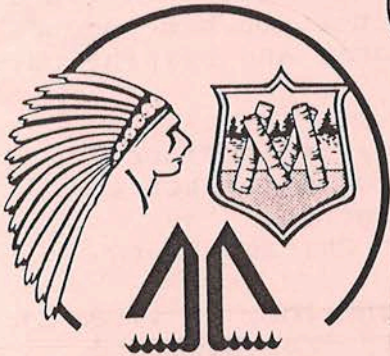

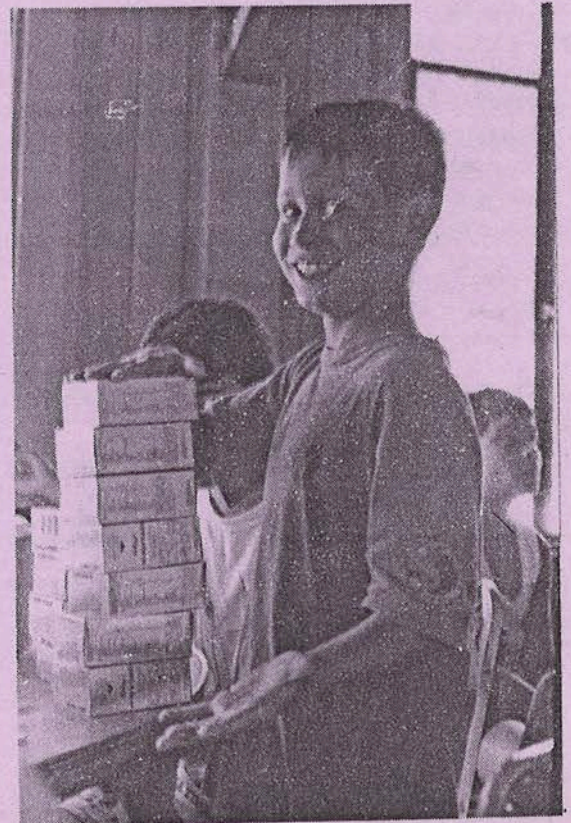
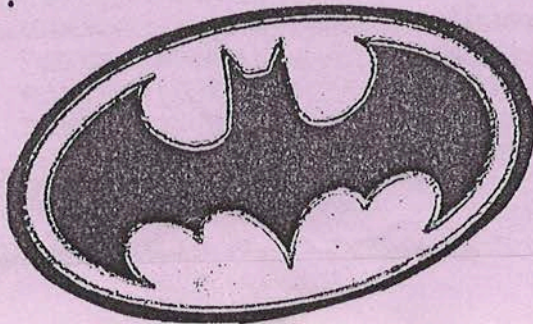
Thursday night the boys of Cabins 12 and 13 met the oldest girls of Camp Marimeta at Eagle Lanes for an exciting evening of bowling action.

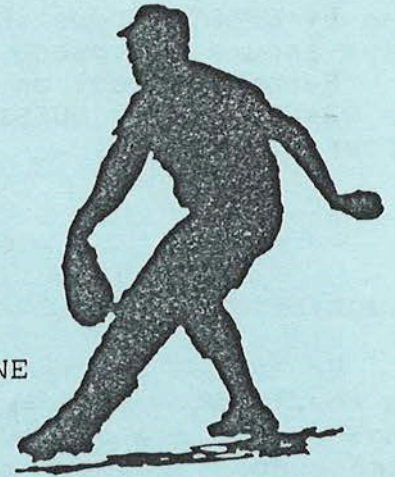
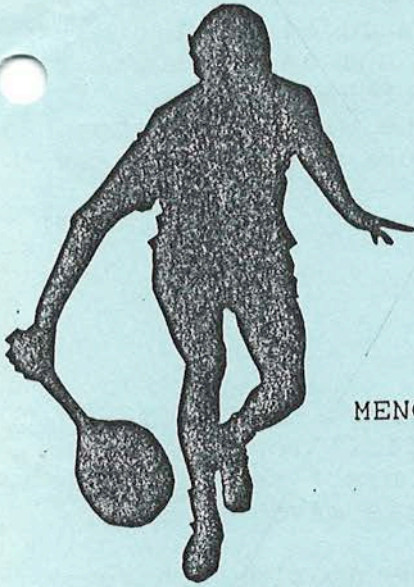

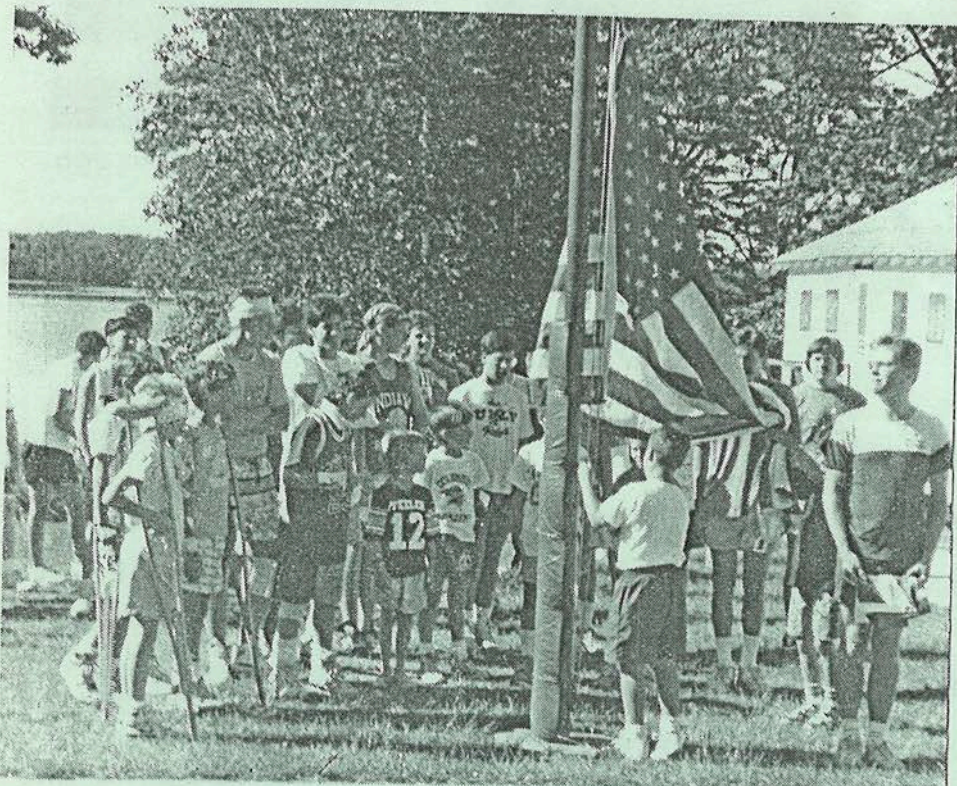

There were also a variety of land and water events.

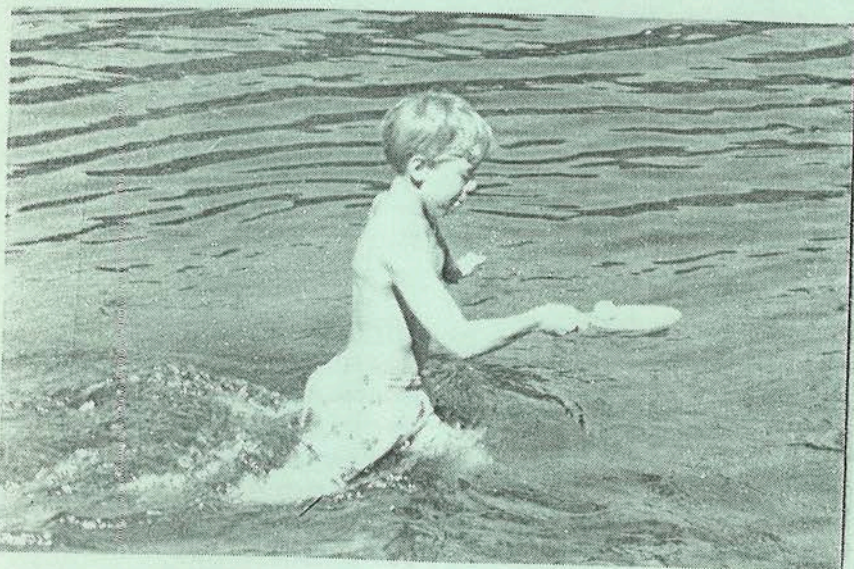
In the Captain's Water Balloon Duels, SCOTT KINZELBERG (of the British) came out undefeated in the Overall Captains' Duels.

In the Intermediates, the representatives of Cabin 14, JACK SPILBERG and KEVIN JOSEPHSON reigned supreme.

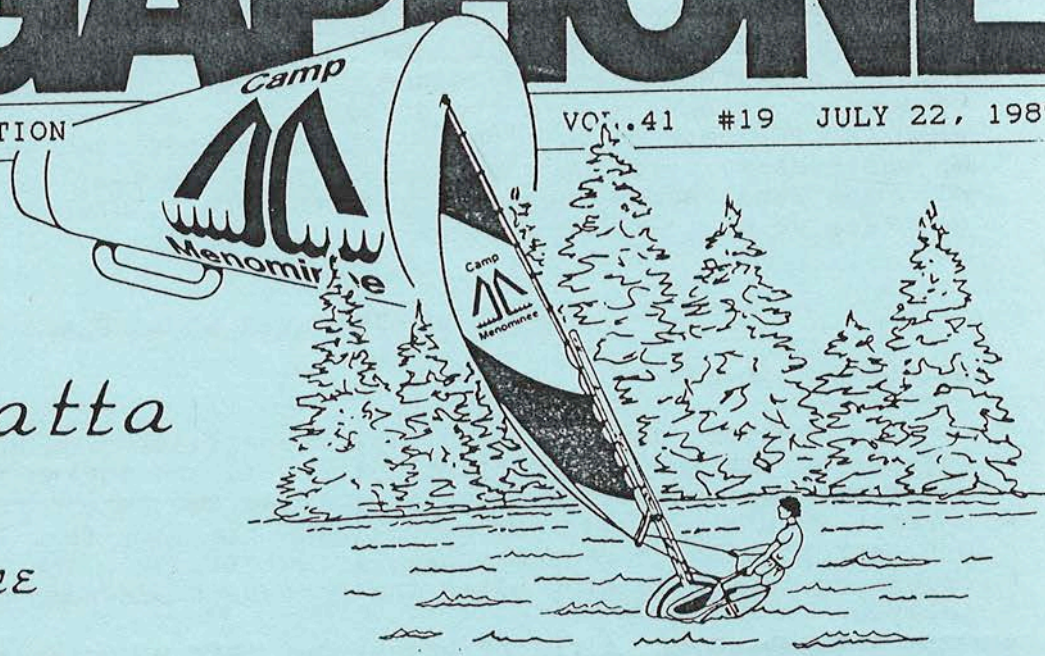

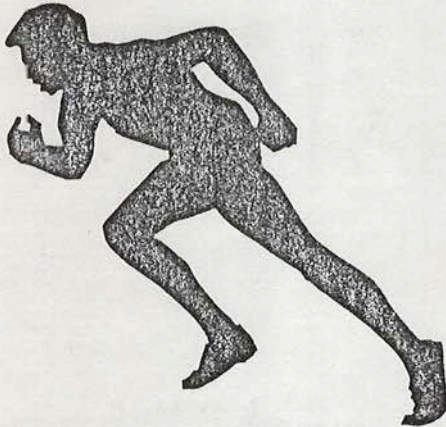

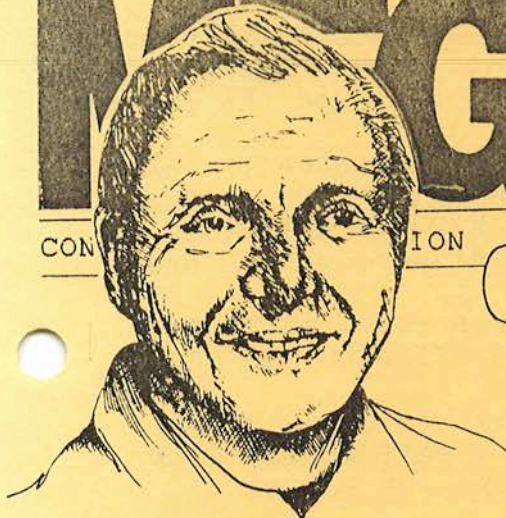

In the final tally, it was GREG LYONS of Arlington Heights who was selected the winner by popular applause. A good time was had by all.

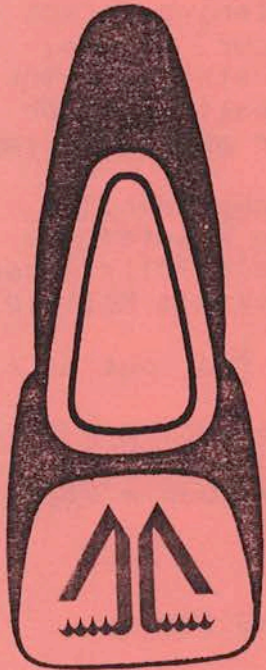
