
CAMP MENOMINEE VISITS EDGERTON FARM






MENOMINEE OLYMPICS CONCLUDE AFTER TWO GRUELING DAYS

Each nine or ten person team traveled through the Olympic grounds with an Interpretor/Escort approved by the Olympia Committee.



The Swiss team emphasized their sportsmanship by presenting their sportsmanship award to Wales, which did not win any other medals.




CABINS 1 AND 5 WIN AT WRESTLEMANIA





SUN WINS FIRST EVENT OF COMPETITION












11 A HOOPSTERS HANDED TOUGH LOSS, 28-44




