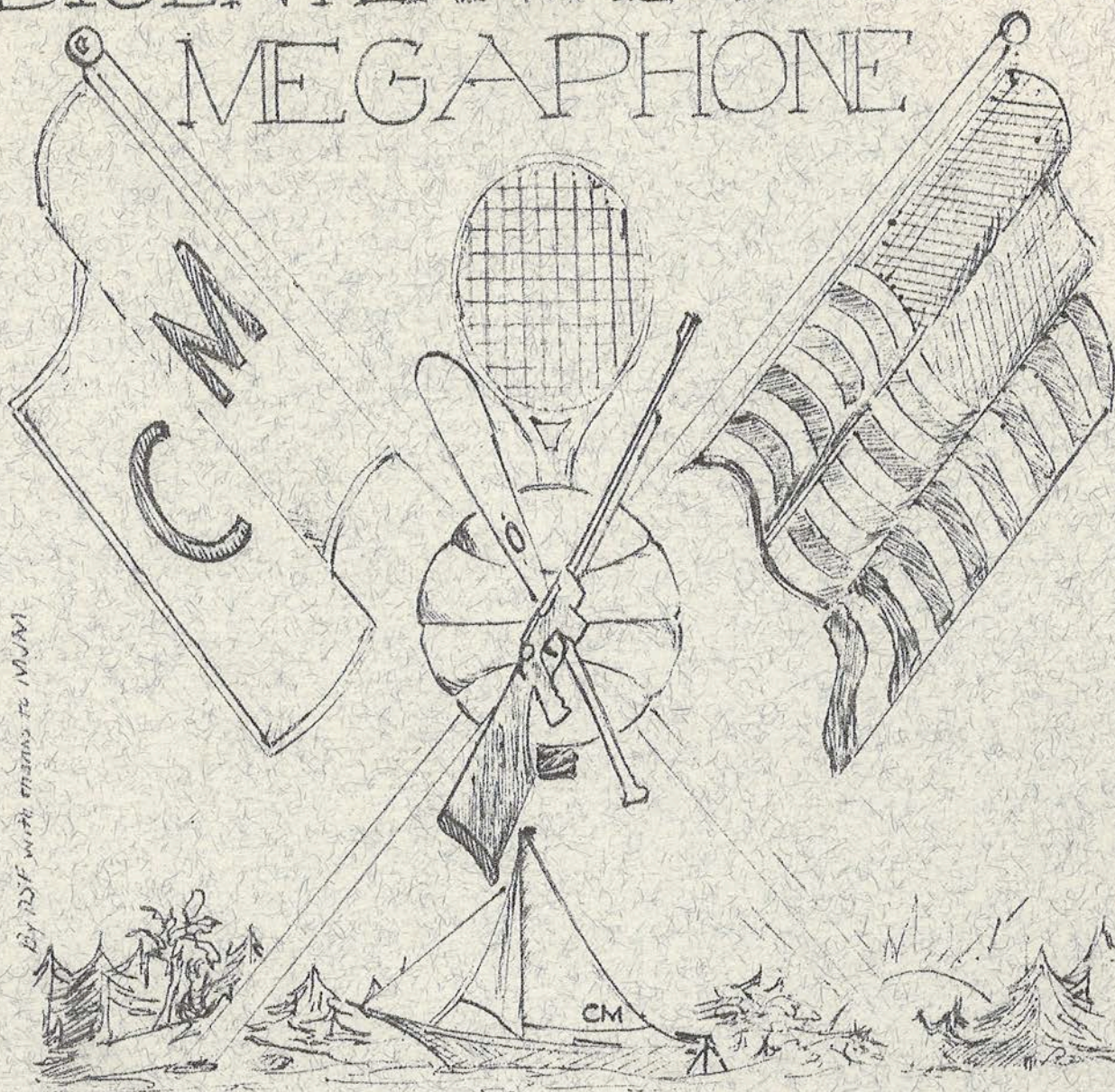

ACTIVITIES SCHEDULE

This year's activity schedule is basically the same as the one used last year, with 8 activity periods per week. Two of these will be in swimming, with one each in tennis, softball, and hardball. Campers will have 4 of these periods on the Monday-Wednesday-Friday schedule, with the other 4 on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

One project that they will be working on will be the construction of a jungle gym from wooden boards. Russ described this as "a lot of sawing and hammering - but a lot of fun."

"My first thought was that this boat had only been tipped once in the history of having it, and we made it two, so the head of sailing, Bob Speyer, would kill us. Bob was just then speeding towards us in his Sunfish. There we were in the middle of Sand Lake hanging on to the tipped boat for our lives, and praying out loud. Many ideas came across our minds such as swimming away and taking off for good, but we couldn't. About ten minutes later, Bob arrived. My first words were, "at least, the water's warm."

"Bob asked us if we were okay. We were. Bob told me to sail his boat to shore while he helped right it. I brought it in as I saw the motor boats speed out there and the crew helped get it safely back to shore."

"The first one on the scene was Bob Speyer in his sailboat. He took Danny back in his sailboat, so I was all alone hanging on the boat, cold and scared in the middle of the lake. Then in the distance I saw a boat coming. It was a Woodland motor boat that came to help us. Cohen came ripping in with Jerry Sider who jumped in without hesitation. Then more people came to the rescue. After getting the boat upright, I climbed into the motor boat and we towed it in."

In the midst of tragedies come heroes. Such was the situation in CMS Sand Lake last Tuesday when the camp's largest sailing craft, the Buccaneer, lay floundering among 3 foot waves and full gale winds. With the boat were two campers who were in a struggle for thier very lives. Meanwhile, Jerry Sider (18) was back on the shore at CMS water-

front when the news of the catastrophe arrived from a baffled ski boat driver. Jerry quickly took charge and arranged for the rescue party. Working like the professional that he is, he wasted no time for he knew that two young lives were depending on him.

Sider with the help of several other counselors was able to restore the boat to its righted position while he single-handedly saved the lives of one Dan Lazar (14) and one Lorne Blumenfeld (14).

Sider's bravery didn't stop there. He and two other counselors fought the elemnts of angry winds, vold, high waves, and fatigue for 1 whole hour to swim the boat back to Camp Menominee. Once Back to the saftey of land and cheering multitudes, Sider flashed a reasurring smile and was heard to say, "It's all in a day's work."

It was the morning of Wednesday, June 23, the first brisk morning of the season for the campers of Menominee. Sandy Cohen was patrolling the rough white capped waters of Sand Lake. Suddenly it came to his attention that a Menominee sailboat had tipped near Woodland. Due to the quick response of the head of water skiing, his boat was rushed to that vicinity. While on the way, he quickly stripped to his bathing suit and he and his partner dove in to the lake to add assistance. With the help of other counselors, Sandy led a dynamic rescue resulti in one injury to Bob Speyer's hand. Sandy, realizing that the sailboat was under control, rushed Speyer across the lake for emergency medical assistance. When interviewed Sandy said, "Well, it was just another average day for me at Menominee."

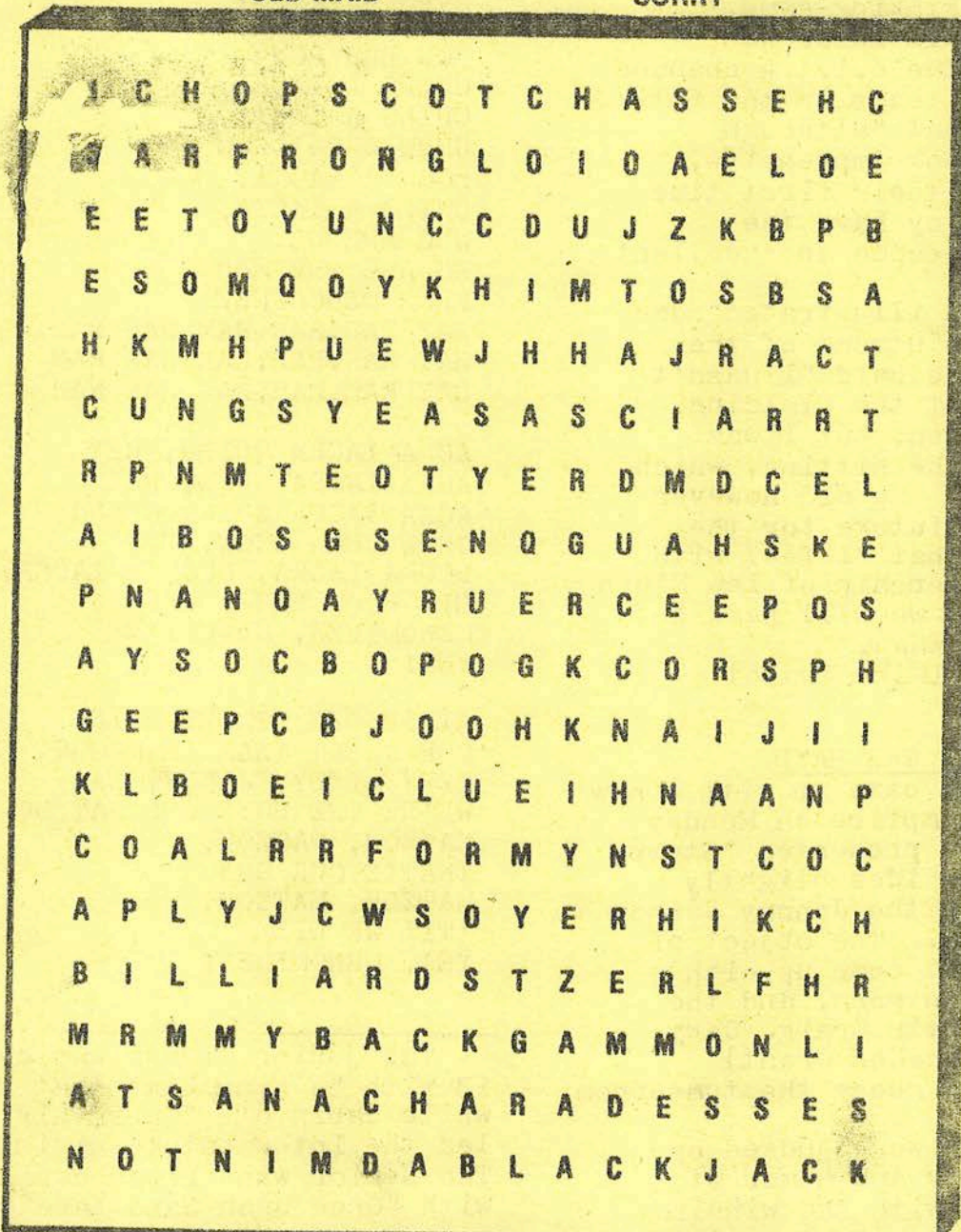

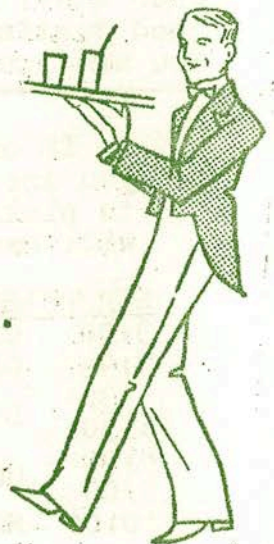

Ken Kawaga may be headed in that direction. They note that in the past, his brother Joe had been responsible for a great deal of damage to Menominee, and that his brother Ken may be out to continue in his footsteps.

THE UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO

RESEARCH REPORT

The following report was prepared by the author for the purpose of providing a detailed account of the results of the research conducted during the period from January 1, 1950, to December 31, 1951. The research was carried out in the Department of Psychology, University of Chicago, under the supervision of Professor [Name].

The primary objective of the study was to determine the effect of [Factor] on the performance of [Task]. The results of the study are presented in the following sections. BE TRIED TONIGHT*

Ken Kawaga, who is accused of plotting to sabotage Menominee's efforts against Camp Kawaga, will go on trial tonight in the recreational hall of Camp Menominee. Judge R. Lewis Loiben has been appointed by the Vilas County Court to sit on the bench for this weighty trial, which has been postponed for two days due to a motion from the defense.

Little has been said publicly by the defendant since his capture last Friday night. At that time, he was caught while allegedly trying to kidnap Ross Ampel from the Menominee messhall at dinner that night.

While Mr. Kawaga has not made any public statements since then, associates in

the Menominee prison are saying that he has become morose and silent in the last few days. One report alledged that Mr. Kawaga was not even able to speak do to intense depression.

District Attorney Marc Sharfman is very confident about his case, saying early this afternoon that "we have enough evidence to assure a verdict of guilty."

While the outcome of the trial is obviously not decided yet, the prosecution has put a great deal of work into the punishment, should Ken Kawaga be convicted and recieve the death penalty, which the prosecution will request. Should this be the outcome, Ken Kawaga will be burned at the stake at a fire built on the tennis court side of the mess hall. At press time, betting was said to be strongly in favor of this verdict.

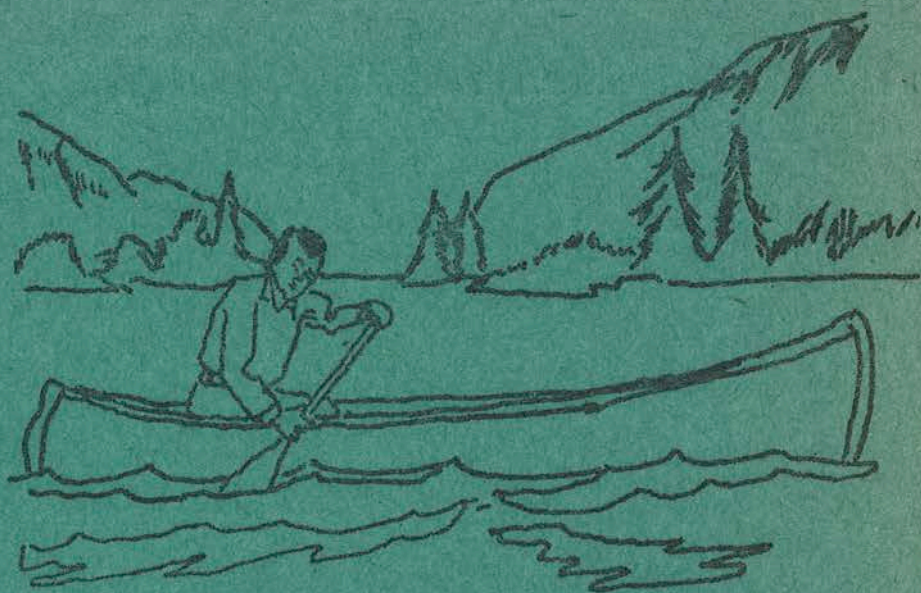

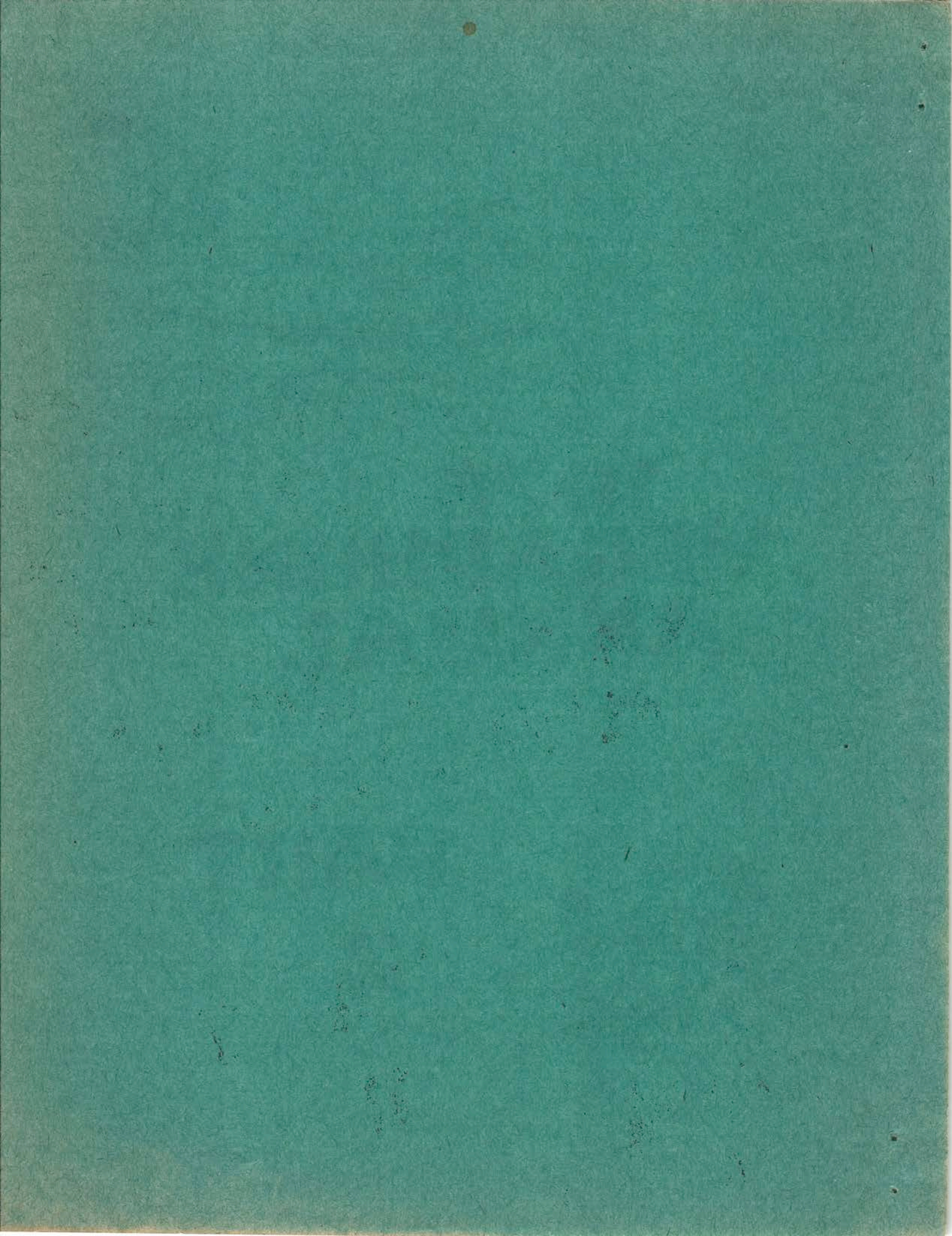

KAWAGA

The annual competition between Camp Menominee and Camp Kawaga was held on Friday, after many delays due to rain and other unavoidable problems. This year Camp Kawaga came out ahead, winning in eleven of the sixteen events, to snap a three-year winning streak held by Menominee.

Camp Kawaga showed much of its improvement in the six softball games, where they won three and lost three. This was Menominee's poorest showing in softball since 1972, where Kawaga won five of the six games. Last year, Menominee won five out of six.

The only area where Menominee showed improvement from last year was in tennis. While last year, only the 11 and under team was successful, this year Menominee scored victories with both the eleven and under and sixteen and under tennis teams defeating their Kawaga rivals. Although Kawaga won six of the seven matches in the thirteen and under age group, it was actually a much closer contest than this final score shows. Coach Gary Noskin said simply "the thirteen and under tennis team didn't have enough guts to win."

Kawaga did best in archery and riflery, where they won all four matches after splitting with Menominee last year, and in swimming, where they perennially are victors.

This competition was the eleventh annual between Menominee and Kawaga, in a rivalry which has been growing since the two first met in 1966. With this victory, Kawaga goes ahead in the contest, winning in six years to Menominee's five.

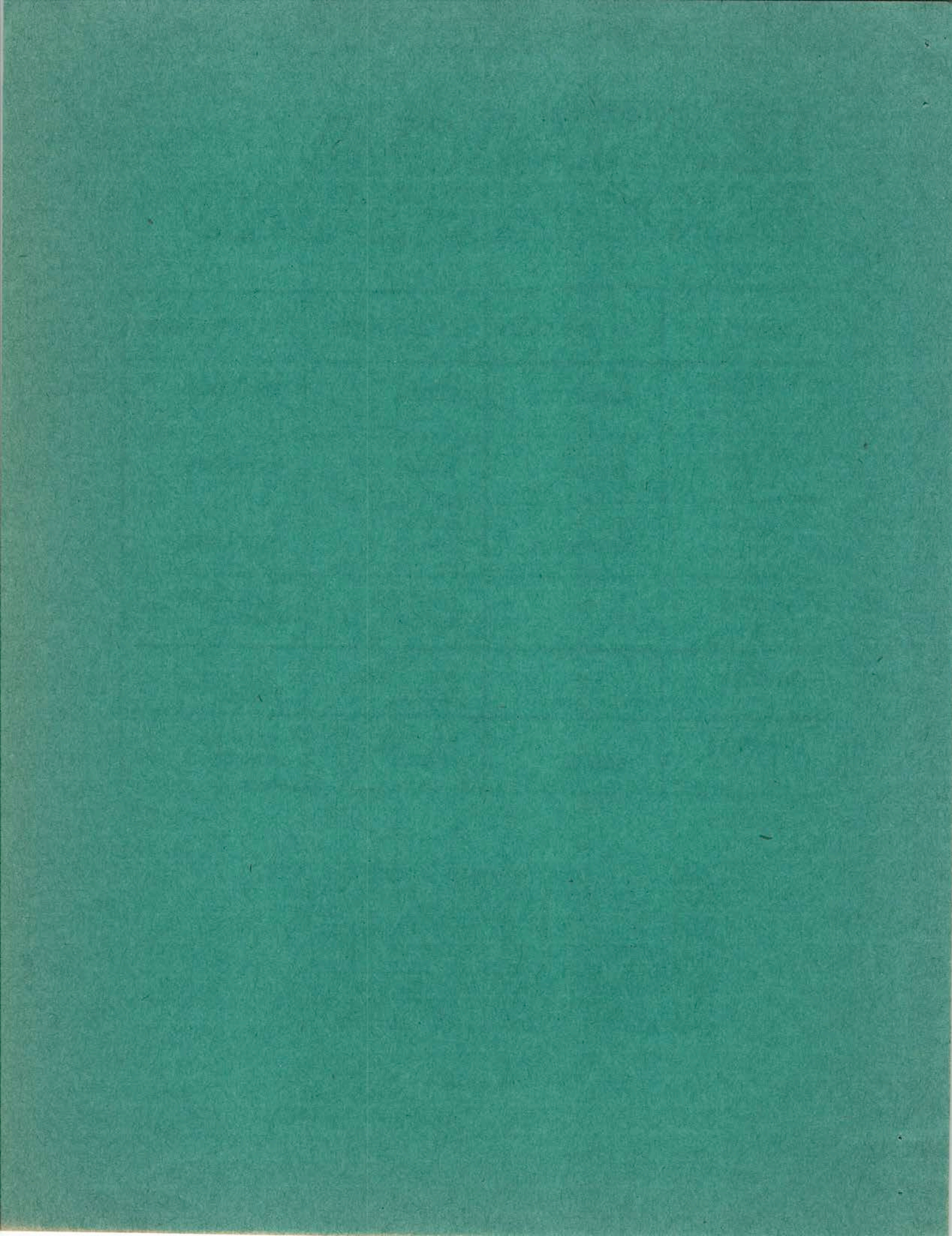

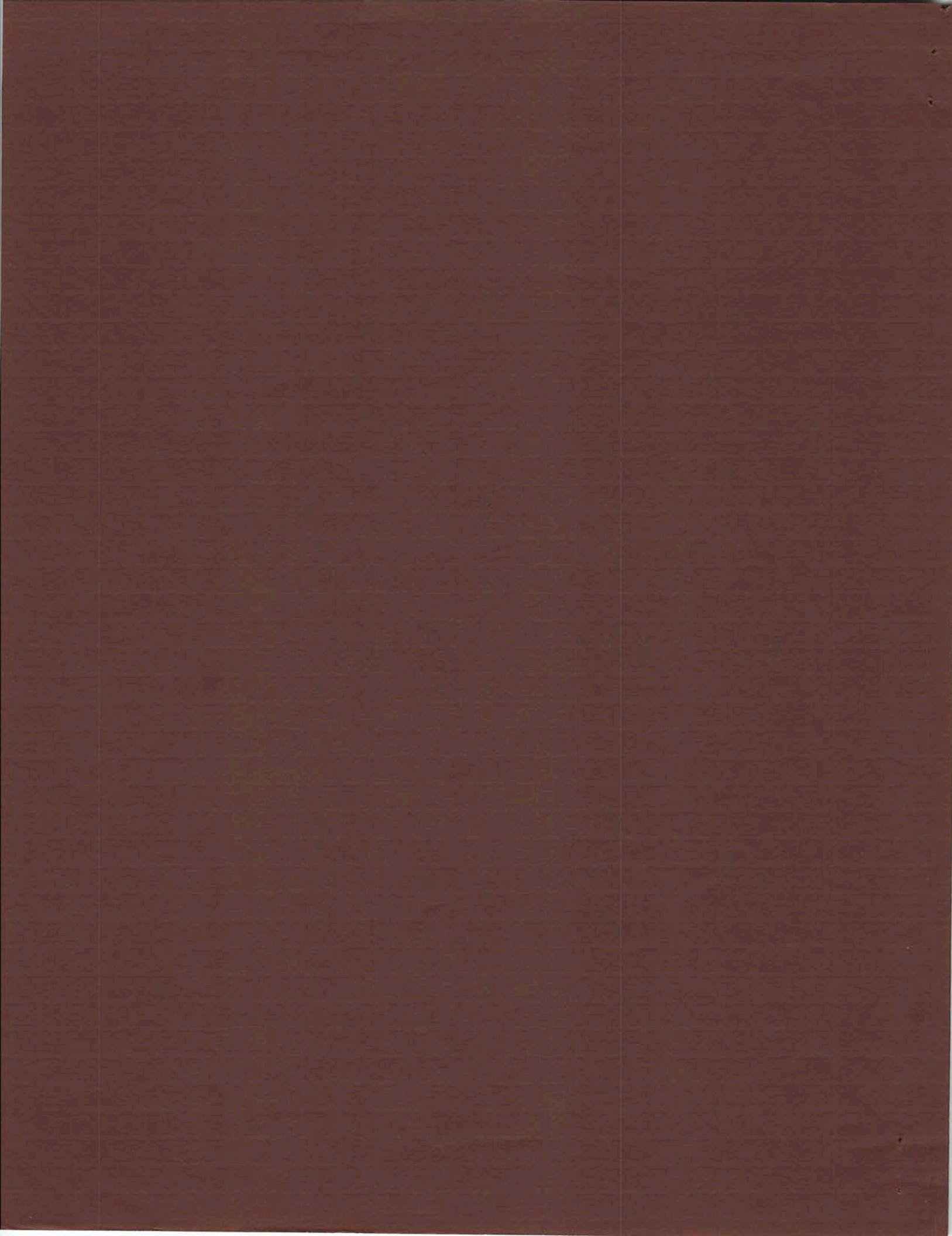
