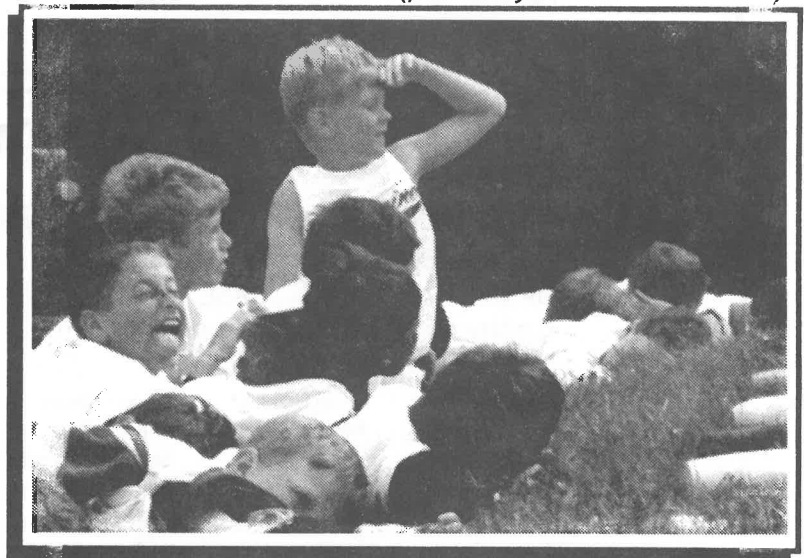
Of course, everyone had the option of choosing one of the many choice activities. Looking back, CM hit the ground running.

Marimeta and Menominee ...



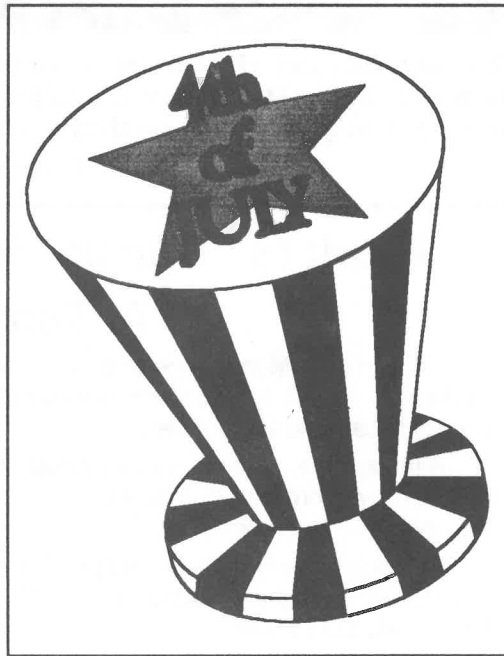

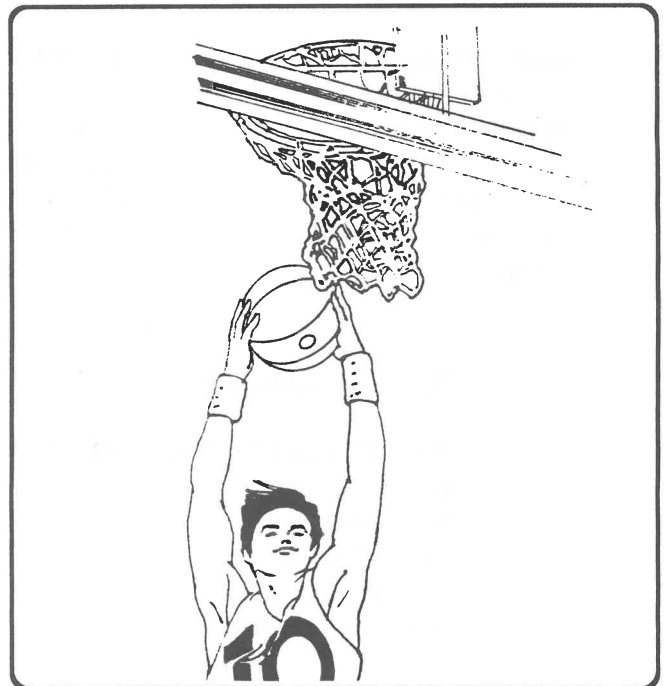
S.B.A. GETS UNDERWAY

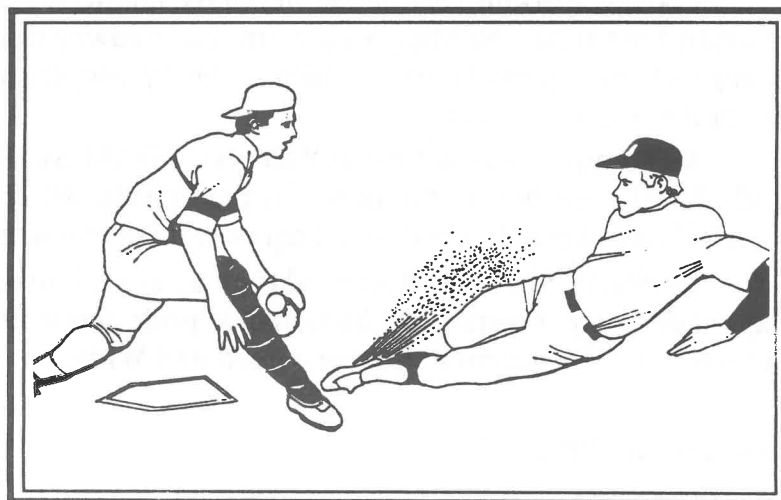
TODD RHEINGRUBER led the team in scoring with 14 points. JORDAN GENDELMAN and PETER CHETEK were right behind him with 14 points combined.

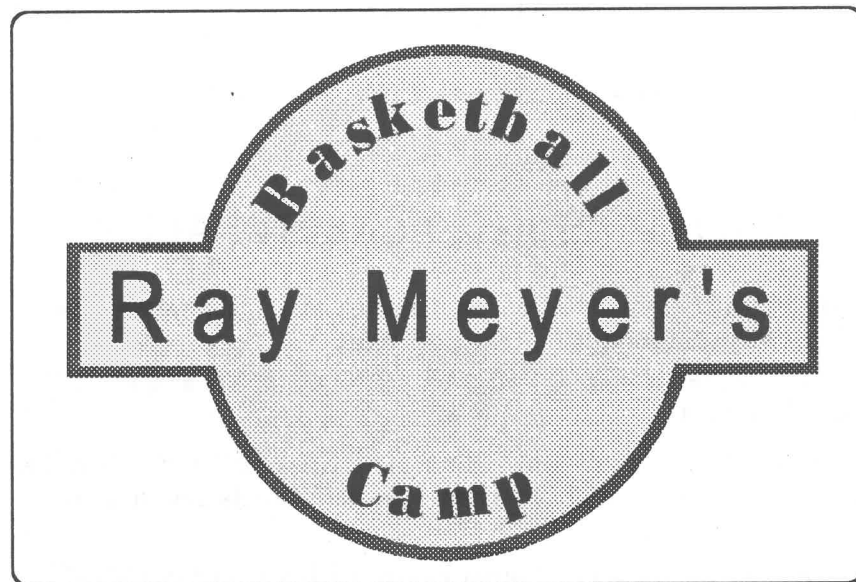
11U BLOWS AWAY RAY MEYER'S

16U Tennis Take It To Timberlane

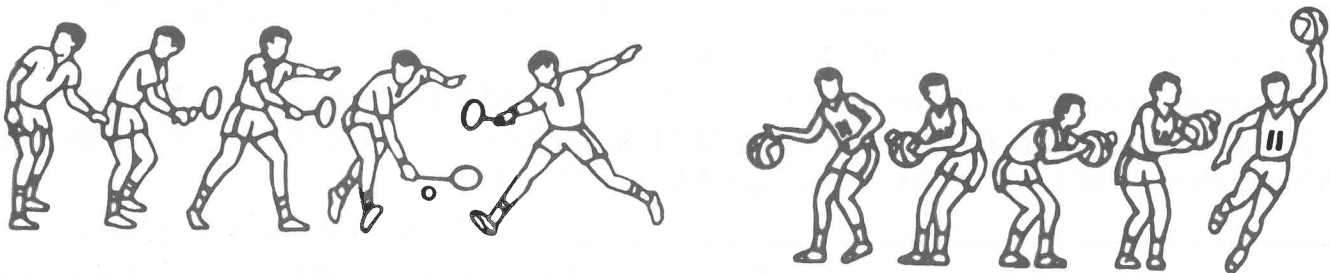

It's always difficult in the first game of the season to know if you've struck the right balance. Whatever fears PAUL and I had soon evaporated in an exciting free-flowing first half.

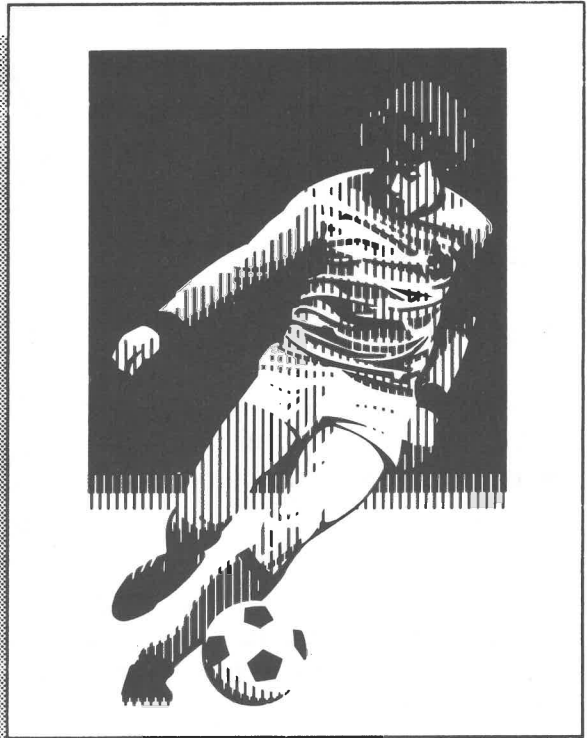

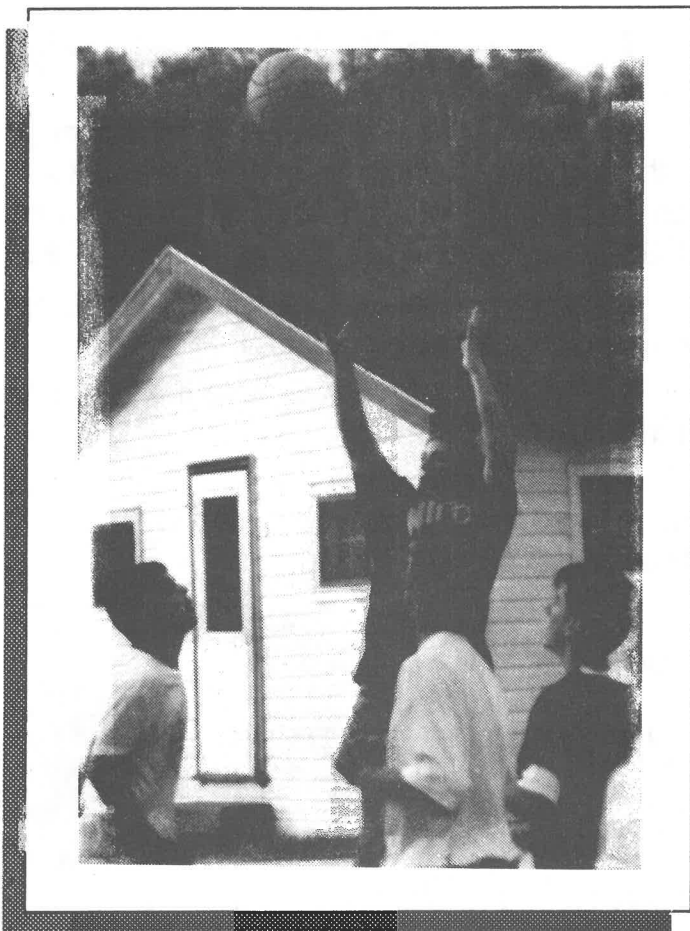

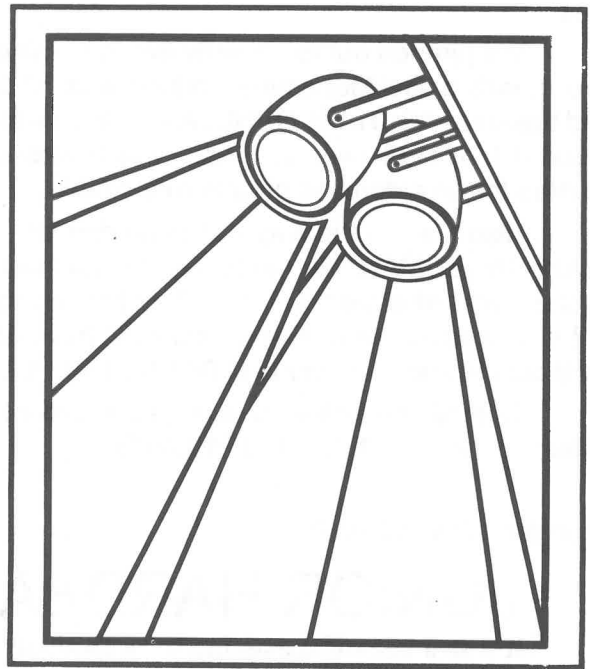

We rigged our boats and surveyed the prevailing and expected wind and weather conditions with the understanding of professionals.

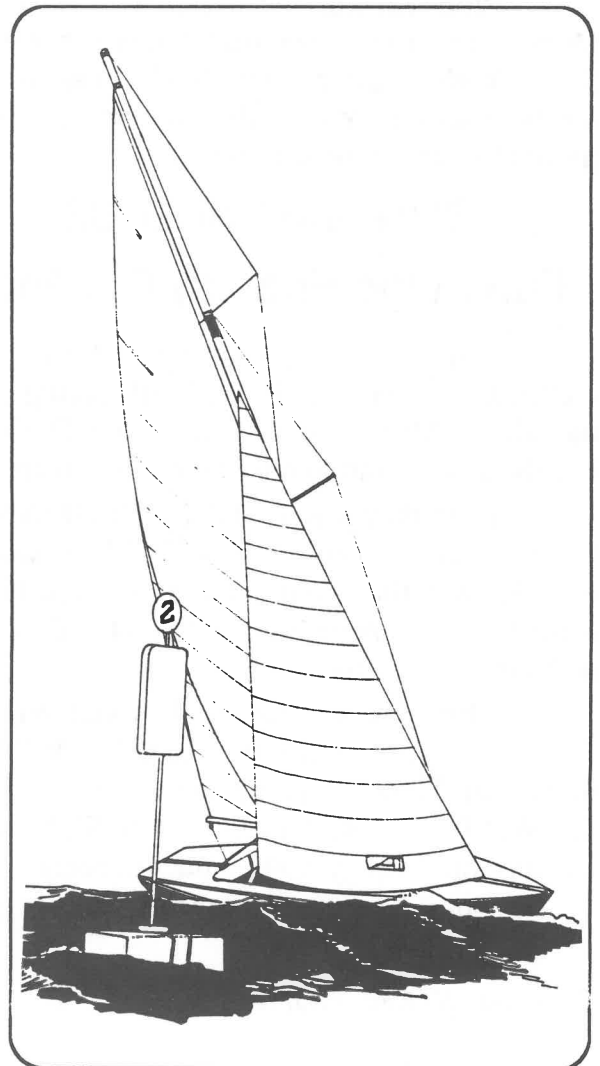
Wind was from the NW when we arrived and by the end of lunch had swung further to the West, and strengthened to 10-15 knots. We were aware of this and planned our race to suit.

The final score was Menominee - 13. Ojibwa - 3.

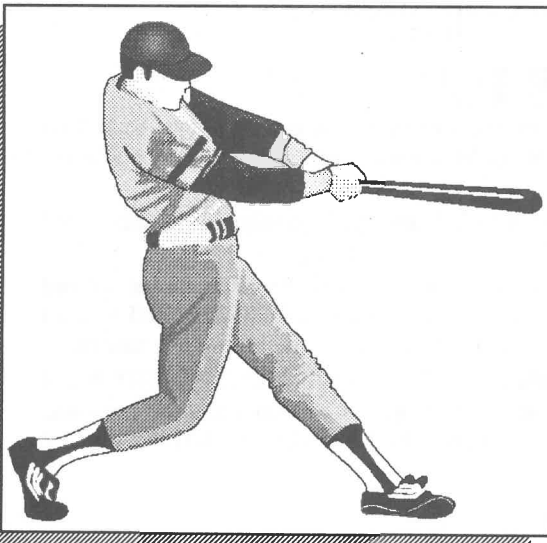

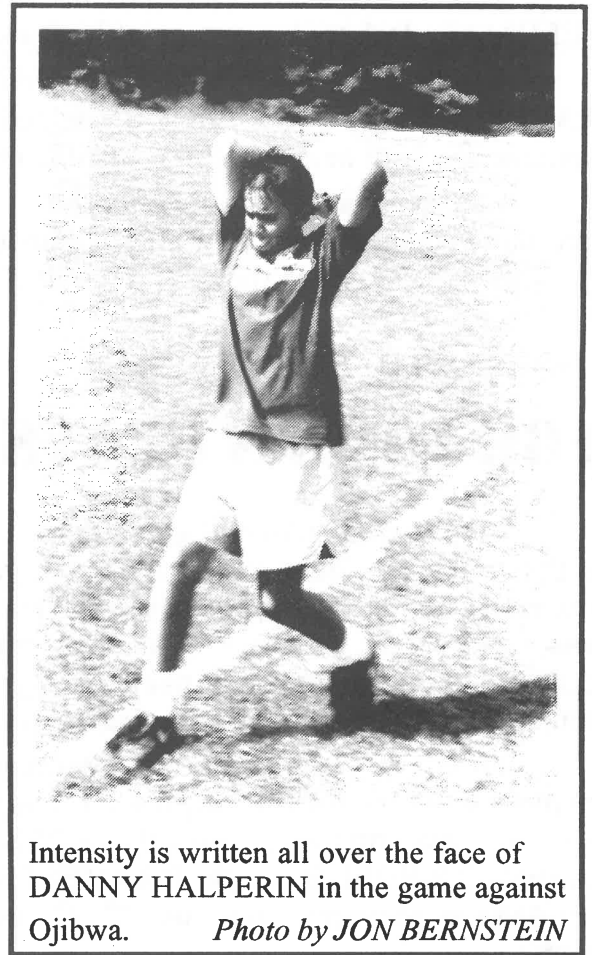
12B Soccer Shows Good Intensity

16B HOOPS PLAYS HARD

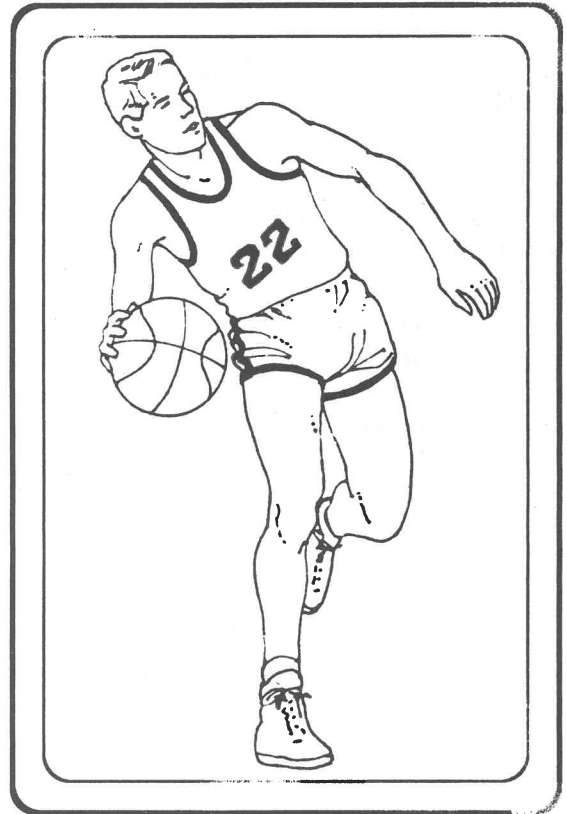

16C Hoops Gets Tested By Ojibwa

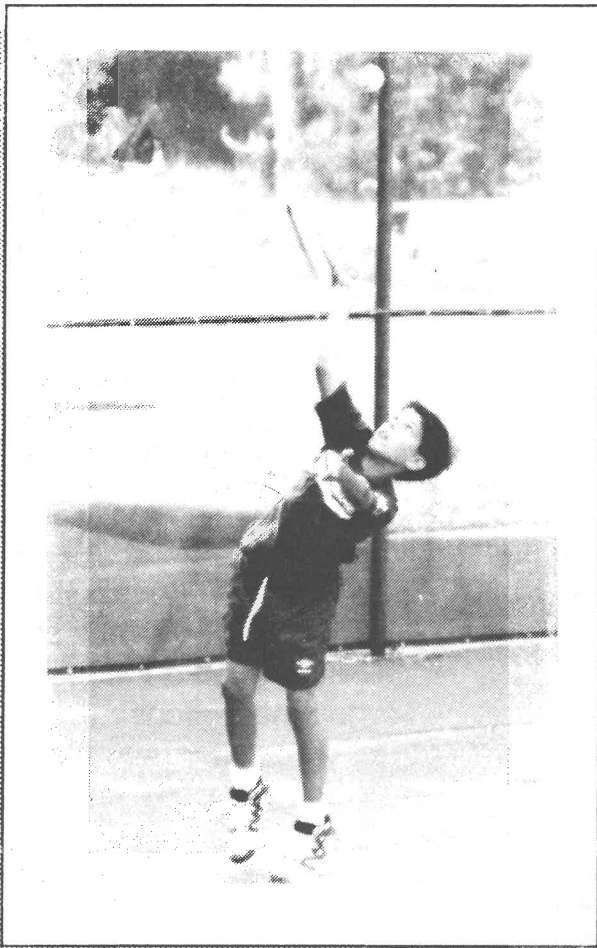

The first game was won by Ojibwa by a very close score. The second game was won by Menominee, but not nearly as close a score.

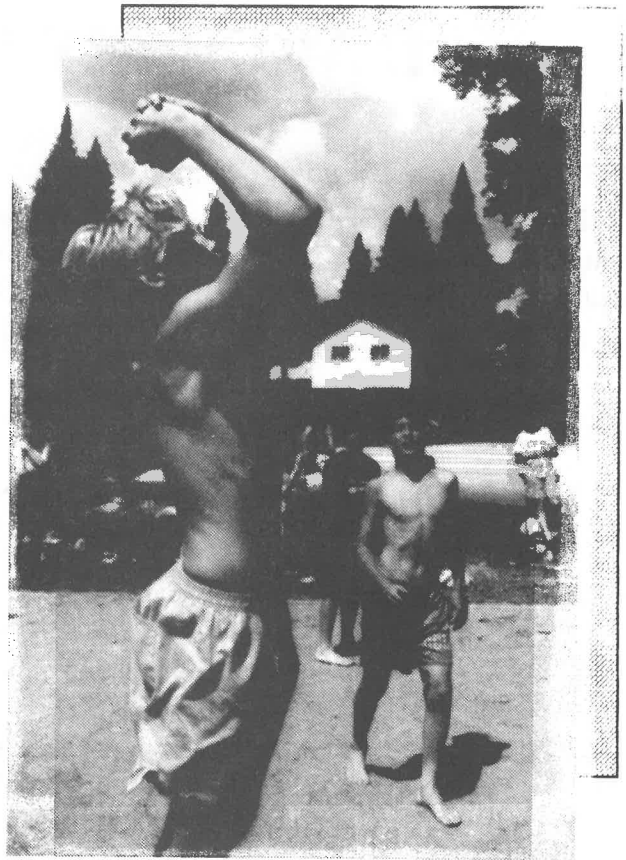

12U ARCHERY SETS RECORD VS. OJIBWA

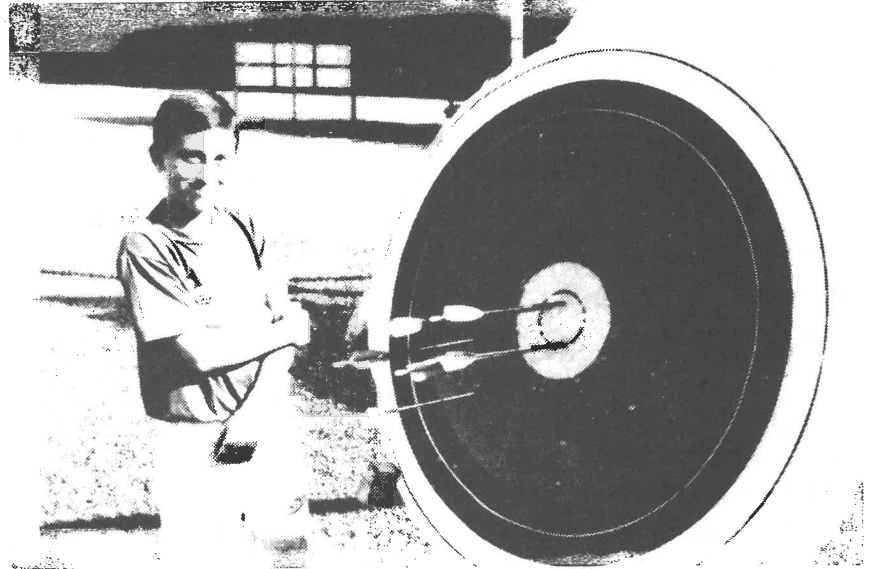

Team Menominee Hoops Trounces Timberlane

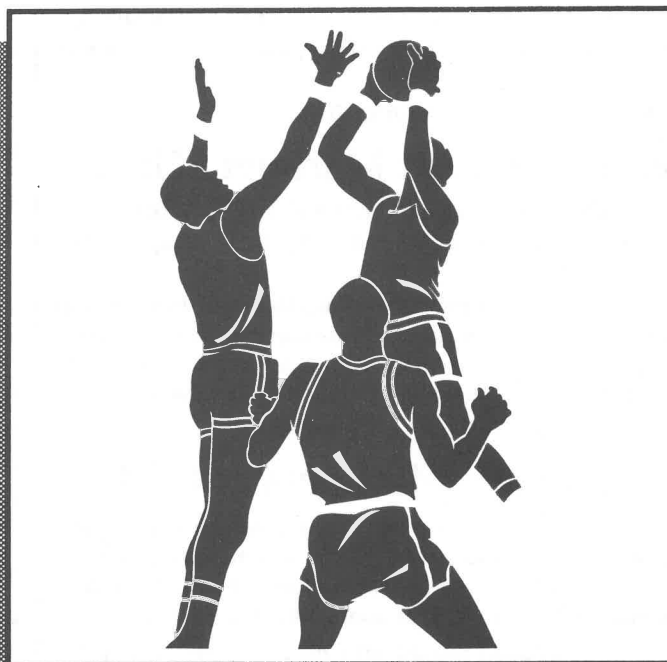

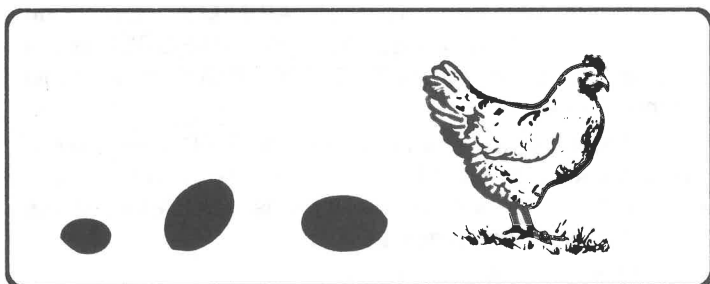

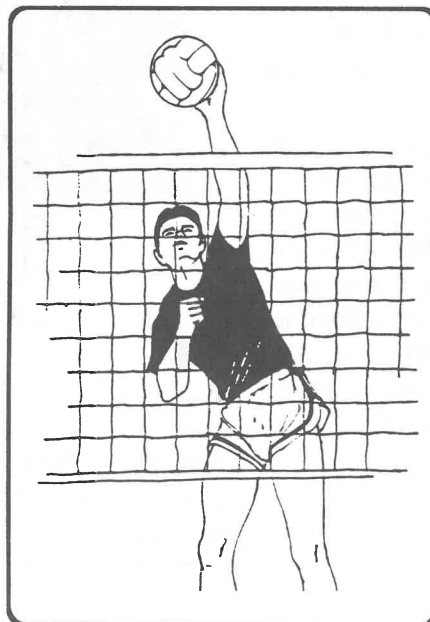
13B Volleyball Spikes Deerhorn

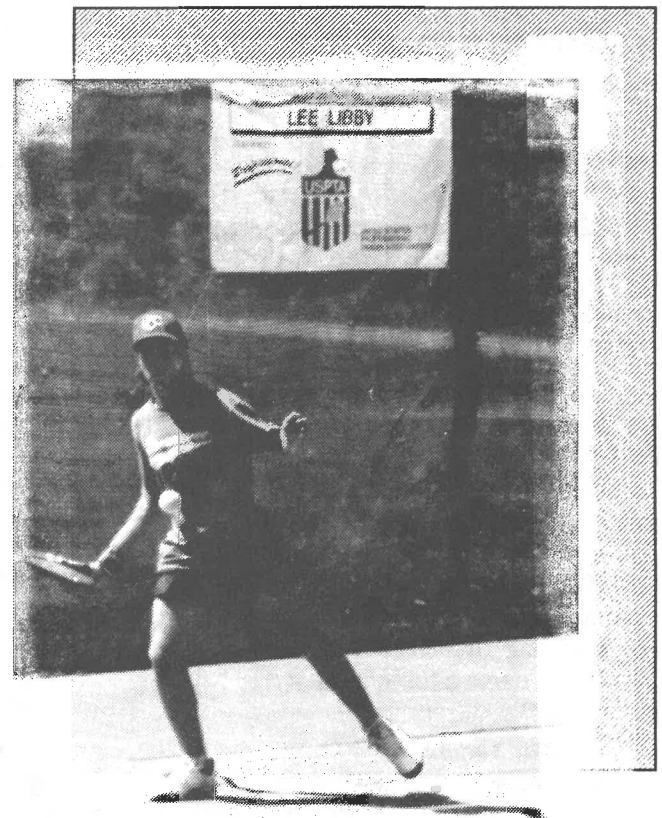
Takes Deerhorn

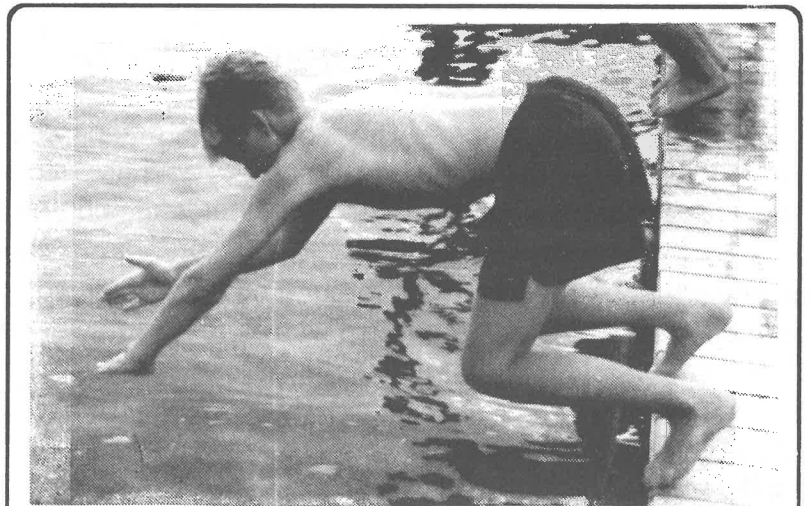
Junior Archers Outshoot Deerhorn

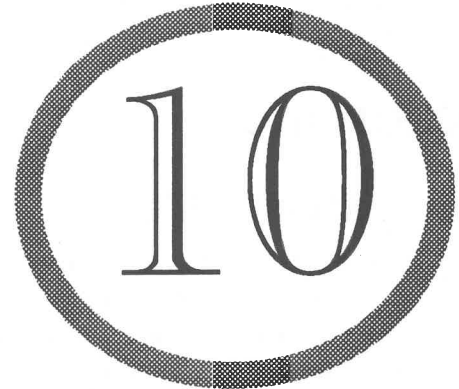

11A "FAB 5" TAKES KAWAGA

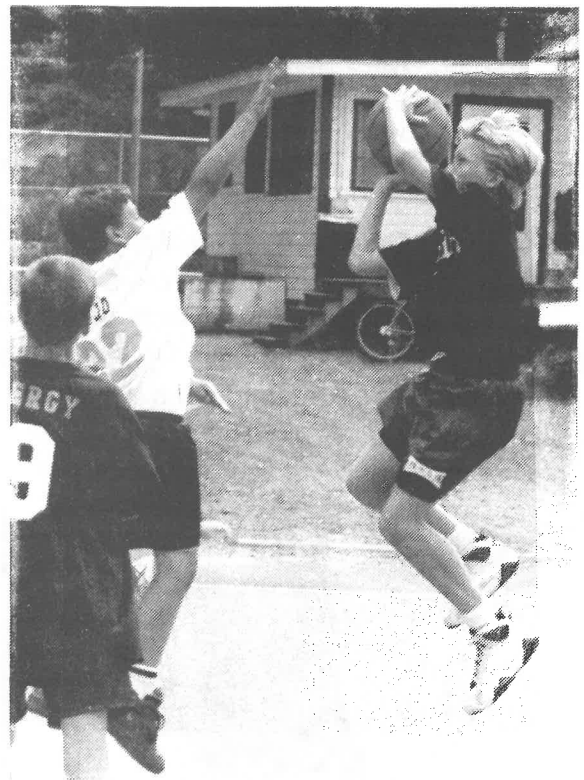

13A Basketball More Than Doubles Kawaga's Score

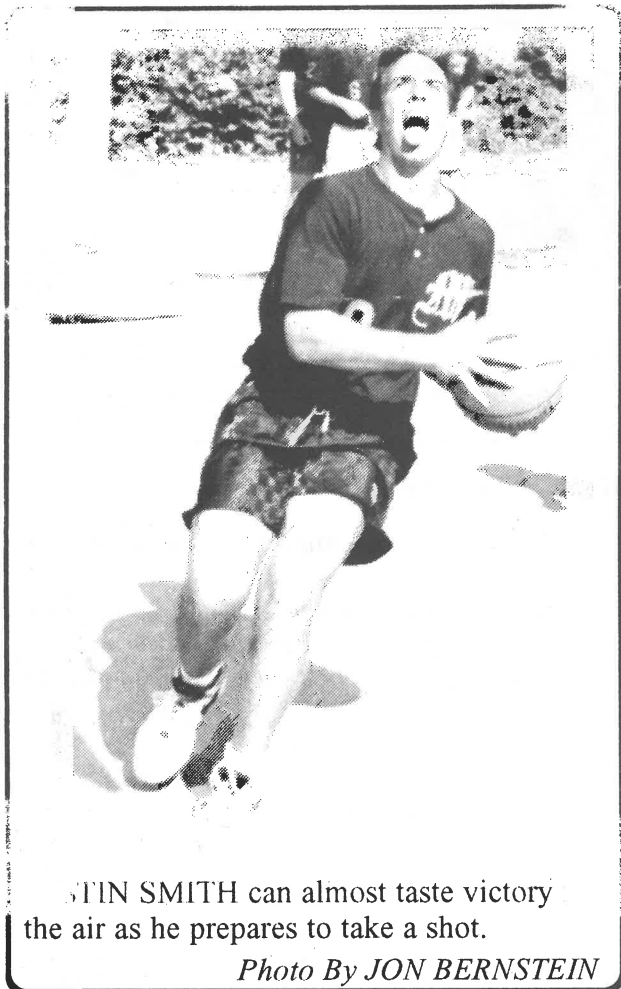

16A Looks Forward to '93 Season

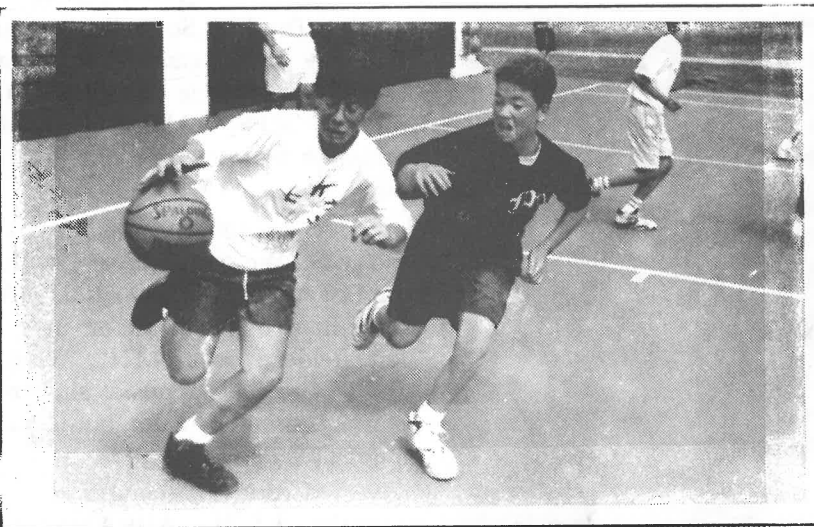

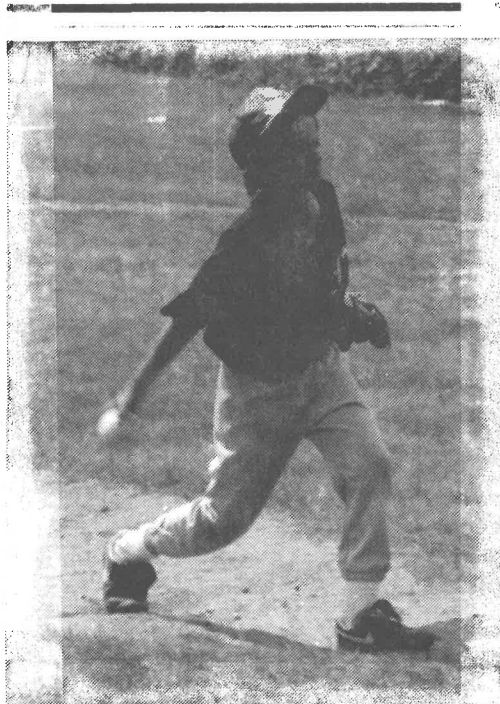

All the attacking from them was fruitless, but the spirited effort earned them a cup of Kawaga water. Final score: Menominee - 0, Kawaga - 1.

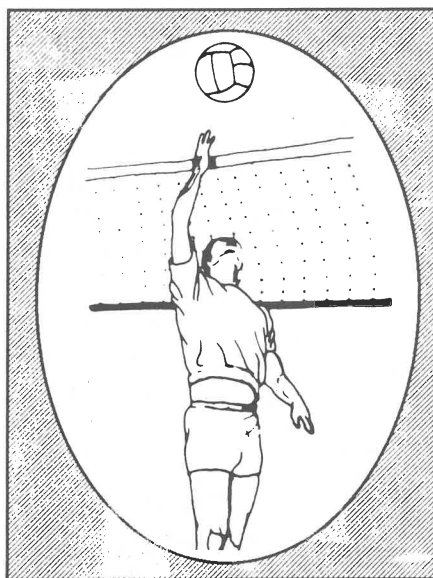

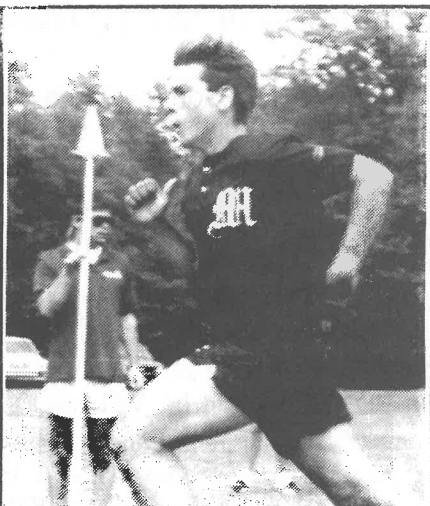
16 Track Nipped at Finish

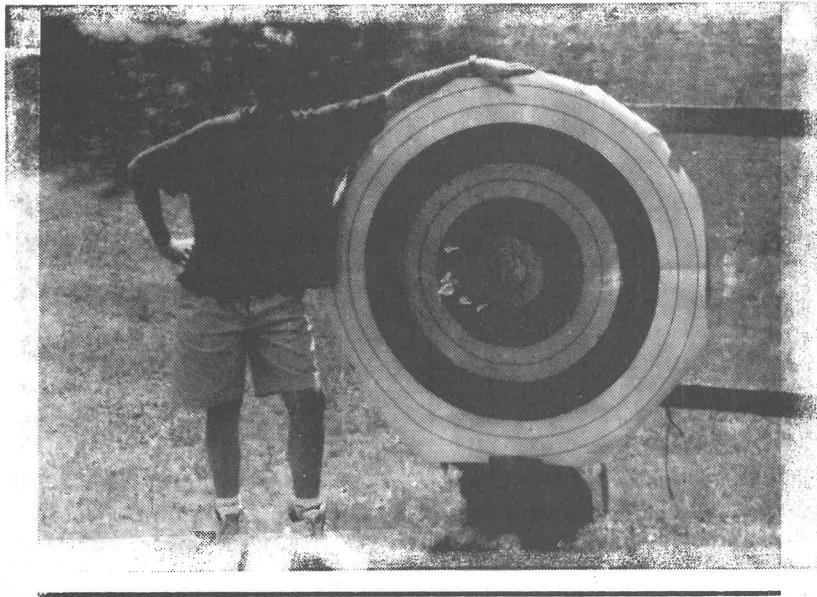
16 Archery On Target Vs. Kawaga

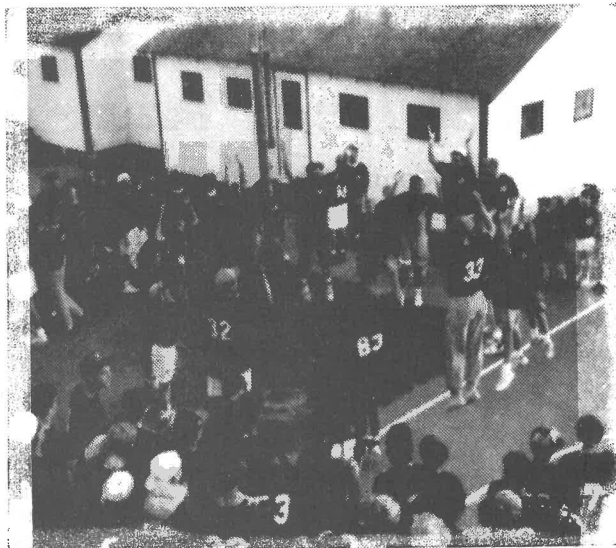

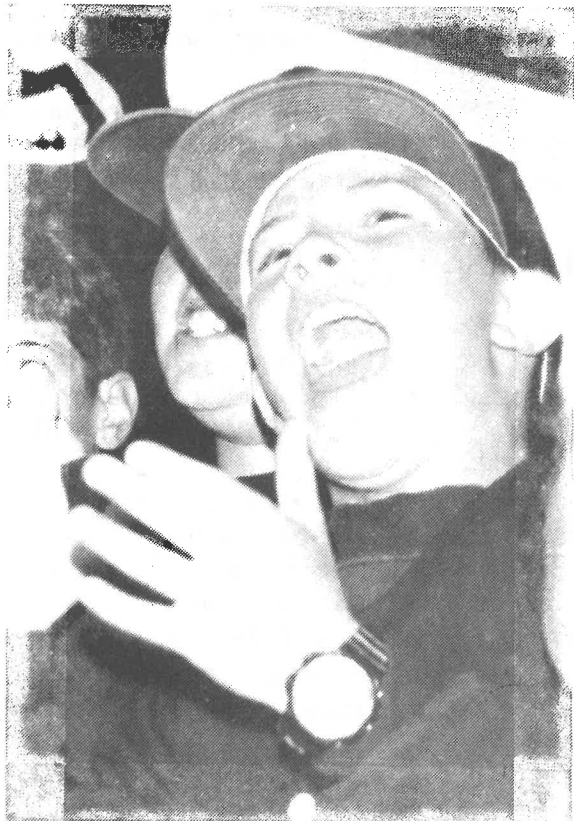

Everyone was happy to finish and all had achieved their goal. The best part was finding out what part of your body hurt the most the next day and receiving our T-shirts.

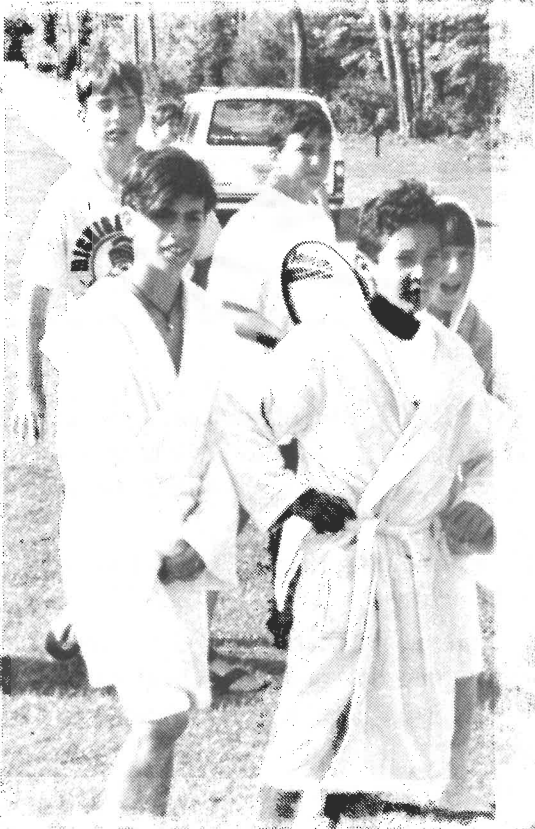

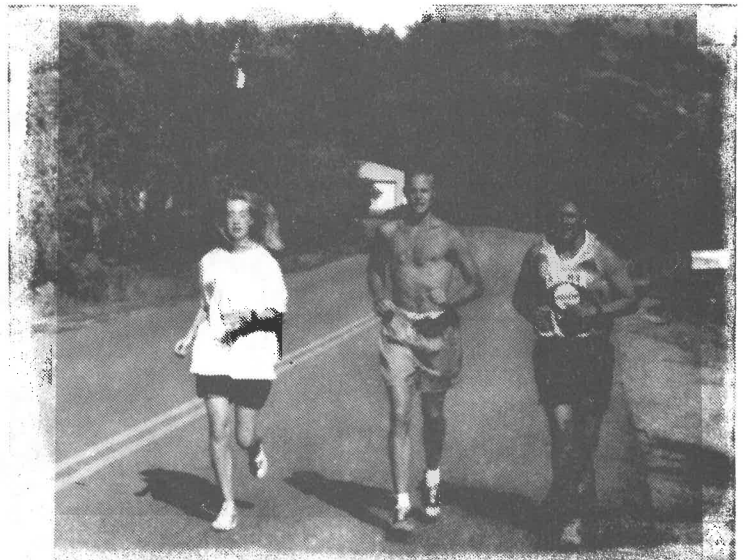

PINEWOOD DERBY

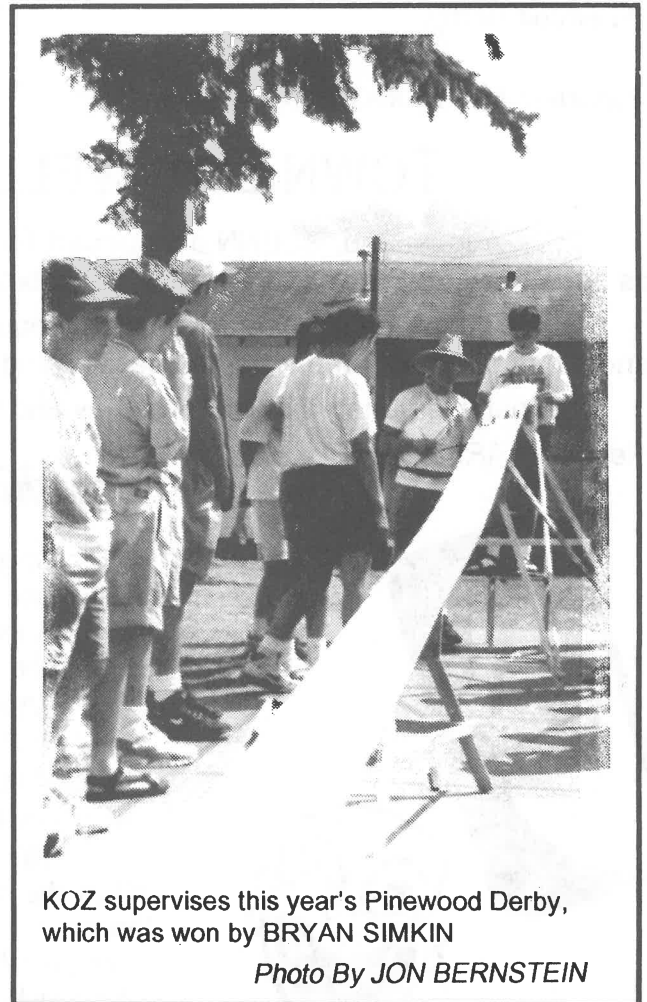

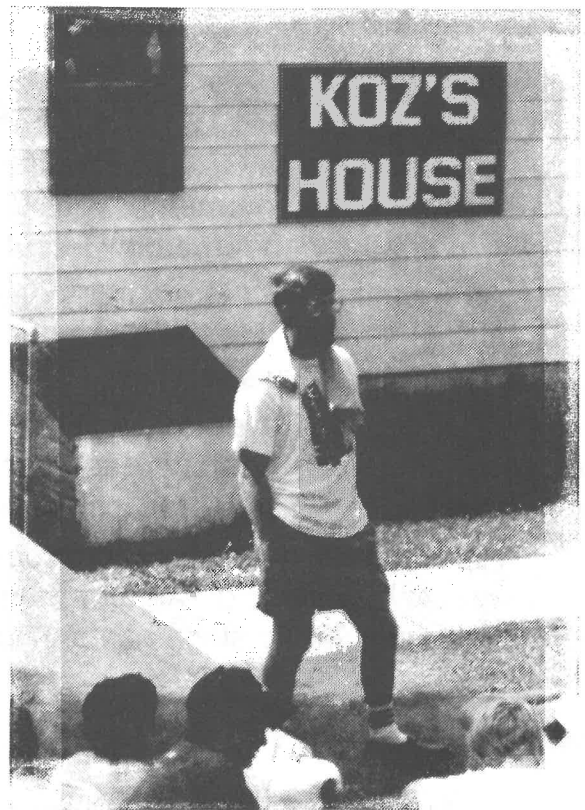
KOZ'S House Dedicated in Honor of KOZ'S 20 Years

Green and White Starts Under Stars and Lights

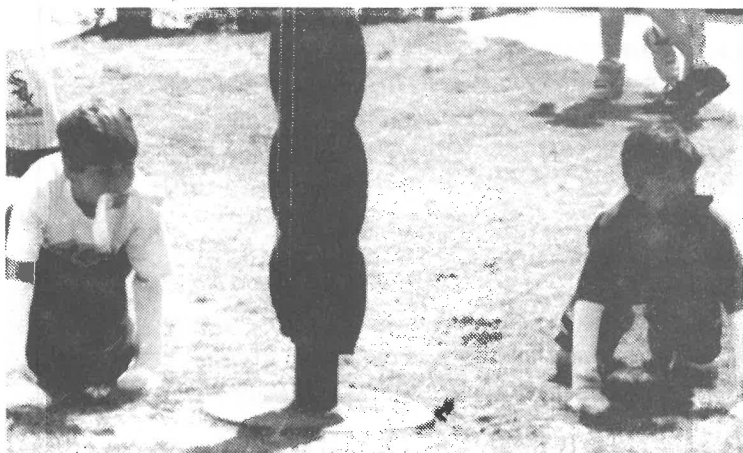

Greens and Whites Split Track and Water Sports

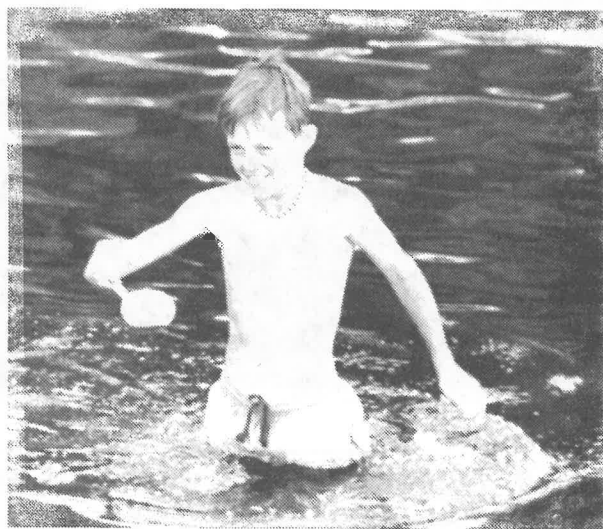
Green and White track and field and water events are usually my personal favorites.

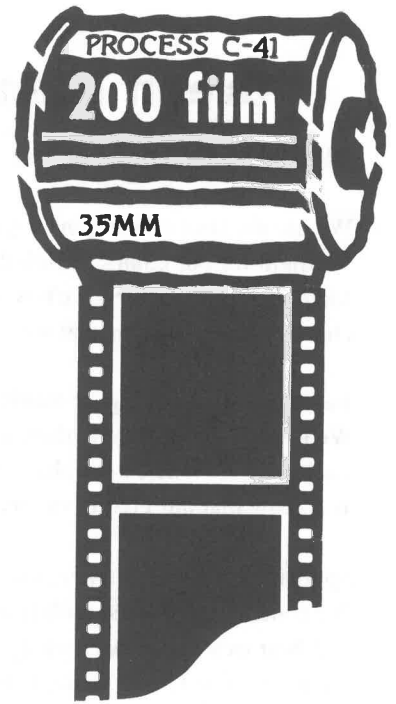

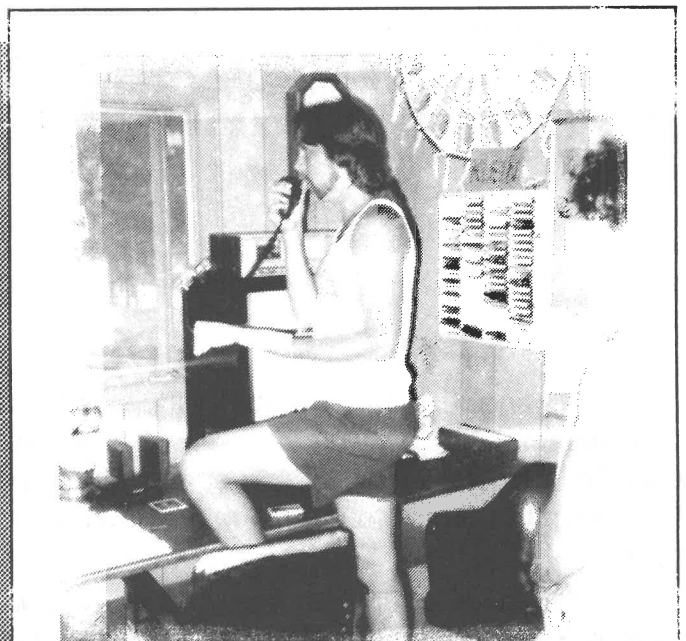
