BE NICE TO THE ANIMALS

One of the great things about coming to Camp Menominee is the chance to see so much wildlife.

No, what I mean is a common courtesy that one can show to the animals. It takes no great effort to walk around an ant hill instead of stomping on it; or to pick a struggling beetle off the floor and place it upon the liberating winds, rather than mashing it and dropping it in the trash. Animal life possesses consciousness (to limited and different degrees), but when it's dead, it has lost that unique characteristic forever. I don't know how many ants there are in the world (quite a few, I would imagine), so it doesn't matter to you or to me if one gets crushed. But to that one ant, it does matter.

Farmer in the Sky, a novel by the great science-fiction author Robert A. Heinlein, told of colonists who settled on Ganymede, one of Jupiter's moons. The air and weather were artificially controlled. It was impossible to transport soil from the Earth to Ganymede (because of the great weight involved), so the barren rocks had to be ground up. To make it fertile soil, different kinds of insects were brought from Earth and let loose. Any person caught killing one of these vital insects was subject to a fine, or imprisonment, or both.

Things aren't that bad here. But it makes another point--animals and insects have uses, besides leaving you itchy in the morning.

So be good to the animals. It's not so hard.

A few Comments on

FLYING Disk-Man FROM MARS

By Rodney Schroeter

Flying Disk-Man from Mars has many of the characteristics that other serials I have seen have.

1) Hard, fast action. There are chase scenes in cars, planes, and anything else with wheels.

2) A super-powerful-doubly-evil-mastermind villain, who directs a handful of common crooks. I have seen this in the Captain America serial, the Captain Marvel one, and the Flash Gordon ones (there were three of those). The Master Villain does not usually fight with the hero personally, which leads us up to

3) The fist-fight. There is one in each chapter. It never fails. The thing is, no one ever gets bruised, there is no bleeding, and someone gets up after being pounded and walks away as if nothing ever happened. This is very unrealistic, but that was the only acceptable way violence could be done in those days.

4) A mind-staggering continued ending. This can really make or break a chapter. The most thrilling ending, for me, was when Kent fell out of the plane. But the most stupid thing in this serial was when he fell on a straw stack! In a cartoon, this might work. But for this, it was ridiculous. Again, when Kent fell into a blazing furnace, it showed the crooks running off, and then showed Kent on the ground, outside the fire. How did he get out? This was never explained.

Flying Disk-Man has little of the special effects found in present films. Of course, the producers did not have ten million dollars, as did George Lucas when he made Star Wars, or Steven Spielberg, who had eighteen million to make Close Encounters. I would like to see some scenes from Mars, but that would have taken too much money.

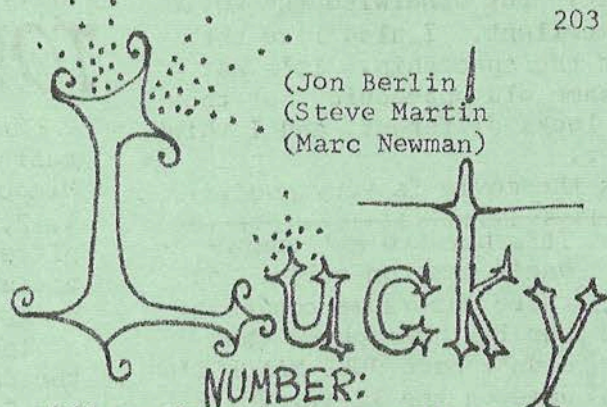

CAMP MENOMINEE THIS IS YOUR LIFE

The following article is reprinted from issue number 24 in the 1975 annual.

*Editors Note: Anywhere in this article that the quote appears in all caps, it is Nate Wasserman talking.

Camp Menominee began in Rhinelander, where Camp Mohawk is now located. WE STARTED CAMP IN RHINELANDER APPROXIMATELY ABOUT 1930. WE STARTED ON A PRETTY NICE PIECE OF GROUND AND WE HAD ABOUT 2000 FEET OF SHORELINE AND THE CABINS WERE SET ALONG THE LAKE. WE STARTED WITH A SMALL MESS HALL AND 4 CABINS AT A SITE ON BASS LAKE AS THEY CALLED IT, AND IT WAS FOR A BEGINNING VERY NICE. WE HAD APPROXIMATELY 22 BOYS THE FIRST YEAR. CAMP DEVELOPED OVER A PERIOD OF YEARS AND THEN IN THE EARLY THIRTIES WE HAD A DEPRESSION. OUR ENROLLMENT WAS VERY SMALL AROUND 30-40 BOYS. OUR FIRST BIG YEAR-WE STARTED TO SEE A LITTLE DAYLIGHT IN 38 AND 39. GRADUALLY WE BUILT UP THE CAMP DOWN THERE. BETWEEN 44-46 WE HAD ABOUT 110 BOYS."

"IN 1946 WE BOUGHT THIS PLACE FROM THE COMISKEY'S AND IN 47 WE BUILT THIS CAMP, WE WORKED THROUGH THE WINTER GETTING IT READY FOR THE OF 47. THAT SAME YEAR WE OPENED MARIMETA SO WE HAD BOTH A BOYS AND GIRLS CAMP."

The original buildings on these grounds consisted of part of the Main Lodge, the infirmary, the rec hall, the garage, and a tool shed which was enlarged to become what is now cabins 1 and 2 (13&14). Cabins 7-12 were built from lumber found on the grounds, and the other cabins were also built before the camp opened here in 1947.

Some of the activities that were continued at the new grounds were Twi-Light League, Camper-Counselor day, and a shortened version of Green and White.

Alan Wasserman returned from the army after the 1952 season, and a year later married Elaine who was a former Marimeta counselor.

Camp Menominee developed slowly into the camp we now have. In 1956 British and American competition began, as an attempt to add excitement to the first few weeks of camp.

The tradition of the Green and White sing began in 1959 as the idea of several counselors who had participated in such an activity for their fraternity.

Over the years MENOMINEE has played many other camps in competition. Our major competitors have been Ojibwa, Kawaga, and most of all Interlaken. MENOMINEE has won more competition throughout the years than we have lost.

In our annual (since '66) rivalry against Kawaga we have won 5 and lost 5. (Currently we lead 7-6.) Other camps we have played include: Towering Pines, Deershorn, Red Arrow, Glen Eden, Nebagamon, Timberlane, Jackpine, Chippewa, Cherokee, Macabee, and Mohawk.

In little league hardball competition Menominee has never had a losing season, which is an accomplishment in itself.

And so ends our re-cap of this part of Menominee's history. May she have many more years of happiness.

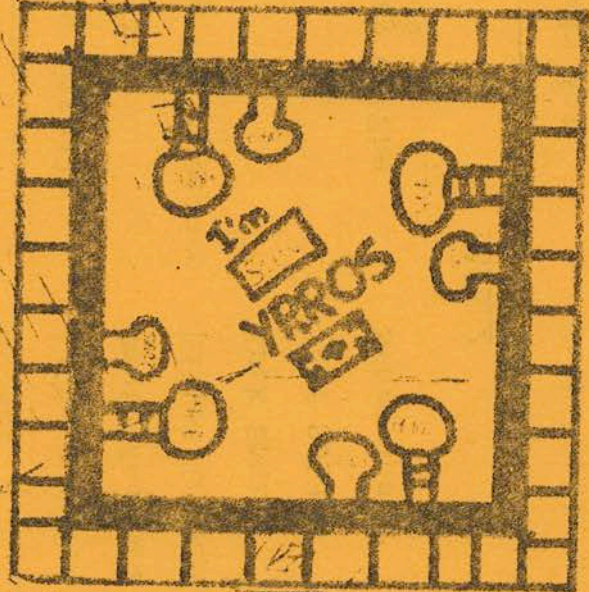
