have many more years of happiness.

NOTE: THE MEGAPHONE WOULD LIKE TO THANK NATE AND ALAN WASSERMAN FOR GIVING UP A PORTION OF THEIR TIME TO HELP US WITH THIS ISSUE.

The original Camp Menominee MEGAPHONE was began at the Rhinelander site. Nate describes it:

"WE HAD SOME ENTERPRISING YOUNG MEN WHO WANTED TO PUT OUT A MENOMINEE MEGAPHONE, AND WE THOUGHT IT WAS WONDERFUL. WE STARTED IT AND A LOT OF TIMES WHEN WE PASSED IT OUT TO THE CHILDREN, IN THOSE DAYS, THEY SENT HOME THE NEWS ABOUT CAMP. IT WAS A WONDERFUL SET UP AND IT GAVE THE CAMPER AT THE END OF THE SEASON A RESUME OF WHAT THEY DID ALL SUMMER. IN THE LATER YEARS WHEN I WENT AROUND TO MANY OF THE HOMES MANY OF THE CAMPERS WHO NOW SEND THEIR CHILDREN STILL HAVE SOME OF THE OLD MENOMINEE MEGAPHONES!"

Today we of the Megaphone have no copies of this original paper. We do know that it ran through 1946's season.

The MEGAPHONE was re-organized in 1949 after a two year lapse. The MEGAPHONE has since appeared every year at this location. Smart counting arrives you at the conclusion that this is the 27th year of the paper. Why then you ask does this annual have a big 25th anniversary cover? It seems that about ten years ago David Finch (who has an article on the next page) lost count!! Both the 1964 and 1966 Megaphones are marked as Volume 16. We don't know what happened in 1965, as we have no annuals from that year.

Can anyone help us by supplying any information about the original Megaphone from the Rhinelander location or any megaphones from 1950-1955, 1961, or 1965? If anyone can help us please send any information to Michael Miller, at the address listed at the end of this article.

This list is as complete as our information will allow, however we are missing results from before 1949 and from 1950-1955.

THE MEGAPHONE from start to finish 1963, by David Finch.

Probably the distinguishing feature of CM's MEGAPHONE, is the fact it is run by boys for boys. Our editor, Denny Shlais, supervises, a fine group of boys who get the news as it happens. But the lifeblood of our paper is the efficiency and order and how it's run.

First, the news is reported by one of some 25 to 30 reporters. Interviews, standings, comments, etc., are included for the enjoyment of the reader. Then, the swift hand of a reporter gathers all his notes and writes up the article in its near-final form.

The reporter goes to the Megaphone office and hands his work to the editor. Then the editor gives the article to a proof reader who reviews the work, changes spelling, punctuation, and English. Then if the article is approved by the editor it is placed with the articles that will appear in the paper. The editor then organizes the ok'd articles in a special order and types them up on a Mimeograph stencil. Drawings, lettering and any work that can't be produced by a typewriter need a steady hand of an expert engraver to produce the image on the delicate stencil. This work, and other technical work is usually done by Denny only.

The final step to the long process of organizing the paper is printing. The stencil duplicating process called mimeograph is used by the Megaphone. In about 10 minutes after the stencil is placed on the machine the finished Megaphone is ready for circulation. In another 10 minutes Camp Menominee has their paper.

THE MEGAPHONE from start to finish 1975, by Mike Miller

Probably the most distinguishing feature of this years MEGAPHONE is that it is being published three times a week. We are able to do this easier than our predecessors do to a new process that we have been using since 1972.

As editors Bob and I supervise a great group of boys who get the news just as it happens. These boys gather their information through firsthand observation, interviews, and the MEGAPHONE files as well as other sources.

Then the reporter gathers his information and correlates it into his final story. He then turns it into me, and I proof read it and make any necessary style corrections.

Then it is typed by either Bob or I, while necessary changes in content are made. This typing takes place on regular paper, and the entire issue does not have to be typed at one time, or on the same peice of paper. Any artwork needed for an issue may also be done in ink on any regular sheet of plain white paper.

After all the information for a certain issue is in its final form the process of lay-out may begin. The articles are cut out from their sheet of paper and arranged to fit a normal 8½ by 11 sheet of paper. They are then pasted down and taken down to Wass's cabin. Here a special machine cuts a stencil from this lay-out. The final step to this process is the actual printing of the issue, which is done on a Speed-O-Print 600 mimeo machine. The running off of the issue takes about 8 minutes and 10 minutes later camp Menominee has its new MEGAPHONE.

The first year of the new MEGAPHONE saw the beginning of several phrases that were used for many years. Among these were "What would \_\_\_ be without \_\_\_\_\_?" and "A Good Time was had by All"...

The first sidewalk to the bathhouse was laid in 1949... Radio station W-A-S-S was run by Mickey Lyons and friends in 1956 and 1957. This station broadcasted rock and roll music over the loudspeaker every rest period....

British and American competition began in 1956. The original main event was "The Battle of Dorchester Heights" held on the "Plains of Menominee". This event has been changed in to the present day ALL-CAMP SQUIRT GUN FIGHT...

H. BERLAND set his Lake Swim Record in 1958 with a time of 0:20:02...Our 1958 meeting with Camp Interlaken had age groups of eighteen and under, fourteen and under, and twelve and under..

Several plays have been presented at Menominee including: THE NEWSHOUND, COMIN' ROUND THE MOUNTAIN, THE HAPPY CAMP, ABRAHAM, DAMN KAWAGA, and A COUNSELOR ON HIS BACK...

The first Menominee Olympics (known then as the Marathon) was held in 1966. The winners were David Neidleman and Lew Klein...The first set of "WOULD YOU BELIEVE"s were printed in 1967..

The MEGAPHONE would like to thank the Wasserman's for a GREAT summer...

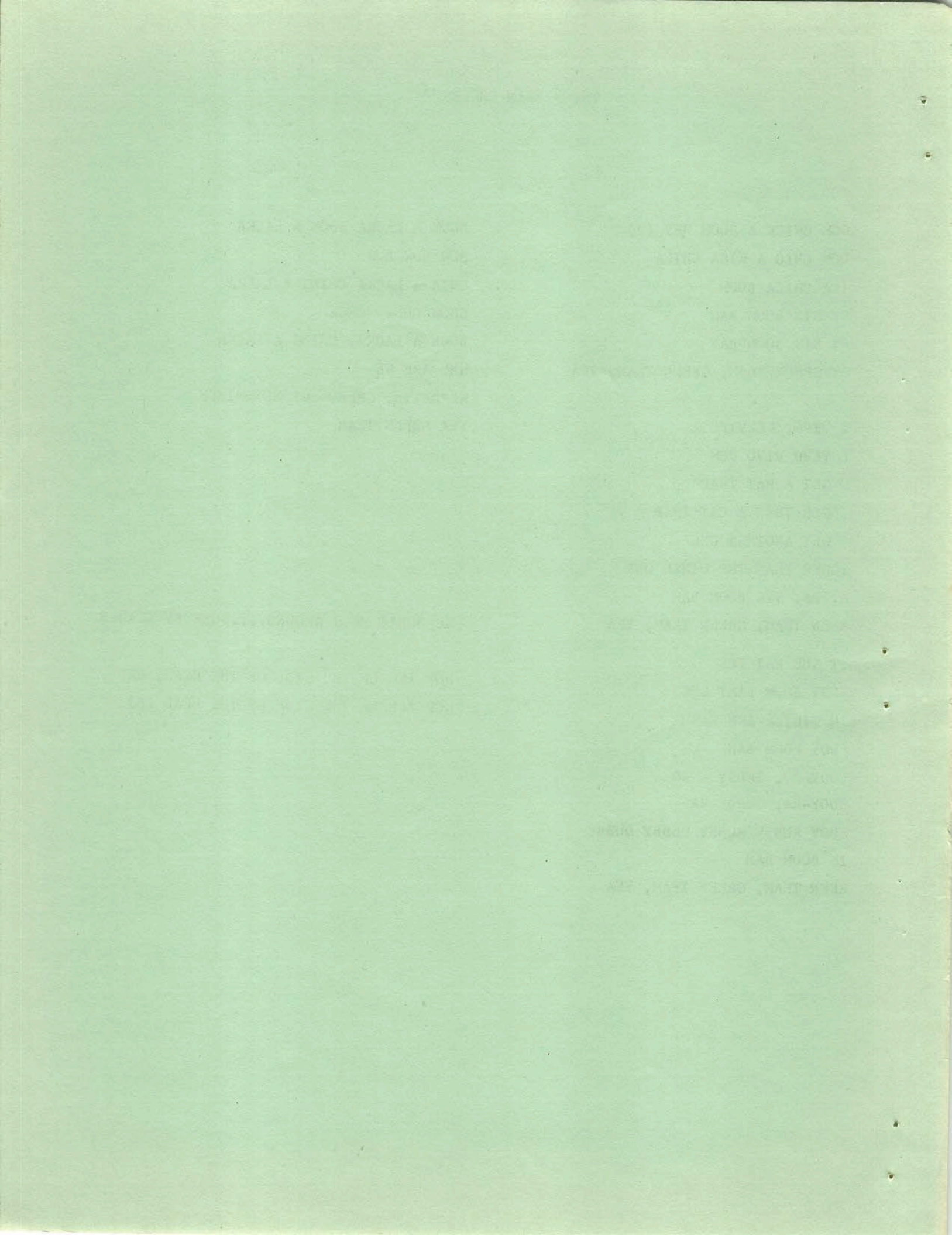

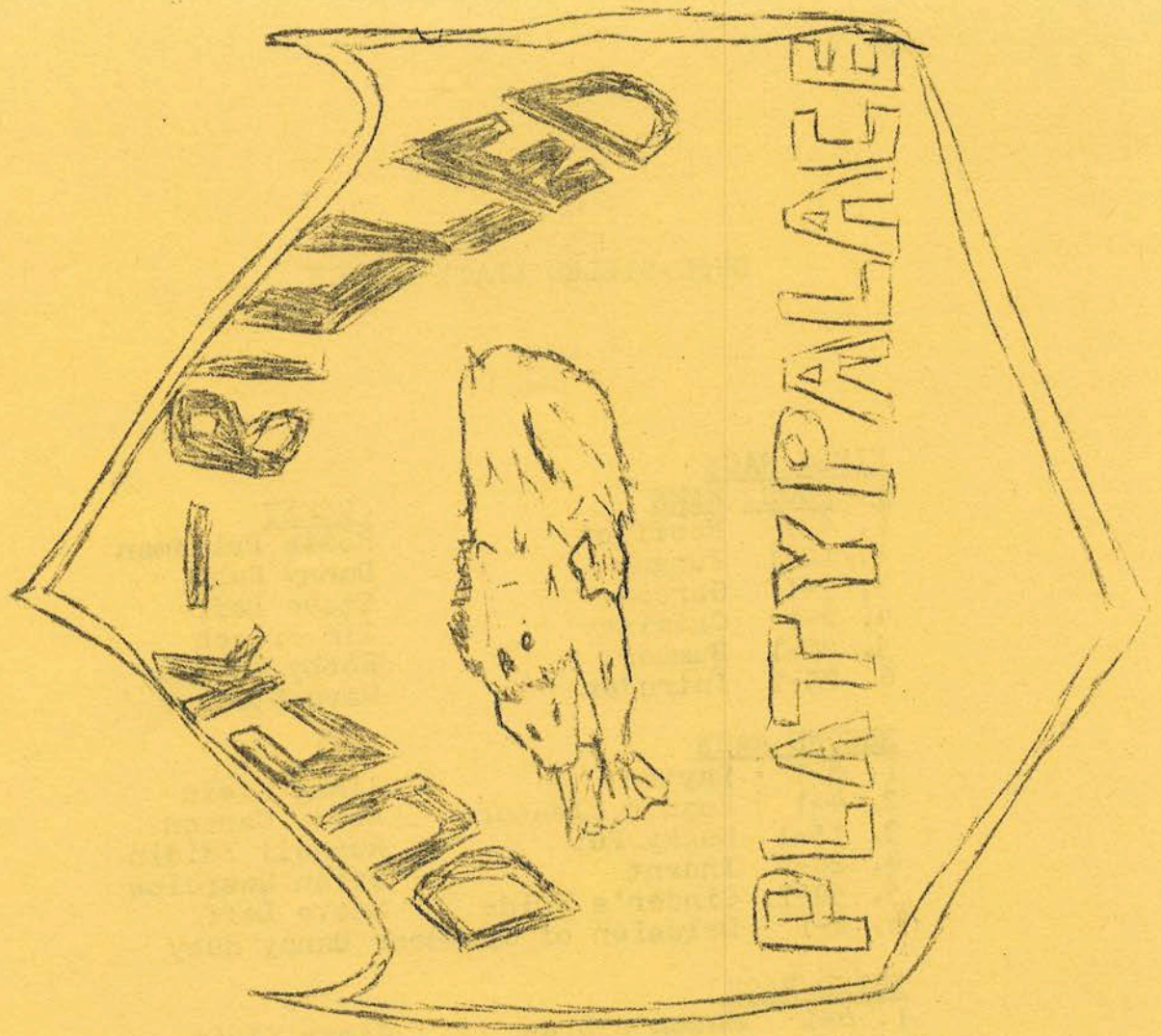
