## AMERICANS DEFEAT BRITISH!

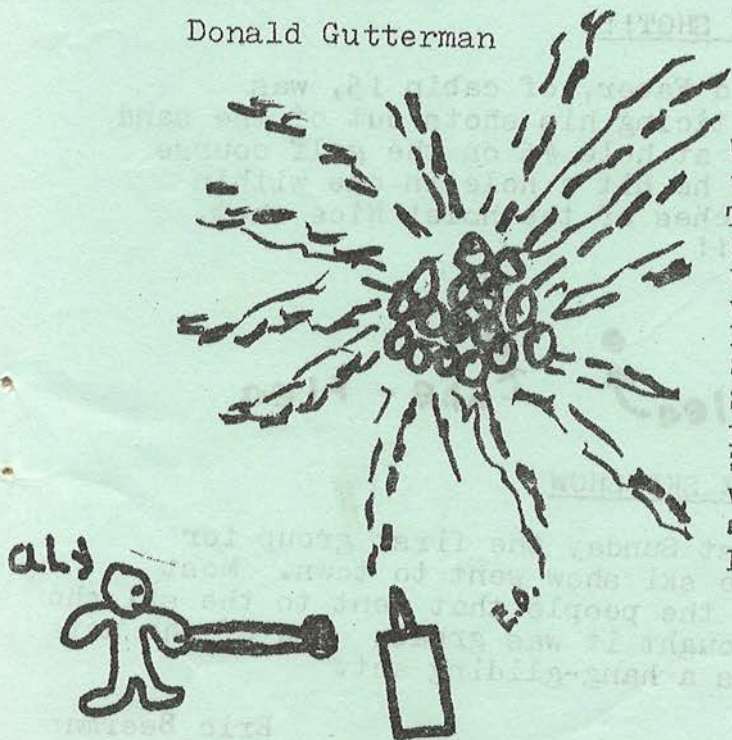

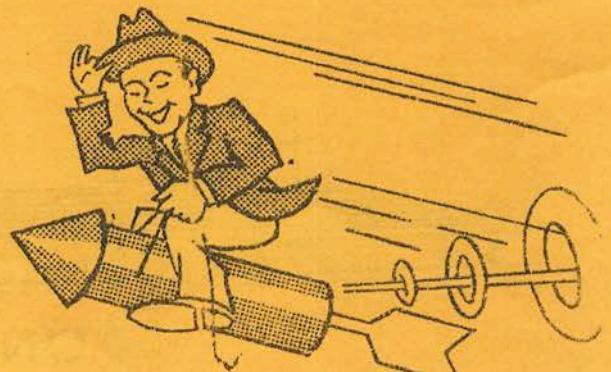
### 14 Year olds

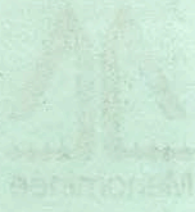
# GREENS WIN SING

# HISTORY OF CAMP MENOMINEE

What would the Megaphone staff be without going hyper at missed deadlines?

What would cabin 10 be without its party sessions?

What would Lee Blumenfeld be without his shark attacks on little men in boats?

What would Marc Roth be without his OT's?

What gave you the idea to start a camp?

Nate: Well, I worked at Camp Booster, which is now Camp Horlon, in 1926 and '27, and I liked working with the kids, so I wanted to start a camp.

Why did you choose the name Menominee?

Nate: I wanted an Indian because camps then all had Indian names and the Menominee Indians were then close to the campsite.

When did you become a member of the Camp Director's association?

Nate: I was always a member of the Camp Director's Association.

What was the enrollment for the first year?

Nate: 16 people.

How did the depression affect Camp Menominee?

Nate: The camp almost didn't make it. We were lucky to survive as a camp.

Al: Towards the end of the depression, enrollment was up. It was up to about 100-110 kids.

What was the first year of camp like?

Nate: We started camp in Rhinelander approximately about 1930. We started on a pretty nice piece of ground and we had about 2000 feet of shoreline and the cabins were set along the lake. We started with a small mess hall and four cabins at a site on Bass Lake, as they called it, and it was for a beginning very nice.

Al: I really don't know much about the first year, but two of my uncles were counselors and we used dynamite to clear trees and land.

How did World War II affect Camp?

Al: It didn't affect it at all. Enrollment stayed the same.



What was the program like in the 30's and 40's?

Nate: We taught kids baseball and tennis because they could carry it with them the rest of their life and at the park if you couldn't play baseball the other kids would push you aside.

What were the differences between the program of the 50's and the program of the 70's?

Bob: Instruction, a lot more instruction then, a lot more classes then. In tennis, we had an all-camp tennis tournament, we used a ladder system. In fact, that is how we picked our tennis team.

Lloyd: We had four classes then, the same as we do now. We had Green & White then, the same as we do now. We had inter and intra-camp competition then, the same as we do now. We had ... Basically, it's almost the same.

When was your first year as a counselor?

Al: When I was eighteen, in 1945.

What was being a counselor then like as compared to being a counselor now?

Al: At that time we had counselors and assistant counselors. I was the only young one then, I was 18.

How did you first here of Camp Menominee?

Bob: From an ad in the Chicago Tribune in 1956.

Lloyd: An ad in the Chicago Tribune.

When was your first year and what was it like?

Bob: My first year was 1956. I was an assistant counselor under Charles Siebert. I had ten year olds, and I assisted Charlie in archery.

Lloyd: My first year was '57. I just finished college and I knew I was going to be a teacher. When I came here, I was just flabbergasted at the whole set-up because I was more used to a more tent-type of camp. Nate had told me a little bit about it, and I came with hesitations yet expectations. When I got here, the whole year was fantastic because I just couldn't believe the total setup and how everything went. I was involved almost totally with waterfront and tripping.

How would you compare the kids then to the kids now?

Nate: The same. They wanted to be liked by peers, have attention, and do good in sports.

Al: They have the same idiosyncracies as they did then.

Bob: Up through the age of 13, no difference whatsoever. Possibly the only thing I see a difference in is they got up earlier in the morning and went to bed earlier at night. They used to get up at 7:30 and got to bed at 10, but they don't do that any more.

Lloyd: The kids are about the same. The environmental philosophy has changed.

How would you compare the counselors then to now?

Al: Back then counselors needed a job, they got fed in the summer, they got free room and board, and some doctors even finished their internships here back then.

Bob: The biggest difference is we had an assistant counselor who had no administrative responsibility and the counselor was the assistants teacher. It was a 90-10 proposition, not like todays 50-50. Counselors stayed here quite a few years in the past. Turnover was almost non-existent. Now it is quite large.

Lloyd: When I came I was the youngest counselor at 21 and most of the others range from that to about fifty and so all the time I was here for the first five or six years I was considered the youngest. It was different in the age aspect. Also, there was a whole group that was married so they had an effect on everybody also.

\*\*\*How did the meatman legend start?\*\*\*

Nate: Some counselors carried that in with them.

Al: I don't know. I don't like it, I don't use it, and I think some counselors started it.

Bob: I think the meatman was around before Menominee and there will probably be a meatman around after Menominee disappears. He is as old as the hills. He will always be there.

Lloyd: I am fairly well aware of how it started because it was here when I was here. A couple of counselors at that time even had newspaper articles that dealt with meatmen.

How did British / American start?

Nate: A number of years ago, we decided to have B & A to increase intra-camp competition. Al worked with that.

Bob: There are more events now than there were then and it lasts longer.

Lloyd: I agree with Bob.

/To Al/ How did you meet Elaine?

Al: It was during WWII. I was in the army stationed at Baltimore, Maryland, and we met through a mutual friend.

When did Camp Marimeta start?

Al: 1947.

Why then?

Al: We had an uncle who had been head counselor before the war. After he came out of the army, he and my aunt thought they wanted to start a girls camp. Well, it turns out that they weren't as excited about the idea as they thought at first. So we bought out their interest and started Marimeta. Marimeta's present director, Barb Rakowsky, is their daughter.

Where did the kids come from back then?

Al: Chicago area, yes, the south side, we grew up on the south side, on Marrow street.

When and what was your first year as director like?

Al: I don't remember, I actually don't remember.

Was there a time lapse between you being a counselor and a director?

Al: Not really, I sort of just moved up to it in around '53, '54, and '55.

How would you compare the camp philosophy of 1959 to 1979?

Bob: It was a lot stricter then. Nate had a temper. If you were too loud or put food in someones face, you didn't do it a second time all summer.

Lloyd: For kids it has probably decreased in sports-oriented areas. There has been a change in camper privileges.

How would you compare the competition of 1959 with 1979?

Bob: There was not as much competition back then but, the type is the same. Our biggest competitions were against Interlaken and Kawaga. The teams were picked and known much more in advance than they are now. Interlaken is no longer in existence.

How would you compare camp traditions of 1959 with those of today?

Bob: Green and White is bigger now than then, it has grown. The tradition of marching into the sing and the scoring of the sing has changed. We used to use five different criteria. They were: 1/ Marching, 2/ Costume or decorum, 3/ Behavior on stage, 4/ Singing, 5/ Enjoyment. Basically, all the rest of them are the same.

Lloyd: That's been the strangest part, in my mind. It seems that in the last five years the traditions of the previous forty-five years have changed and a lot of people think that those are traditions when in reality the actual traditions we have had for many, many, years have somewhat been lost in the shuffle by creation of new ones.

What new programs did you start at Camp Menominee?

Bob: I really didn't start any major programs. I started the present testing method for medals in tennis, and began tennis stokers for beginners but nothing really of any major significance.

Lloyd: Yes, I did start the sing. The counselors we had at that time really liked to sing and we had a lot of sing-a-longs. Nate also had some college sing-a-long films, and he really liked those. We thought it would give a boost to our Green and White program, so we gave it a try. The themes for the first one, in 1960, were College and War. It really went well for the first sing, as a lot of work went into it, the costumes were elaborate. We used all new songs, except we used Menominee.

What made you decide to come back year after year after year?

Bob: My first summer was fun, and I enjoyed it, so I came back.

Lloyd: This camp was so different from other camps. The setup was unique and nice and most of the other counselors had been here for a lot of years. That is really a plus factor for a camp.

Why did you leave?

Bob: I had gotten married and had just finished our honeymoon and my wife was a counselor at Marimeta. She couldn't stand it, as it is not the best way to start off a marriage.

What was your most memorable experience at Camp Menominee?

Al: I don't really know, can't think of one, and I grew up here. Lot's and lot's and lot's of things happened and lot's of miracle things. I can't really think of one, single, memorable experience. I remember the time when the fireworks blew up. It was one of my first years as director and I was going to get all of the older kids involved in it. This was down by the bath house. The end of the fuse we were using to light them burned off and fell into the box of fireworks. This was before we took them out and put them on the shore. It went up like a balloon. Everything went everywhere. It was over in about five minutes. We got the biggest round of applause you ever saw, but it was scary, it was scary. It was wild. I can't really think of one experience, it seems like you just remember the bad things.

Bob: There were several. One was a continual thing of pranks which they don't do here anymore. There used to be a tradition of practical jokes. One of these was 'rafting'. This is were a counselor came back from a night off and found that his bed was missing. It had been put out on the raft at the waterfront. People had a better sense of humor then. Back then, they would do these jokes as a cabin, not to get the counselor mad. Another good trick was when you came from the movies once in while, all the light bulbs in camp would be gone. One of the better ones was once when all of the campers came out of the mess hall from dinner they would go to their cabins and most of the campers would have to go to the bathroom. Well, one day all the toilet paper in the entire camp was missing. The boys who did this, for some strange reason would not tell anyone where they put the toilet paper. Well, finally, they got all of the toilet paper out of the woods where they hid it, and that was only because it started raining. We used to have a totem pole here at camp. We used to find that in different people's beds at night.

Lloyd: I have to put in into a category. I can't pick a year, I have several, well, actually about five or six things. Well, of course the sing, just being totally involved in it, being somewhat of an inventor of it, I had to be totally involved in it. Another memorable experience, I had a cabin for two years in a row /same kids/. Those are my best two years camper-wise. To this day, we are all very good friends, all of them. Another thing I will always remember is our Canada trip. Even though this is not directly what you asked, my chance to work at the girl's camp, a chance to see how close the two camps really are. I like it here better. I really like it here.

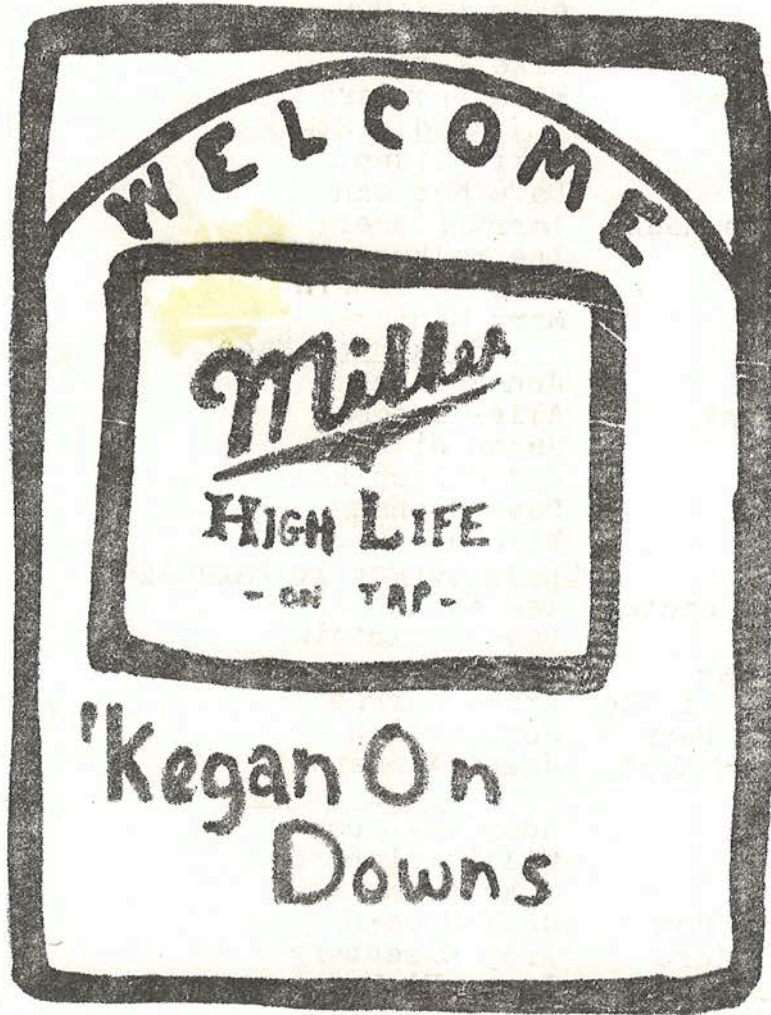
